



Marketing Assistance Available for 2016 Wheat, Other Crops

2014 Farm Bill authorized 2014-2018 crop year Marketing Assistance Loans (MALs) and Loan Deficiency Payments MALs and LDPs (LDPs). provide financing and marketing assistance for wheat, as well as other commodities such as feed grains, soybeans and other grains, soybeans and other oilseeds, pulse crops, rice, peanuts, cotton, wool and honey.

To be eligible for an MAL or an LDP, producers must have a beneficial interest in

have a beneficial interest in the commodity, in addition to other requirements. A producer retains beneficial interest when control of and title to the commodity is maintained. For an LDP,

producer must retain beneficial interest in the commodity from the time of planting through the date the producer filed Form CCC-633EZ (page 1) in the FSA

633EZ (page 1) in the FSA County Office. In Kansas, wheat prices have recently dropped to levels that make LDPs applicable, so producers should become familiar should become familiar with the process to access this assistance. County LDP rates change daily and can be checked at http://www. fsa.usda.gov/programs-andservices/price-support/ldp-rates/index.

USDA's Farm Service Agency (FSA) routinely provides agricultural producers with marketing



assistance loans that provide interim cash flow without having to sell the commodities when when market prices are at harvest time lows. The at narvest time lows. The loans allow the producer to store and delay the sale of the commodity until more favorable market conditions emerge, while also providing for a more orderly marketing of commodities throughout the marketing year.
These loans are considered

"nonrecourse" because the loan can be redeemed by loan can be redeemed by delivering the commodity pledged as collateral to the government as full payment for the loan upon maturity. Commodity certificates are available to loan holders having outstanding nonrecourse loans for wheat upland cotton, rice, feet outstanding nonrecourse loans for wheat, upland cotton, rice, feed grains, pulse crops (dry peas, lentils, large and small chickpeas), peanuts, wool, soybeans and designated minor oilseeds. These critificates can be purchased certificates can be purchased at the posted county price (or adjusted world price or (or adjusted world price or national posted price) for the quantity of commodity under loan, and must be immediately exchanged for the collateral, satisfying the loan. Commodities currently eligible are wheat and cotton

Non-Insured Crop Disaster Assistance (NAP) **Program** September 1 Application Closing & Requirements

The deadlines for the USDA, Farm Service Agency (FSA) to accept applications under the Noninsured Crop Disaster Assistance Program (NAP) for this year crops have been established by the Kansas State FSA Committee. The application closing date of September 1 applies to the following crops: All small grain crops, except Oats, Barley and Continuous Crop Wheat planted with the intention of harvesting as grain, plus Aquaculture, Canola, Christmas Trees, Nursery Crops, Speltz, and Turf Grass Sod. The deadlines for the USDA,

and Turf Grass Sod.
Crops eligible for NAP
benefits are limited to those
not insurable in the county
and are produced for food or
fiber.Included aseligible crops are floricultural, ornamental nursery, Christmas trees, turf grass sod, industrial crops, seed crops, aquaculture (including ornamental grass sod, industrial crops, seed crops, aquaculture (including ornamental fish), and forage crops for livestock (mechanically

livestock (mechanically harvested or grazed). Interested producers who may wish to participate in the NAP program must visit their local FSA office to complete an Application for Coverage (CCC-471) and pay the applicable service fee by the applicable sales closing date for the specific crop. Administrative service fees are collected in order crop. Administrative services research collected in order to help offset the cost of implementing the program and range from \$250 per crop per administrative county not to exceed \$750 per producer per administrative county with a \$1575 movimum for

with a \$1875 maximum fee for multi-county producers. In the unfortunate event that a producer does suffer a loss on their particular crop, a National to 1000 country. Notice of Loss (CCC-576) must be filed with the local FSA be tiled with the local FSA office within 15 calendar days after the disaster occurrence, or the date the loss becomes apparent to the producer. Once the Notice of

has been approved production evidence and production collected, the and production evidence collected, the producer must file an Application for Payment. This is done at the local FSA Office as well and must be filed prior to the immediately subsequent

