Marketing Assistance Available for 2016 Wheat, Other Crops

The 2014 Farm Bill authorized 2014-2018 crop year Marketing Assistance Loans (MALs) and Loan Deficiency Payments (LDPs). MALs and LDPs provide financing and marketing assistance for wheat, as well as other commodities such as feed grains, soybeans and other oilseeds, pulse crops, rice, peanuts, cotton, wool and honey.

To be eligible for an MAL or an LDP, producers must have a beneficial interest in the commodity, in addition to other requirements. A producer retains beneficial interest when control of and title to the commodity is maintained. For an LDP,

the producer must retain beneficial interest in the commodity from the time of planting through the date the producer filed Form CCC-633EZ (page 1) in the FSA County Office.

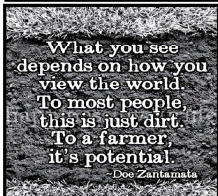
In Kansas, wheat prices have recently dropped to levels that make LDPs applicable, so producers should become familiar with the process to access this assistance. County LDP rates change daily and can be checked at <http://www.fsa.usda.gov/programs-and-services/price-support/ldp-rates/index>.

USDA's Farm Service Agency (FSA) routinely provides agricultural producers with marketing

assistance loans that provide interim cash flow without having to sell the commodities when market prices are at harvest time lows. The loans allow the producer to store and delay the sale of the commodity until more favorable market conditions emerge, while also providing for a more orderly marketing of commodities throughout the marketing year.

These loans are considered "nonrecourse" because the loan can be redeemed by delivering the commodity pledged as collateral to the government as full payment for the loan upon maturity. Commodity certificates are available to loan holders having outstanding nonrecourse loans for wheat, upland cotton, rice, feed grains, pulse crops (dry peas, lentils, large and small chickpeas), peanuts, wool, soybeans and designated minor oilseeds. These certificates can be purchased at the posted county price (or adjusted world price or national posted price) for the quantity of commodity under loan, and must be immediately exchanged for the collateral, satisfying the loan. Commodities currently eligible are wheat and cotton.

A fellow calling himself Lee Morgan blew into Goodland last week and claimed to be the owner of the Joe Blue homestead and said he was very anxious to dispose of it as he needed the money. He put a price of only \$700 on the same and of course soon had a buyer who thought he was getting a bargain, and that he had found an Easterner who wasn't acquainted with the land values in Western Kansas. The buyer gave the stranger \$100 in cash and \$600 in travelers' checks and the said Mr. Morgan went on his way rejoicing, taking the first train out of the city. His haste to get out of town, the low price for which he sold the land and the fact that the deed recited that the owner was a widower, when it was known among Goodland

Mobile Food Pantry Coming to Hoxie

The Kansas Food Bank, Sheridan County Health Department and Amerigroup are working together to distribute food to residents in Sheridan County. The food bank will bring its mobile food pantry to Hoxie on Thursday, August 18.

Food distribution will be from 3:30 to 4:30 pm. Guests will sign in with their name, address and number in their household. The mobile pantry is available to anyone in need of food assistance. When the mobile pantry visited Hoxie in May, 48 households were served.

The distribution location will be directly behind the Sheridan County Health Department in the

800 block of Queen Street. Limit of one per household and guests may not pick up for another household.

Food distributed will include both canned and dry items along with frozen meat and fresh produce. Guests are encouraged to bring along their own boxes, bags or laundry baskets to pack their food in.

Volunteers are also needed to assist with food distribution. Volunteers will check in at 3:15 pm to help unload the truck, assist guests with carrying their food packages and help reload the truck for the next stop. For more information, please contact Debi Kreutzman at 316-265-3663.

Non-Insured Crop Disaster Assistance (NAP) Program September 1 Application Closing & Requirements

The deadlines for the USDA, Farm Service Agency (FSA) to accept applications under the Noninsured Crop Disaster Assistance Program (NAP) for this year crops have been established by the Kansas State FSA Committee. The application closing date of September 1 applies to the following crops: All small grain crops, except Oats, Barley and Continuous Crop Wheat planted with the intention of harvesting as grain, plus Aquaculture, Canola, Christmas Trees, Nursery Crops, Speltz, and Turf Grass Sod.

Crops eligible for NAP benefits are limited to those not insurable in the county and are produced for food or fiber. Included as eligible crops are floricultural, ornamental nursery, Christmas trees, turf grass sod, industrial crops, seed crops, aquaculture (including ornamental fish), and forage crops for livestock (mechanically harvested or grazed).

