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TAXPAYERS' REPORT


As we are now formulating the 2020 Sheridan County Budget, following is a list of facts that we need to be aware of in order to reduce our county taxes to an appropriate and equitable level. Our property taxes are out of control and we must stop the destruction of our counties.

Property tax assessed by Kansas counties has grown 164% over the past 21 years, according to the Kansas Department of Revenue. Over the same times frame, inflation is 49.5%, and the population growth is 11%. This growth means Kansans are paying roughly \$593 million more in taxes than the counties' prices or population would dictate.

Graphs showing the 21-year change in property taxes, prices, and population for each county and city are below. On average, property taxes are 164% higher than in 1997. For proper context, the value of inflation and population growth is 49.5% and 11% respectively. The large gap between property tax and economic factors means property taxes grew 2.7 times faster than inflation and population growth.

Would property taxes still grow if we only observed Kansas counties with population declines? Perhaps. It would be reasonable to expect property taxes to move with population, holding all else equal. When the population falls, so should property tax and vice versa. However, the adjacent (bottom) chart speaks to the contrary. While the population on average by 10%, property tax collections continue growing at rates near identical to the prior graph. If the tax base is shrinking, then rising property taxes must be the result of higher rates and property values. Both mill rates and appraised property values are set by local officials. Despite fewer people to serve, county officials are making residents pay \$255 million more than what is perhaps economically necessary.

However, think of a court of law for a moment. The killer and the guy with a dozen parking tickets does not stand as co-defendants. Example - a man with outstanding parking tickets is scheduled to stand before a judge. He cannot use the defense, "Judge, what I have done is not nearly as bad as the guy in here yesterday, whom you found guilty of murder. So, therefore, you should let me go."

The judge will not say, "You know, you are right. I have had a lot of heinous people come through here lately. I think I will rip up all vour tickets."

The guilt of one person does not influence the innocence or guilt of another. The defense that your crimes are not as severe as someone

25 Years Ago July 14, 1994 Emergency Volunteers Team Up in Saving Lives **Exercise**

Last year alone, 345 alcohol related accidents in Kansas involved teenage drivers. Nine of them resulted in ten fatalities while 330 additional injuries occurred. Although teens are certainly not the only identifiable group of drivers to combine drinking with behindthe-wheel responsibilities, they are a cause for concern.

Kather than decry dangers and hope for the best, Sheridan County emergency personnel are training to respond to accidents which could someday result. In a cooperative drill. twelve Emergency Medical Technicians, six firemen and two law officers responded to a simulated alcohol-related accident. Four youth, Peggy Cameron and Kim Welshhon of Hoxie, Corey and A. J. Woofter of Colby, played the roles of accident victims trapped in their automobile. Don and Jim Laevenstein provided the car which was methodically ripped apart during the lifesaving exercise.

Early Morning **Destroys Feed Bales**

An extensive amount of carry-over alfalfa bales were lost in an early morning fire Tuesday, July 12.

Sheridan County firefighters were abruptly awakened by their pagers at about 3 a.m. when an unidentified traveler on U. S. Highway 24 spotted a fire 5 ½ miles east of Hoxie and notified the authorities. Three Hoxie trucks and accompanying crews responded to the call, finding the fire located in a stack site of large round bales belonging to Benny Taylor.

With the assistance of a tractor and loader operated by Marvin and Benny Taylor, fire crews were able to protect new hay stacked nearby and confine the burn to the already ignited bales. A minimal amount of grass surrounding the burning bales was destroyed, but Firechief Ross Carder estimates as many as 100 bales of hay were lost. Kansas Crop Production Report

Based on July 1 conditions, Kansas's winter production is forecast at 330 million bushels, up 19 percent from last year, according to the USDA's National Agricultural Statistics Service. Average yield is forecast at 50 bushels per acre, up 12 bushels from 2018. Area to be harvested for grain is estimated at 6.60 million acres, down 10 percent from a year ago.

Oat production is forecast at 1.43 million bushels, up 62 percent from last year. Average yield is forecast at 57 bushels per acre, up 8 bushels from 2018. Area to be harvested for grain is estimated at 25,000 acres, up 39 percent from a year ago.

Crop Update

By July 7, ninety-seven percent of the nation's sorghum acreage was planted, three percentage points behind last year and two points behind the five-year average. Twentytwo percent of the sorghum had reached the headed stage by July 7, three percentage points behind last year and four points behind average. Sixty-two percent of Texas' sorghum acreage had reached the headed stage by July 7, identical to the same time last year but one percentage point ahead of average. Thirteen percent of nation's sorghum was at or beyond the coloring stage by July 7, three percentage points behind both last year and the average. On July 7, seventy-three percent of the sorghum was rated in good to excellent condition, unchanged from the previous week but 22 percentage points above the same time last year.

China Trade Update

The U.S. and China reignited discussions this week. In the first official talks since Trump and Chinese President Xi Jinping reached a temporary truce at the G-20 summit in Osaka, Japan, China's Commerce Minister Zhong Shan and Vice Premier Liu He joined a phone call this week between top U.S. and Chinese trade officials. Despite the conversation, there is still a lack of consensus on China's commitments to make large agricultural purchases from the United States and there is no set date for U.S. trade officials to visit Beijing for the next round of direct talks.

