Foundation to Announce Match Day/Match Month Results

The Sheridan County Community Foundation invites the public to attend a check presentation ceremony to be held during halftime of the Hoxie High School Boys' basketball game on Tuesday, Jan. 7, 2020, at the Hoxie High School Gymnasium.

Twenty-four local nonprofits participated in the giving day campaign this year. Funds received will assist these organizations with upcoming projects and events. The foundation has pledged to provide up to \$10,000 in matching funds with a 50% match (prorated) to the participating organizations upon project initiation. The remaining 50% matching funds will be placed in endowed field of interest funds - a savings account - for future grant funding requests.

This year, a 50/50 Raffle Split will be used to raise match side funds. SCCF will commit to a minimum prize amount of \$2,500 for the raffle. If more is raised, the total amount will be split evenly between a winner and SCCF. Additionally, SCCF will provide a total of \$1,000 in grant funding to be distributed to a participating 2019 Match Day charity(ies) of the winner's choosing. Raffle tickets will be \$50 each or six for \$250.



Christmas Memories

WhenIthinkofChristmases of my childhood, it is strange what I remember. I remember gazing through the window into the darkness. That cozy, homey feeling from five decades ago still lingers as I see the blackness of the icefrosted windows. I remember the Santa mom always had on the front door, with large big colorful lights surrounding its silhouette. I remember my brother Steve popping popcorn. He would pour it into a cake tin, then smother it with butter. I remember my



sister, Brenda, sitting Indian style, with her hair in curlers, eating ice cream.

As far as presents go, I only remember a few. One, however, stands out in my memory beyond the others. There would not be a ton of presents under the tree. Usually, a pair of pants and a shirt, a couple of toys from "Santa" and the grandest gifts were from "Mom and Dad." One year, however, was a present with "from Dad" on the tag. It was the only present that was ever from only Dad, a gift I cherished, a bank in the shape of a bowling pin. The bank, now lost in the time of the half-century since may be gone, but its memory will last my lifetime.



The group recognized Schmidt's leadership both in Kansas and nationally in combating elder abuse and human trafficking, strengthening the professionalism of the office of attorney general, and promoting civil discourse and bipartisan

cooperation.
"I am greatly honored to receive this recognition from my colleagues nationwide," Schmidt said. "And of course, I am honored every day to be able to serve the citizens of Kansas."

Schmidt was nominated for the award by Idaho Attorney General Lawrence Wasden and Iowa Attorney General Tom Miller.

"Kansas Attorney General Derek Schmidt has served the people of Kansas, as well as the




NAAG community, well over the course of his tenure," the two attorneys general wrote in their nomination letter. "His leadership to our organization and his dedication to protecting vulnerable citizens make him a deserving recipient of the Kelley-Wyman Award."

Schmidt served as president of the national association during its 2017-2018 term, focusing particularly on efforts to combat elder abuse. Schmidt is the second-longest serving attorney general in Kansas history. He was first elected Kansas attorney

general in 2010 and reelected in 2014 and 2018. In 2018, he received more votes than any other candidate for attorney general in Kansas history.

The award is named for former Michigan Attorney General Frank Kelley and former New Hampshire Attorney General Louis Wyman. The annual recipient is sometimes informally referred to as the attorney general of the year. Schmidt is the second Kansas attorney general to receive the award, following Carla Stovall, who was honored in 2001.

USDA Extends Deadlines for Dairy Margin Coverage, **Market Facilitation Programs**

New Signup Deadline Is December 20

Due to the prolonged and extensive impacts of weather events this year, the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) today extended the deadline to December 20 for producers to enroll in the Dairy Margin Coverage (DMC) program for the 2020 calendar year. The deadline had been December 13. USDA announced is also continuing to accept applications for the Market Facilitation Program through December 20.

"2019 has challenged the country's ag sector - prevented or late planting followed by a delayed harvest has been further complicated by wet and cold weather," said Bill Northey, USDA Under Secretary for Farm Production and Conservation. "Because some of our producers are still in the field, time to conduct business at the local USDA office is at a premium. We hope this deadline extension will allow producers the opportunity to participate in these important programs."

Authorized by the 2018 Farm Bill and available through USDA's Farm Service Agency (FSA), the program offers reasonably priced protection to dairy producers when the difference between the allmilk price and the average feed cost (the margin) falls below a certain dollar amount selected

by the producer.



Now on this 27^{th} day of November 2019, the Board of Commissioners, Sheridan County, Kansas met in regular session with Chairman Joe Bainter presiding. Others present were Wes Bainter, Troy Dewey and County Clerk Heather Bracht. Guests were Rachel Farber and Brian Baalman.

Joe Bainter called the meeting to order.

Joe Pratt, County Attorney, entered the meeting. Pratt advised the Board that a Road Repair Agreement had been submitted to Hoxie Feedvard, Inc. for the road work to be performed. Pratt stated that feedlot employees took off 3-4" and then were going to work it back in. Pratt went on to say that Ross Carder was to deliver the agreement to Scott Foote for approval and signature and then obtain proof of insurance, etc.