the immediately subsequent crop year acreage report date for the specific crop. Producers are responsible for providing accurate and complete information. This includes timely certifying the unit's planted acreage and production with FSA. In general, acreage reporting deadlines are December 15 for small grain crops, deadlines are December 15 for small grain crops, and the earlier of July 15 or 15 days prior to the onset of harvest or grazing for all other crops. Production reporting deadlines are no later than the immediately later than the immediately subsequent crop year acreage reporting date for the reporting date for the crop. It's always important to check with the local FSA office to determine what the

office to determine what the acreage and or production reporting deadlines are for each specific crop. When required, producers shall provide to FSA verifiable or reliable production evidence for the crop by practice, type and variety, and it must be provided in practice, type and variety, and it must be provided in a manner that can be easily understood. Producers shall maintain their production evidence for 3 years after the crop year it is initially certified. This coverage entitles

This coverage entitles eligible producers to a payment of 55 percent of an average market price for the commodity if a natural disaster caused a 50 percent production loss or greater of an eligible crop. Producers are limited to \$100,000 in benefits per

person per crop year, meet adjusted gross income provisions, and comply with conservation compliance provisions in order to be determined eligible.

Kansas 2016 will provide tips
on keeping food safe in emergency situations. This year's
program will be conducted
through the K-State Research
and Extension Facebook page.
No registration is required,
so Kansans and anyone interested in planning ahead for

emergencies can follow on Facebook at any time during September, pick up handy information and interact with K-State extension specialists and agents, said Julianne Shoup, family and consumer science agent in the Twin Creeks Extension District.

Throughout 2015, a total of 126 tornadoes alone occurred

126 tornadoes alone occurred 126 tornadoes alone occurred across the state, which made it the fourth highest year for tornados since 1950, according to the Kansas Department of Emergency Management.

We're committed to working with people across the state to help them be prepared for anything that comes their way," said Kansas State University associate professor Elizabeth Kiss. "We can't always keep disasters from happening, but we ters from happening, but we know that being as prepared as possible, whether it's makas possible, whether it's making an emergency kit or having copies of your financial and personal information in a separate, safe place, aids in the recovery from disasters."

"It is very important to keep food safety in mind before, during and after emergencies such as power outages and floods, to help to reduce the likelihood of people getting sick from eating contaminated food. That would make a challenging situation even worse." food. That would make a chal-lenging situation even worse," said Londa Nwadike, consum-er food safety specialist with K-State Research and Exten-sion. "Some of the food safety practices that are important in emergency situations are good practices to help prevent people from getting sick at any time."

Civic health is defined as the measure of a community food Solutions for a Healthier Kansas" Initiative produced the report, Feeding Kansas: Statewide Farm and Food System Assessment with a Plan for Public Action (Feeding Kansas). The report makes System Assessment with a Plan for Public Action (Feeding Kansas). The report makes policy recommendations to help

strengthen the ability of Kansas farmers and communities to grow and market fresh food, especially fruit and vegetables. The recommendations were developed during the project's first year based on input from hundreds of Kansans working in farm and food sectors.

The current Feeding Kansas report has a specific focus on increasing fruit and vegetable production and access in the state. Increasing production of fruits and vegetables for local markets would help diversify and thereby strengthen Kansas agriculture, the Kansas economy, and access to healthful froods Both Kansass conomy, and access to healthful froods Both Kansass economy, and access healthful foods. Both Kansar

healthful foods. Both Kansans' diets and Kansas's agricultural landscape are deficient in fruits and vegetables, compared to other food and farm products. In 2012, 90 percent of Kansas's harvested crop acres were devoted to growing the following four foods: wheat (9 million acres), corn (4 million), soybeans (3.8 million), and sorghum (2.1 million). Forage for livestock covered nearly 2.5 million acres. Meanwhile, only 14,359 acres, 0.03 percent of Kansas farmland, were used to produce vegetables, Nansas farmland, were used to produce vegetables, berries, fruits and nuts. erries, fruits and nuts.
While increasing fruit and

vegetable production and access has been a primary focus, the ultimate goals of the projects are engaged, healthy communities across the state and a Kansas food and farming system that will increase residents' access to and consumption of a healthy plate including fruits, vegetables, whole grains, and a variety of protein sources – both at home and in food outlets, improving personal and community health across the state. The newly funded project aims to incorporate more dialogue and understanding of challenges and opportunities across grain and animal protein food sectors. 
