What is Veterans Day?

Veterans Day is a way to honor those who have served in the United States Armed Forces. It coincides with holidays in other countries to mark the anniversary of the end of World War I. Our country used to celebrate Armistice Day. It represented the day, seven months before "The Great War" officially ended, when the fighting ceased between the Allied nations and Germany. This or temporary armistice, hostilities, cessation of occurred on the eleventh hour of the eleventh day of the eleventh month in 1918. The following year, President Woodrow Wilson proclaimed November 11 as the first commemoration of Armistice Day. Originally, the day was to be observed with parades and a brief suspension of business beginning at 11 a.m. In 1938, Congress declared November 11 to be a national holiday known as Armistice Day to honor the veterans of World War I. However, in 1954, after World War II, the name changed to Veterans

Day, to honor all veterans.

History of Veterans Day

World War I - known at the time as "The Great War" - officially ended when the Treaty of Versailles was signed on June 28, 1919, in the Palace of Versailles outside the town of Versailles, France. However, fighting ceased seven months earlier when an armistice, or temporary cessation of hostilities, between the Allied nations and Germany went into effect on the eleventh hour of the eleventh day of the eleventh month. For that reason, November 11, 1918, is generally regarded as the end of "the war to end all wars."

WWII Veterans Memorial Highway Tour

In honor of our veterans this month, something to consider is the WWII Veterans Memorial Highway Tour. Starting in Thomas County, it follows the Highway 24 corridor through the Solomon Valley to Riley County. There are 27 memorials and monuments along the 200 mile stretch of highway.

According to the Solomon Valley Highway 24 Heritage Alliance website, Governor Kathleen Sebelious signed House Bill 2071 on March 20, 2008 designating US 24 as the WWII Veterans Memorial Highway, from Colby to Riley, between US 83 and US

The Highway 24 Alliance is dedicated to preserving and promoting the Solomon Valley heritage, a place defined by the US 24 corridor through the Solomon Valley. They have, since House Bill 2071, been working to honor the spirit of the designation of the highway. It is the feeling of the Alliance that

I once decided to read a Victor Hugo novel. Being an avid reader, Victor Hugo is one of those classic authors that you hear about a lot, but always seems to get pushed to the bottom of the list. Not that he has less to offer than say, Mark Twain, or Charles Dickens, it just seems difficult to make a nineteenth century French novelist a priority. But I was bold and decided to give "Les Miserables" a chance. First, the book itself is a monstrosity, with over 600,000 words; it fills a backpack by itself. I mean, I have lifted bricks that weighed less than this thing. It was a chore, but I eventually read the entire thing. Now, Victor Hugo's writing style is a little dry, and I had to endure several chapters' worth of backstory, and details that only barely pertained to the storyline. There was a long section of the book that was devoted to the blueprints and schematics of the sewer system beneath Paris, some parts of that book were torture to get through. As a whole, I would say that I was not a big fan of the novel, and I never have read another book by that author. However, the plot, and the characters of "Les Miserables" have really stuck with

Each character in the story deals with their own kind of tragedy, in their own way. Whether that be a prison sentence for stealing bread for a starving family, or giving up a child to another family because of extreme poverty. You see, after reading that novel (for what seemed like months) I felt very sad for all the characters. They had all suffered, they had all done their best to do what they thought was right, and in the end, they all paid the consequences for their decisions. The most interesting dynamic of the book, was that there are no real villains. No sinister characters lurking in the dark, causing all this misery. Each character was simply living out their lives, in a broken and difficult environment, doing what they thought was best. Each life described had great moments of victory, and crushing moments of defeat.

I don't know as I have ever read a fictional story that so accurately depicts the lives of so many. Generally speaking, we tend to like the stories with a clear bad guy that we can blame all the problems on, and no one feels bad about hating them; and conversely, we like there to be a clear hero that we can get behind, and cheer on. Unfortunately, life is rarely that black and white. There is a saying that pastors have, it goes like this: "Hurting people, hurt people." When someone hurts us, or wrongs us, we have no idea what has happened in their lives, and in their hearts that has made them act that way. However, we can generally assume that people that are hurtful don't do it because they derive pleasure from it, that is very rare, but that they are doing it out of a sense of necessity.