Kansas Crop Progress and Condition

For the week ending July 14, 2019, there were 6.0 days suitable for fieldwork, according to the USDA's National Agricultural Statistics Service. Topsoil moisture supplies rated 0 percent very short, 11 short, 82 adequate, and 7 surplus. Subsoil moisture supplies rated 0 percent very short, 6 short, 84 adequate, and 10 surplus.

Field Crops Report: Winter wheat mature was 98 percent. Harvested was 81 percent, behind 98 last year and 95 for the five-year average.

Corn condition rated 3 percent very poor, 8 poor, 33 fair, 45 good, and 11 excellent. Corn silking was 36 percent, well behind 62 last year and 56 average. Dough was 6 percent, behind 15 last year, and near 9 average.

Soybean condition rated 3 percent very poor, 7 poor, 43 fair, 42 good, and 5 excellent. Soybeans planted was 98 percent, near 100 last year and 99 average. Emerged was 93 percent, behind 100 last year and 98 average. Blooming was 15 percent, well behind 56 last year and 35 average.

Setting pods was 2 percent, behind 12 last year, and near 5

Sorghum condition rated 1 percent very poor, 3 poor, 22 fair, 67 good, and 7 excellent. Sorghum headed was 6 percent, near 9 last year, and equal to average.

Cotton condition rated 5 percent very poor, 18 poor, 44 fair, 30 good, and 3 excellent. Cotton squaring was 40 percent, well behind 67 last year, but near 37 average. Setting bolls was 2 percent, equal to both last year and average.

Sunflowers planted was 93 percent, near 95 last year and 96 average.

Pasture and Range Report: Pasture and range conditions rated 0 percent very poor, 2 poor, 18 fair, 63 good, and 17 excellent.

Other discussion topics will be current and future research projects, market-development activities, educational programs, and administrative items. KDA Alerts Livestock Owners of Virus in Nearby States

With Texas, Colorado and New Mexico reporting multiple confirmed cases of stomatitis virus vesicular (VSV), the Kansas Department of Agriculture is encouraging livestock owners to be aware and take precautions, particularly with animals that may be comingling with other animals at competitions and similar events. At this time, there have been no cases of VSV reported in

VSV is a viral disease which primarily affects horses, but can also affect cattle, sheep, goats, swine, llamas and alpacas. The disease is characterized by fever and the formation of blisterlike lesions in the mouth and on the dental pad, tongue, lips, nostrils, ears, hooves and teats. Infected animals may refuse to eat and drink, which can lead to weight loss. There are no USDAapproved vaccines for VSV.

The primary way the virus is transmitted is from biting insects like black flies, sand flies and midges. Owners should consider treatments to reduce insects where animals are housed. VSV can also be spread by nose-to-nose contact between animals. The virus itself usually runs its course in five to seven days, and it can take up to an additional seven days for the infected animal to recover from

the symptoms. Premises with animals diagnosed with VSV are quarantined until at least 14 days after the last affected animal is diagnosed.

VSV is considered a reportable disease in Kansas. Any person who suspects their animals may have VSV should contact their local veterinarian or state animal health official.

KDA implemented importation increased requirements from the affected regions to help prevent the spread of VSV into Kansas. Likewise, many states have now enhanced their importation requirements as well. Therefore, animal health officials strongly encourage all livestock owners and veterinarians to call the animal health authority in the destination state for the most current import requirements prior to travel.


The Kansas IOLTA program generates approximately \$100,000 per year that can be distributed to organizations that support law-related educational projects and programs that support access to justice for low-income Kansans. The IOLTA program collects the interest from lawyers' commingled client trust accounts which, prior to the creation of the Kansas IOLTA program in 1984, were held in non-interest-bearing accounts. The client funds deposited in these accounts are either so small or will be held for such a short amount of time that any interest generated would be less than the expenses to set up a separate account or to separate out, keep appropriate tax records, and dispense interest to each client. However, when a number of these small or





Minutes & More

Commission Minutes 7/3/2019

Now on this 3rd day of July 2019, the Board of Commissioners, Sheridan County, Kansas met in regular session with Chairman Joe Bainter presiding. Others present were Wes Bainter, Troy Dewey and County Clerk Heather Bracht. Guests were Rachel Farber and Doyle Kauk. Joe Bainter called the meeting to

order. Pratt, Sheridan County Ioe Attorney, entered the meeting. The fully executed Mowing Agreement between Tom Beckman and Sheridan County was given to Bracht. Pratt discussed with the Board the statute pertaining to livestock running at large. Pratt will put a notice in the paper reminding individuals with livestock that it is their responsibility to keep their livestock fenced in and what can happen when they get out.

Pratt stated he has not heard from the pipeline yet about damage done to the county roads. He will check with them again.

Bracht clarified with the Board that John Geisinger, Selden Lumber and Dan Wachendorfer will remove a window to see how it comes out and what it looks like. They are not doing it to put in a new window. Geisinger would like them ordered all at once. The Board stated it is their intent to replace the windows but will wait until after Geisinger and Wachendorfer have checked them.