Bracht presented three tax abatements for approval and signature to the Board. Dewey made a motion to approve the abatements, seconded by Joe Bainter. Carried 3-0.

Resolution No. ordering a burn ban was This had been approved at the November 20, 2019 meeting.

Joe Bainter stated he had attended the KDOT meeting in Colby for Highway 23. There was a good turnout for Sheridan County. The cost to restructure Highway 23 South to interstate is approximately \$45,000,000 (\$3,000,000/mile). KDOT is looking at moving Sheridan County closer to the top of the list.

Ross Carder, Road & Bridge Supervisor, entered the meeting. Carder stated the Hoxie Feedyard paperwork had not been signed yet.

The grainery at the Historical Society site has completely almost been removed.

Carder is to continue looking for a scale for the

Snow removal at the EMS building was discussed and Wes Bainter suggested contacting Jerry Spresser. Carder will contact Spresser.

Carder advised the Board that truck #107 lost its clutch. They were in the process of hauling millings. Quotes were received from Truck Clinic in the amount of \$6,000 for clutch and repair the transmission and \$7,200 from Foley for clutch and rebuilt transmission. Foley would be able to start repairs next week and Truck Clinic is unsure when they would be able to start, sometime in December hopefully. Joe Bainter made a motion to go with Truck Clinic, seconded by Dewey. Carried 3-0.

Wes Bainter stated that farmers could help cover hauling of gravel, etc.

13 new culverts have been installed this year as well as five that have been redone.

A bid has been received for new loader front tires. Carder will obtain more bids from other entities. Foley has a set of tires and rims in Wichita for \$10,000. Carder would like to purchase these and put them on another loader and then put the tires removed on the loader at the landfill, removing the solid tires. They will keep the solid tires in case there is a need for them again. Joe Bainter made a motion to approve purchasing the tires, seconded by Dewey. Carried

December 11 is the last noxious weed test for the two employees testing. They will then be able to sell, spray and do whatever needs done. Mark Bretz from Nutrien Ag will show them how to calibrate their equipment.

Joe Bainter asked if Leitner Buildings was putting up the recycling building. Carder stated that TK Construction was doing the work. Bracht asked if Leitner was just subcontracting it out and Carder said yes.

Joe Bainter asks that when purchases large Carder quantities of supplies, in this instance culverts, to come to the Board first to approve and with multiple bids.

Carder said that he would like to hire a good, experienced operator.

Dewey moved to amend the Agenda to include Brian Baalman. Joe Bainter seconded the motion. Carried 3-0. Baalman stated that a barricade had disappeared on one end of a road, and so when Baalman went down this road in their equipment, the tractor went across where a culvert had been, but the silage wagon got stuck and had to be towed out. Baalman stated he had talked with county employee Rex Storer and was advised that someone is always running over barricades, taking them, etc. Carder stated that the Road Department were actually on their way to this area to make the repair when the accident occurred. Baalman stated that it had been exposed for a long time and could have been covered up to reduce the exposure. Baalman stated there is an operator who lives close to this area and there is a lot of work that needs done. Baalman also does not feel a culvert is needed in this specific area and the road should be made a minimum maintenance road (10N/140-150W). Baalman presented a bill for \$7,515.76 for repairs to the equipment. This amount does not include the towing charge. The Board asked Bracht to submit to the County's liability insurance company to see if it will be a covered charge. The Board thanked Baalman for coming

before you ever head out to the festivities, make sure you plan a sober ride home, because driving drunk should never be an option. Help us spread the message: Even one drink is one drink too many. Buzzed Driving Is Drunk Driving."

According to NHTSA, 37,133 people were killed in motor vehicle traffic crashes in 2017, and 29% (10,874) of fatalities occurred those in crashes during which a driver had a blood alcohol concentration (BAC) over the legal limit of .08. In fact, 885 people lost their lives in traffic crashes involving a drunk driver during the month of December 2017 alone. The holidays prove to be extra dangerous to drivers, as more people - drivers and pedestrians alike - are out on the roads.

Drunk driving isn't the only risk on the road: Drugimpaired driving is also an increasing problem, for men and for women alike. If drivers are impaired by any substance — alcohol or other drugs — they should not get behind the wheel of a vehicle. It is illegal in all states to drive impaired by alcohol or drugs. Remember: Driving while impaired is illegal, period. The bottom line is this: If You Feel Different, You Drive Different. It's that simple.

Drinking and driving should never be combined. It's essential to plan a sober ride in advance if the holiday celebration will include alcohol. The alternative could change your life, not to mention the lives of your passengers, of pedestrians, or of other drivers and passengers nearby.

This holiday season, The Hoxie Police Department and NHTSA urge drivers to designate a sober driver before heading out for the evening. If you plan on drinking, plan on not driving.

Party with a Plan First and foremost: Plan

Be honest with ahead. yourself: You know whether you'll be drinking. If you plan to drink, plan for a sober driver to take you home. Is it your turn to be the designated driver? Take that role seriously — your friends are relying on you.

 Remember that it is never okay to drink and drive. Even if you've had only one alcoholic beverage, designate a sober driver or plan to use public transportation or a ride service to get home safely.