Now I am a firm believer that if you do the crime, you do the time. Crime should be punished, however, that doesn't change the fact that people who hurt others are generally reacting to feeling hurt themselves, which is very sad. That makes us look differently at the person who is gossiping about us doesn't it? We are all dealing with the effects of broken lives in a broken world, and we find that outlined in the Bible. God says that we are broken, and we can come to Him to be made whole. We don't know what is going on in people's lives, and in their hearts, but we can love them. We can love them by recognizing that we are all broken and in need of a redeemer, one who can put us back together. We find that in Christ, and when we look at people through that lens, we see what Christ sees, broken lives, looking to be redeemed.

Oysters in Various Ways Oysters au natural or in a

stew are the ways they are most commonly served. They should be carefully handled to see that no shell or foreign substance is left, then placed in a sieve and water poured over them.

Oyster Soufflé - Scald two dozen oysters in their own liquor, drain, remove the beards and pound in a mortar with two tablespoonfuls of softened bread crumbs, soaked in water and squeezed dry; mix three yolks of eggs, two tablespoonfuls of butter, a gill of oyster liquor and an equal quantity of whipped cream. Season with salt and cayenne; add a little lemon juice and the whites of two eggs, well whipped. Stir this mixture lightly and turn into a buttered mold; cover with paper, well buttered


and steam 30 minutes. When ready to serve, turn the soufflé out on a hot dish and place some oyster sauce around it.

Spindled Oysters - Take two dozen large oysters and the same number of slices of bacon, cut very thin. Have a half dozen steel skewers, small ones, and spear an oyster and a piece of bacon, alternating them. Place the bacon through the corner and do not crowd. Lay the skewers across a baking pan and cook in a quick oven or under gas five minutes. Lay each skewer with its contents on a slice of nicely browned toast; pour the gravy over and serve at once.

Virginia Oyster Soup -Wash a quart of oysters, saving the liquor. Strain and add two blades of mace, one stalk of celery, chopped fine, one teaspoonful of salt, and a pod of red pepper. Scald, add two tablespoonfuls of butter, rubbed smooth with one tablespoonful of flour; add a pint of milk and a pint of cream. Allow to come to a boil; add the oysters and the moment they are plump and the edge curl, remove from fire. Serve from a tureen with inch squares of toast.

Export Sales Reach New Heights

Demand from the export market reached historic levels this week with 16 million bushels of sorghum sold since last Wednesday, according to the U.S. Department of Agriculture Foreign Agricultural Service's November 3 report. This week's sales represent one of the highest recorded export sales of sorghum in one week. Two months into the 2016/2017 marketing year, sorghum export commitments have reached 58 million bushels, representing 20 percent of USDA's 2017 export

projections. China is leading sorghum purchases with 40 million bushels-70 percent of total U.S. grain sorghum exports. Meanwhile Mexico has committed to 4 million bushels for the current marketing year followed by Japan. Additional export customers include Canada, Indonesia, South Korea and Nigeria.

"These sales continue to reflect China's need for high quality feed ingredients," said Florentino Lopez, Sorghum Checkoff executive director.

"Maintaining and continuing to enhance and develop marketplaces is critical to helping farmers maximize their profit potential, and the Sorghum Checkoff and U.S. Grains Council remain engaged in current and future markets like China."

ARC, PLC Enrollment Open

The U.S. Department of Agriculture Farm Service Agency opened enrollment for acreage in the Agriculture Risk Coverage (ARC) and Price Loss Coverage (PLC) programs for 2017. The price loss for the 2016 marketing year is 64 cents per bushel or \$1.14 per cwt, equating to \$216 million in PLC payments made this October.