Interested producers who may wish to participate in the NAP program must visit their local FSA office to complete an Application for Coverage (CCC-471) and pay the applicable service fee by the applicable sales closing date for the specific crop. Administrative service fees are collected in order to help offset the cost of implementing the program and range from \$250 per crop per administrative county not to exceed \$750 per producer per administrative county with a \$1875 maximum fee for multi-county producers.

In the unfortunate event that a producer does suffer a loss on their particular crop, a Notice of Loss (CCC-576) must be filed with the local FSA office within 15 calendar days after the disaster occurrence, or the date the loss becomes apparent to the producer.

Once the Notice of

Loss has been approved and production evidence collected, the producer must file an Application for Payment. This is done at the local FSA Office as well and must be filed prior to the immediately subsequent crop year acreage report date for the specific crop.

Producers are responsible for providing accurate and complete information. This includes timely certifying the unit's planted acreage and production with FSA. In general, acreage reporting deadlines are December 15 for small grain crops, and the earlier of July 15 or 15 days prior to the onset of harvest or grazing for all other crops. Production reporting deadlines are no later than the immediately subsequent crop year acreage reporting date for the crop. It's always important to check with the local FSA office to determine what the acreage and or production reporting deadlines are for each specific crop.

When required, producers shall provide to FSA verifiable or reliable production evidence for the crop by practice, type and variety, and it must be provided in a manner that can be easily understood. Producers shall maintain their production evidence for 3 years after the crop year it is initially certified.

This coverage entitles eligible producers to a payment of 55 percent of an average market price for the commodity if a natural disaster caused a 50 percent production loss or greater of an eligible crop.

Producers are limited to \$100,000 in benefits per person per crop year, meet adjusted gross income provisions, and comply with conservation compliance provisions in order to be determined eligible.

Starting Sept. 1, Prepare Kansas 2016 will provide tips on keeping food safe in emergency situations. This year's program will be conducted through the K-State Research and Extension Facebook page. No registration is required, so Kansans and anyone interested in planning ahead for

emergencies can follow on Facebook at any time during September, pick up handy information and interact with K-State extension specialists and agents, said Julianne Shoup, family and consumer science agent in the Twin Creeks Extension District.

Throughout 2015, a total of 126 tornadoes alone occurred across the state, which made it the fourth highest year for tornadoes since 1950, according to the Kansas Department of Emergency Management.

"Kansas has its share of disasters, whether it's a homeowner's basement flooding or a fire affecting a whole block in a community. We're committed to working with people across the state to help them be prepared for anything that comes their way," said Kansas State University associate professor Elizabeth Kiss.

"We can't always keep disasters from happening, but we know that being as prepared as possible, whether it's making an emergency kit or having copies of your financial and personal information in a separate, safe place, aids in the recovery from disasters."

A basic emergency supply kit could include the following recommended items:

- Water, one gallon of

water per person per day for at least three days, for drinking and sanitation

- Food, at least a three-day supply of non-perishable food
- Battery-powered or hand crank radio and a NOAA Weather Radio with tone alert and extra batteries for both
- Flashlight and extra batteries
- First aid kit
- Whistle to signal for help
- Dust mask to help filter contaminated air and plastic sheeting and duct tape to shelter-in-place
- Moist towelettes, garbage bags and plastic ties for personal sanitation
- Wrench or pliers to turn off utilities
- Manual can opener for food
- Local maps
- Cell phone with chargers, inverter or solar charger
- Copies of important financial papers

Kiss, a K-State Research and Extension financial management specialist produces the Prepare Kansas blog, blogs.k-state.edu/preparekans, which provides tips and resources on a range of emergency preparedness topics,

including this year's focus on food safety during September.

"It is very important to keep food safety in mind before, during and after emergencies such as power outages and floods, to help to reduce the likelihood of people getting sick from eating contaminated food. That would make a challenging situation even worse," said Londa Nwadike, consumer food safety specialist with K-State Research and Extension. "Some of the food safety practices that are important in emergency situations are good practices to help prevent people from getting sick at any time."

Kiss and Nwadike, along with several K-State colleagues, are delegates to the Extension Disaster Education Network, a network of extension professionals across the country working to mitigate the effects of disasters through education.