Dewey made a motion to approve the June 26, 2019 minutes as amended. Joe Bainter seconded the motion. Carried 3-0.

Ross Carder, Road & Bridge Supervisor, entered the meeting. Carder stated that the noxious weed employee had turned in his resignation. Bracht asked about two individuals who had been reported using county equipment, but she has no paperwork on them. The Board made the rule, they can use the equipment once paperwork is received. Carder will get the paperwork from Bracht. Pay will be \$13.65 which is starting pay for county employees. Wes Bainter commented that the Road Department has always had the responsibility for everything, it has never worked, and he doesn't believe it ever will. The farmers need to be involved, even if it's just weekends. These individuals would not be responsible for main roads but could help on the secondary roads.

Four individuals have been hired, two for recycling and two for the road crews.

Carder presented bids for "jumping jacks" from Berry Tractor, Foley and Northern Tool. Dewey made a motion to purchase two new "jumping jacks" from White Star, a division of Berry Tractor in the amount of \$2,500/each. Joe Bainter seconded the motion. Carried 3-0. This was the low bid.

The fire investigator from the insurance company came and they believe the fire at the recycling center was arson. Samples were taken from several different areas and will be tested. Carder will have Meyer Electric come and check the balers' wiring. The south end of the building appears to be fine. Carder and the Board will see what the loss is and then how big a building can be put back up. Carder feels if we could get the balers going, cardboard could be recycled as that is stacking up.

Carder advised the Board he feels employees are doing well taking care of minor repairs to vehicles.

Penco is coming this month to inspect the seven critical bridges that need work.

Everyone feels the spur east of Selden is settling down and working

Carder will advertise for both the Weed and Road Department. Wes Bainter feels the Weed Department is a part-time position. Wes Bainter feels there are a lot of licensed individuals in the county, let's use

them. Debra Tremblay from Options entered the meeting. Tremblay discussed with the Board the counties involved, where the funding comes from, and the outreach they do. They work with child advocacy and law enforcement. Joe Bainter made a motion to increase their budget funding to \$1,000 for the 2020 budget year. Dewey seconded the

motion. Carried 3-0. Bracht asked the Board what they wanted to budget for the Sheridan County Historical Society. Dewey made a motion to budget \$30,000 and to forgive the \$13,000-\$15,000 given to the Historical Society for repairs. Joe Bainter seconded the motion.

Wes Bainter moved to budget the Area Agency on Aging \$4,250 for 2020, seconded by Dewey. Carried

Wes Bainter asked that Bracht put together a spreadsheet of the organizations that are being funded and the dollar amount for 2019 and

the upcoming year. Dewey advised the Board that he will be out of town on the 17th till after noon so by consensus, the meeting will be changed to 3:00 pm. This notice will be placed on the website, Facebook page and the newspapers.

Niermeier, Treasurer, entered the meeting. Niermeier gave a report on the 2^{nd} quarter finances. Niermeier discussed delinquencies on personal property, real estate and severed minerals.

Wes Bainter asked about Twin Creeks and the tax lid. Do they fall in the exception rule? Bracht did not know the answer to this. Pratt will check.

Deb Kaufman, EMS Director, entered the meeting. Kaufman distributed information on income and expenses and discussed with the Board current equipment and that 2020 would be the year that we replace an ambulance, if the County stays on the current plan to rotate an ambulance at 10 years of age. Kaufman advised the Board that an EMS class needs to be sponsored in the fall.

Lance Shepard, Woofter Pump & Well and Bo Farre, Murfin Drilling entered the meeting. Shepard received an email from the Northwest Local Environmental Protection Group (NWLEPG) on June 28, 2019 making changes to policy effective July 1, 2019. The changes included a \$500 fee per oil field water supply well, as well as giving a 10day notice prior to well construction. Shepard states he had received no information of these changes happening prior to almost the day before implementation. Shepard feels this affects the community in that he is unable to fulfill drilling requests timely. Joe Bainter who sits on the NWLEPG Board, stated this change occurred because wells were being inspected and were found uncapped, rags stuffed in the top, just not being taken care of correctly. The landowner does not bring the well in to compliance once the oil crew leaves. NWLEPG feels the oil companies have not been good stewards. Farre disagrees. He stated they understand the permitting, so they know where things are going on but not the 10-day period or the \$500 fee. Wes Bainter stated he wanted to withdraw from NWLEPG effective immediately and hire an independent contractor who will inspect the wells in Sheridan County. We can do our own. Joe Bainter feels that we should invite NWLEPG to the next meeting or that Shepard and Farre should attend a NWLEPG meeting and talk to the Board. Wes Bainter made a motion to withdraw NWLEPG immediately, seconded by Dewey. Carried 2-1.

A bid was received from Meyer Electric for 2nd floor wiring in the Courthouse for AC and heating window units. Dewey made a motion to approve the bid in the amount of \$5,885.00, seconded by Wes Bainter. Carried 3-0.

Wes Bainter moved to approve the payroll as presented, seconded by Dewey. Carried 3-0.