Sorghum Crop Undate

Ninety-six percent of the sorghum was mature by week's end, three percentage points behind last year but slightly ahead of the five-year average. Producers harvested 76 percent of the nation's sorghum by October 30, slightly behind last year but eight percentage points ahead of the five-year average. Colorado, Illinois, Kansas, Nebraska and South Dakota producers recorded double-digit harvest progress during the week.

USDA Issues CRP Payments

The U.S. Department of Agriculture is issuing nearly \$1.7 billion in payments for protection of almost 24 million acres of wetlands, grasslands and wildlife habitat through the Conservation Reserve Program. In the 2016 fiscal year, 1.3 million acres were

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

has freed us and because of the opportunity it has given America to show her sympathy with peace and justice in the councils of the nations...'

The original concept for the celebration was for a day observed with parades and public meetings and a brief suspension of business beginning at 11:00 a.m.

The United States Congress officially recognized the end of World War I when it passed a concurrent resolution on June 4, 1926, with these words:

Whereas the 11th of November 1918, marked the cessation of the most destructive, sanguinary, and far reaching war in human annals and the resumption by the people of the United States of peaceful relations with other nations, which we hope may never again be severed, and

Whereas it is fitting that the recurring anniversary of this date should be commemorated with thanksgiving and prayer and exercises designed to perpetuate peace through good will and mutual understanding between nations; and

Whereas the legislatures of twenty-seven of our States have already declared November 11 to be a legal holiday: Therefore be it Resolved by the Senate (the House of Representatives that the concurring), President of the United States is requested to issue a proclamation calling upon the officials to display the flag of the United States on all Government buildings on November 11 and inviting the people of the United States to observe the day in schools and churches, or other suitable places, with appropriate ceremonies of friendly relations with all other peoples.

An Act (52 Stat. 351; 5 U. S. Code, Sec. 87a) approved May 13, 1938, made the 11th of November in each year a legal holiday—a day to be dedicated to the cause of world peace and to be thereafter celebrated and known as "Armistice Day." Armistice Day was primarily a day set aside to honor veterans of World War I, but in 1954, after World War II had required the greatest mobilization of soldiers, sailors, Marines and airmen in the Nation's history; after American forces had fought aggression in Korea, the 83rd Congress, at the urging of the veterans service amended organizations, the Act of 1938 by striking out the word "Armistice" and inserting in its place the word "Veterans." With the approval of this legislation (Public Law 380) on June 1, 1954, November 11th became a day to honor American veterans of all wars.

Later that same year, on October 8th, President Dwight D. Eisenhower issued the first "Veterans Day Proclamation" which stated: "In order to insure proper and widespread observance of this anniversary, all veterans, all veterans' organizations, and the entire citizenry will wish to join hands in the common purpose. Toward this end, I am designating the Administrator of Veterans'

of the thing from which it Affairs as Chairman of a Veterans Day National Committee, which shall include such other persons as the Chairman may select, and which will coordinate at the national level necessary planning for the observance. am also requesting the heads of all departments and agencies of the Executive branch of the Government to assist the National Committee in every way possible."

> On that same day, President Eisenhower sent a letter to the Honorable Harvey V. Higley, Administrator of Veterans' Affairs (VA), designating him as Chairman of the Veterans Day National Committee.

In 1958, the White House advised VA's General Counsel that the 1954 designation of the VA Administrator as Chairman of the Veterans Day National Committee applied to all subsequent VA Administrators. Since March 1989 when VA was elevated to a cabinet level department, the Secretary of Veterans Affairs has served as the committee's chairman.

The Uniform Holiday Bill (Public Law 90-363 (82 Stat. 250)) was signed on June 28, 1968, and was intended to ensure three-day weekends for Federal employees by celebrating four national holidays on Mondays: Birthday, Washington's Memorial Day, Veterans Day, and Columbus Day. It was thought that these extended weekends would encourage travel, recreational and cultural activities and stimulate greater industrial and commercial production. Many states did not agree with this decision and continued to celebrate the holidays on their original dates.