This Sunday, August 12 at 2 p.m. at the Sheridan County Public Library, Jerome and Lee will be present to talk to attendees about the Honor Flight they took on April 14-15. Leading the presentation will be Debbie Hagans, the coordinator for the Western Plains Branch of the Southern Coffey County Honor Flight. This audio-visual presentation is open to the public, and light refreshments will be served.

Last week at the Sentinel office, Lee and Jerome came into visit and speak about their experience. Lee was asked what his feelings were when he was chosen for the Honor Flight. "I felt honored, not for sure at the time, but glad I went," Jerome thought it was a good deal.

Lee and Jerome both served in the United States Army, and fought in the Korean War. Jerome was stationed in Korea in 1952-54 and was a sergeant assigned to radar. Lee was in Germany in 1956-58 and was a driver for the tank battalion. "When I drove the tank, we were at

peace, but I was involved in 'Operation War Hog,'" he remembers. In 2008, Herl went over to Germany to see where he had served. "It was so much different than it is today."

Heim and Herl said they really enjoyed their time at the national capitol and thought it was nice to spend some time visiting other veterans. "There were so many memorials that you needed a motorcycle to get around," commented Lee, and Jerome agreed. Both mentioned the weather was good as they travelled a lot on foot. "It was walk, walk," said Jerome. Lee remembers that it was "traffic galore" in D.C.

Both local veterans wanted to thank Debbie. They felt she did a great job organizing the event. "The whole trip was put together very well," commented Heim and Herl. Lee mentioned that when they left Ransom, KS, there

were escorts everywhere. "People were everywhere throughout the whole trip to cheer us on," commented both Hoxie veterans.

Lee and Jerome agreed that everything during the trip was very scheduled. Jerome did add with a smile, he was sleepy most of the time. "Jerome kept complaining he needed more sleep." Lee continued laughing and felt Jerome might still need more sleep today from the trip. One of the best memories for Lee was that the people were so friendly everywhere during the trip. "I would recommend this trip to any veteran that gets asked to go," commented Lee.

Former Trojan Wrestler Seeks Gold with Uzbekistan

Former Colby Community College all-American wrestler Bekzod Abdurakhmonov will represent his home country of Uzbekistan in the Summer Olympics Aug. 19 in Rio de Janeiro. At 74 kilograms, Abdurakhmonov secured his spot in men's freestyle wrestling at the United World Wrestling (UWW) World Olympic Games Qualifying Tournament in Istanbul, Turkey. Abdurakhmonov attended CCC from 2008-2010. He

grew up in Tashkent, Uzbekistan, before arriving in Colby to compete under legendary coach Steve Lampe. Abdurakhmonov went 84-8 on his way to two NJCAA runner-up finishes. After graduating he transferred to Clarion University, studying sports management and going 38-12 his senior year while medaling in notable tournaments. CCC instructor Todd Voss was the assistant coach when Abdurakhmonov wrestled for the Trojans. "Bekzod was always a hard worker and put in many extra hours in the wrestling room at CCC," Voss said. "He

was always a team leader." Abdurakhmonov claimed gold at the 2014 Asian Freestyle Wrestling Championships and bronze at the 2014 World Freestyle Wrestling Championships. For the last two years he joined his brother Muzaffar, also a CCC graduate and NJCAA champion in 2003 and 2004, as a volunteer assistant coach at Harvard University.

In addition to wrestling, Abdurakhmonov fights in mixed martial arts and is considered one of the stand-out wrestling athletes to cross-compete in MMA.

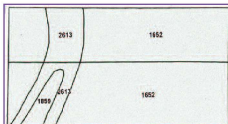

Race for the Wounded

It's time to enjoy some barrel racing while contributing to a great cause. This Saturday, August 13 at the Sheridan County Fairgrounds marks the third straight year of "Race for the Wounded." This annual event has grown each year, bringing more barrel racers to Hoxie to compete. According to Nicole Farber, race organizer and mastermind, the first year of the event brought about 80 racers. Last year it jumped to around 210, and she is hoping for even more this year.

Each year, Race for the Wounded selects a charitable organization to receive the funds raised at the race. Last year, \$1600 was raised for a veterans group from Colorado Springs. "This year, we would like to raise even more money for a local organization called "Miracle Rides," a therapeutic riding group for disabled kids and adults, headed by Kay Wade and Susan Wigginton, both from Hoxie. It's the hope that with this year's event proceeds, a riding program for veterans can be established.