The first Veterans Day under the new law was observed with much confusion on October 25, 1971. It was quite apparent that the commemoration of this day was a matter of historic and patriotic significance to a great number of our citizens, and so on September 20th, 1975, President Gerald R. Ford signed Public Law 94-97 (89 Stat. 479), which returned the annual observance of Veterans Day to its original date of November 11, beginning in 1978. This action supported the desires of the overwhelming majority of state legislatures, all major veterans service organizations and the American people.

Veterans Day continues to be observed on November 11, regardless of what day of the week on which it falls. The restoration of the observance of Veterans Day to November 11 not only preserves the historical significance of the date, but helps focus attention on the important purpose of Veterans Day: A celebration to honor America's veterans for their patriotism, love of country, and willingness to serve and sacrifice for the common good.

the memorial route would be a hollow recognition without making travelers aware of it.

The Things They Carried Home: Preservation Project, from the Kansas Humanities Council, captured the need to recognize, preserve, honor and respect the contributions of service men and women. This initiative is to help identify resources connected to veterans from WWI to those who served in Iraq.

This project of the Solomon Valley Highway 24 Heritage Alliance has been named: World War II Veterans Memorial Highway: A Tour of Rememberance, A Corridor of Service.

Available on the Alliance's website, www.hwy24.org, you will find a downloadable tour guide to know where each monument or memorial is located.

From an old tank or a bridge to a building or sculpted monument at a veterans' cemetery, there are many ways along this tour to remember the veterans who have fought for the freedoms of our country.

Tomb of the Unknown Soldier

The Tomb of the Unknowns is the tomb where unidentified soldiers who were killed in combat are laid to rest just outside of Washington, D.C. in the Arlington National Cemetery in Virginia. The first unidentified soldier, who was killed in France, was buried there on November 11, 1921 until the completed tomb was dedicated on November 11. 1932. Two other unidentified soldiers, one who perished fighting in World War II and the other who passed away serving during the Korean War, were also buried in the tomb. A fourth unknown soldier from the Vietnam War was entombed in the site in 1984, but was later removed once DNA tests identified him as Michael Blassie. Michael Blassie was a 24-year-old Air Force pilot shot down in May 1972 and was later disinterred and reburied by his family in Missouri.

A Funny Shipboard Memory

My Dad was in the Navy during the Viet Nam War. I asked him if he had any memories he wouldn't mind sharing. This is what he sent.

I cannot help you with how I felt coming and going, as the memory is not a good one. But, if you are interested, a funny thing that happened on the USS Roosevelt out of Mayport Naval Station, FL 1968.

The ship with the Air Wing aboard has about 5000 men on board. The chow hall is open 0200 for breakfast until about 1000, then the food changes over to dinner until about 1600, then begins to shift to supper until about 2200, when mid rats of rubber dogs and hockey pucks are the only thing to eat until 0100 and the galley closes for cleanup. Then it starts all over at 0200.

Anyone can go eat anytime they are off or during regular meal times. If everyone only eats 3 meals that is 15000 a day times an 8-week trip before replenishing. We left FL well stocked with all provisions. After 4 weeks at sea doing work up and testing, ORI, we headed for Rio De Janeiro, Brazil for 3 days. The ship took on some fresh veggies, and that was all.

We set sail for the Philippines some 4+ weeks away. Now, 5000 hardworking young men can eat a lot of food with an open galley. After 8 total weeks at sea, the chow line began to turn green. Asparagus was showing up in every dish from breakfast, dinner, supper, ice cream, and even mid rats. It was cold, hot, mashed, whole, everything the cooks could dream up. After about 5 days of this the XO came on the 1-MC and apologized and explained the freezers had been mispacked and they could not get to anything else and we would just have to eat our way through it. As I recall it took about a week altogether.

The tenth fold is a tribute to father, for he, too, has given his sons and daughters for the defense of our country since they were first born.


The eleventh fold, in the

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

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

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




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