How did "Race for the Wounded" get started? "I had a dream about it, plus I wanted a way to help veterans. I have some family members that are veterans," Nicole said. Barrel racing is a passion of hers, and "watching the races

is something I really love to do. The best thing about barrel racing is the 'journey' of it. Every inch of hard work, sweat and bruises put into it makes it all worthwhile." "I love to watch the races. We bring a lot of people into our community, not just racers, but their families and friends as well. There's money spent here in Hoxie due to this event such as fuel and snacks. Events like this help out several businesses in a little town," added Nicole.

This year's event will have several competitors who have a lot of RCA (Real Cowboy Association) experience. This year, there are three age groups. The Pee-Wee division is age seven and under, while Youth is ages seven to 18, and Open for 18 and up. Last year, according to Farber, there were 180 in Open and 30 in the Youth division. Nicole mentioned that those in the Youth division can move up to the Open division. Buckles will be given out to the top winners of each division and there are five of them. There will also be prizes given out for second and third place. Nicole mentioned that exhibitions (practice runs) will take place around 10 a.m.

This year's announcer will be Elizabeth Schremmer from Russell. Her fourteen-year-old daughter Olivia will also compete in this event, and

"I personally donate my time to this event to raise money for a great cause. This event is a great way for barrel racers to get together, plus be able to win some money," commented Elizabeth. She also mentioned she expects a lot of good competition

for people to see in Hoxie.

Nicole said she owes a great deal of recognition to Woffert Pump and Well for helping work the arena ground. In rodeo events, the ground work inside the arena is very important for a successful event. "Lance and Coleen Shepard are incredibly helpful. They donate the water, tractor, fuel and much more towards this event." Nicole also wants to thank the volunteers. She has about 20 who assist with the event.

Insurance, Nicole's mother Kathy Daily from El Dorado, and the Rocking K Ranch out of Hill City who donates hay for the horses during the barrel racing. And keeping the contestants and spectators fed will be the mother and daughter combination of Carol and Rachel Farber from Jams, Jellies and More.

When you are a director of an event this size it's hard to participate yourself. The first year of this event she competed, but now with the increasing popularity, she is far too busy on the organizing end to join in herself. Nicole commented that one of the biggest challenges of running an event of with so many competitors is to stay calm. "There's always somebody that has another idea on how to run things, but for the most part, we do pretty well."

Farber is confident that the barrel racing on Saturday will be very entertaining, and has hopes for a great turnout. Last year was a good crowd, according to Farber. She couldn't believe how many people came to watch this event. "Hoxie and Sheridan County do great when it comes to helping with community events. Everybody's support is much appreciated. This year we are hoping for another great crowd."

DSNWK Begins Five-Year Contract to 'End Dependence'

Developmental Services of Northwest Kansas' Employment Connections Program signed a five-year contract agreeing to the "End Dependence Kansas (EDK)" initiative through the Department of Children and Families, which aims to increase the employment of Kansans with disabilities. DSNWK is striving to increase the successful closures in competitive, integrated employment from 60-percent to 75-percent.

The contract began July 1 and will end June 30, 2021, and welcomes a new full-time employee, Jackie Sakil. Sakil serves as the marketing manager for Employment Connections, which serves 18 counties in northwest Kansas. Sakil relocated to Hays from the Salt Lake City area. She spent 20 years volunteering in the deaf community and previously worked as a vocational counselor and job coach. Sakil said she already feels

very welcomed in the community. In September, Sakil and everyone involved in the project will attend training for EDK to ensure that goals are met. The goals of the contract include empowering disabled Kansans, building the capacity and infrastructure with community partners, decreasing the reliance of people on the public benefit system, developing effective support systems, and improving the employment outcomes of Kansans with disabilities. Seventy-percent of Sakil's time is spent meeting with community businesses and securing internships, and 30-percent is spent working with families, persons served and the Department of Children and Families' benefit specialist. In addition, Sakil will collaborate with mental health agencies, the Department of Corrections and provide other support

needed for successful employment closures and maintenance of long term support. Starting an internship program is one of Sakil's current focuses. The goal of the internship program is to help find good matches between the people DSNWK serves and businesses, and to help build resumes, she said. Employment Connections encourages those interested in providing employment opportunities for persons with developmental disabilities to contact Sakil at 785-621-5255. The EDK initiative will serve Ellis, Russell, Trego, Graham, Norton, Rooks, Phillips, Smith and Sheridan Counties. As the project progresses, DSNWK may consider expansion to other counties in Northwest Kansas. DSNWK is a 501(c) (3) non-profit and Community Service Provider that assures the provision of quality services and programs to approximately 500 individuals with mild to severe disabilities. These services are available through community based and outreach programs and interagency agreements with other service providers in the 18 northwestern most counties of Kansas.

Present were the board, Feldt and Bracht. The board opening the door at 8:45 with no decision being made. Feldt exited the meeting.

Chief Dispatcher Emma Eckhardt entered the meeting to discuss the Entropol System. This system would eliminate

the need for physically writing on a log sheet as it logs calls automatically. It works with other counties who have the same system. It qualifies for using 911 funds. Eckhardt advised that a Justice Assistance Grant (JAG) application is being completed that would fund this for the first year. Kauk made a motion to approve completing the grant application for the Entropol System. Bielser seconded the motion. Carried 3-0.

Kauk made a motion to approve the July 25, 2016 minutes as amended. Bielser seconded the motion. Carried 2-0. Dewey abstained since he was not at the July 25, 2016 meeting.

Kauk made a motion, seconded by Bielser, to approve the July 29, 2016 payroll as presented. Carried 3-0.

Bielser advised the board of the progress being made to locate the time capsule in the cornerstone of the courthouse. Penco Engineering has been contacted to see if they can

come to Hoxie and evaluate the cornerstone before any more mortar is tampered with.

Bielser made a motion to adopt Resolution #16-100, a resolution creating the position of county counselor for Sheridan County. Kauk seconded the motion. Carried 3-0. Bielser made a motion, seconded by Dewey, to ask County Attorney Steve Hirsch if he would be interested in being County Counselor. Motion carried 3-0. Hirsch accepted the appointment. Bielser then made a motion, seconded by Dewey, to appoint Hirsch as County Counselor for Sheridan County. Carried 3-0. Budgeted County Attorney money will be split between County Attorney and County Counselor.

No further business, Kauk made a motion to adjourn, seconded by Bielser. Carried 3-0. The next regular meeting will be Monday, August 8, 2016 at the regular time and meeting place.

KRC Community Food Solutions Initiative Funded Three More Years

The Kansas Rural Center will continue its current Community Food Solutions Initiative for another three years thanks to additional funding awarded from the Kansas Health Foundation, an organization dedicated to improving the health of all Kansans.

The funded project, "Community Food Solutions: Civic Agriculture for Civic Health" will focus on cultivating civic agriculture in Kansas and mobilizing grassroots Kansans and partners to successfully incorporate Kansas farms into the supply chain that provides healthful foods to Kansans. Civic agriculture is defined as the trend towards locally based agriculture and food production that is tightly linked to a community's social and economic development. Civic health is defined as the measure of a community's well-being.

Launched in 2013, KRC's three year, "Community Food Solutions for a Healthier Kansas" Initiative produced the report, Feeding Kansas: Statewide Farm and Food System Assessment with a Plan for Public Action (Feeding Kansas). The report makes policy recommendations to help

strengthen the ability of Kansas farmers and communities to grow and market fresh food, especially fruit and vegetables. The recommendations were developed during the project's first year based on input from hundreds of Kansans working in farm and food sectors.

The current Feeding Kansas report has a specific focus on increasing fruit and vegetable production and access in the state. Increasing production of fruits and vegetables for local markets would help diversify and thereby strengthen Kansas agriculture, the Kansas economy, and access to healthful foods. Both Kansans' diets and Kansas's agricultural landscape are deficient in fruits and vegetables, compared to other food and farm products.

In 2012, 90 percent of Kansas's harvested crop acres were devoted to growing the following four foods: wheat (9 million acres), corn (4 million), soybeans (3.8 million), and sorghum (2.1 million). Forage for livestock covered nearly 2.5 million acres. Meanwhile, only 14,359 acres, 0.03 percent of Kansas farmland, were used to produce vegetables, berries, fruits and nuts.

While increasing fruit and

vegetable production and access has been a primary focus, the ultimate goals of the projects are engaged, healthy communities across the state and a Kansas food and farming system that will increase residents' access to and consumption of a healthy plate including fruits, vegetables, whole grains, and a variety of protein sources - both at home and in food outlets, improving personal and community health across the state. The newly funded project aims to incorporate more dialogue and understanding of challenges and opportunities across grain and animal protein food sectors.

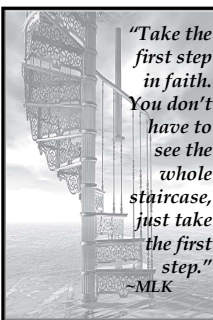
