HGS Playground Renovation Project Awarded \$2.500 Donation



Each year, the America's Farmers Grow Communities program partners with local farmers to provide grants to local GrowCommunities,



PASTOR'S WORDS

Love & Lust Pt 7

We have been going through 1Corinthians chapter 13 verses 4-7 and looking at Paul's detailed description of Agape, the selfless, godly kind of love. So far, we've learned that Agape is patient, kind, not envious, doesn't brag and is not proud or rude.

The next negative descriptor of Agape is a bit more vague than the previous six. Unlike the rest, this one is a Greek phrase instead of a single or compound word. The NIV translates these words "is not self-seeking". The KIJ says "does not seek its own", which is a more direct and literal translation, though the NIV captures the connotative meaning just as well.

This phrase encapsulates what we have been saying so far in all of these papers. Agape is not self-centered. But being self-centered is a big concept and this phrase in the Greek is a bit more specific.

Self-centeredness take hundreds of forms, but "Seeking your own" means to seek your benefit, especially when it is sought over the benefit of another. Perhaps we could use an example.

I remember a time in my younger life when I tried to supplant my own boss. I told myself I was trying to benefit the company I was working for because I felt my boss was not pulling his weight. However, after I was turned down and God began to "search my heart" (Ps 139:23), I realized that my motives were less altruistic.

I had kids to feed, bills to pay and student debt to take care of. I had become so concerned with my own needs, I stopped thinking about other people. I told myself I was "all about the greater good" but, in truth, I was "seeking my own".

Agape-love doesn't seek its own benefit, especially when that benefit will hurt someone else. Choosing or

favoring someone in order to garner their own favor later, manipulating or deceiving in order to gain a promotion instead of a coworker or making choices or saying things in a relationship in order to manipulate things

to go the way you want; these are all "seeking your own".

Agape, on the other hand, seeks the other. This can be really difficult. I will buy my wife flowers on occasion because I love her and want her to know she is loved. But there is a part of me that also wants to make her feel loved so she will love me back. We are all tempted at times to do something nice or kind to another in order to look good, get attention or garner favor. Ägape does nice things because it wants to be a blessing.

Consider your gifts to the poor or to your local church. Do you give publicly, plastering your name on it and making sure people see you? Or do you give quietly?

Now, understand, there's nothing wrong with being acknowledge for generosity or kindness, but our motives must be for the other rather than for ourselves. When we are self-less, we Agapelove. When we are selfish, we merely lust.

Jesus was the best and clearest example of this kind of love. Jesus is the Son of God, the creator of the universe and the power through which all things hold together. But He didn't consider this position as important as our eternal life (Phil 2:6-7). Rather, Paul says He "emptied Himself" in order to become a human and then be tortured to death on our behalf. Sure, He gets us in the bargain, but that's no deal. He demonstrated His Own Agape-love toward us in that while we were in the middle of our sin, He died for us (Ro 5:8).

So true love seeks the good of the one they love, even if it costs them something.


Chopped apples, a few nuts and a chopped green pepper make a most delicious salad combination; serve mayonnaise.





Patient Care Upgrades

Most hospitals in Northwest Kansas were built in the early 1950's and were constructed to care for the growing population that sought care for accidents that occurred in rural farming and ranching life. Additionally, these hospitals were constructed to create jobs for the members of the community. hospitals community formerly operated out of large homes in various communities, but as the need for patient care and job creation grew, larger facilities were built to keep up with the growing demand of needed care to members of their growing rural populations.

Sheridan County Hospital was constructed in 1952. Over the past 5 years, members of the Sheridan County Health Complex Board of Trustees have been working with an architect in trying to provide upgrades to the current county facility. Many of these upgrades are targeted to meet the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) rules and regulations that provide care to all members of the population. In addition, many of the original areas of the hospital are 50-60 years old and the infrastructure, such as plumbing and wiring, are malfunctioning and no longer up to current code with the Fire Marshal. Similarly, surfaces such as floors and wall coverings have outlived their lifespan and can no longer be properly disinfected in order to provide patient safety.

After several meetings and attempts to come to a cohesive whole on a project that would benefit the most people, the Board of Trustees voted on a small but significant project that directly involves patient care. This project that involves less than 3,000 square feet will be funded with a Kansas Department of Commerce Tax Credit award and a small USDA loan. This project has been endorsed by the County Commissioners, City Mayor, State Representative and Senator for our area, and many other dignitaries and community

This project will refurbish nine patient rooms. These rooms are the heart of the hospital and receive heavy traffic. As the three other documents on this page describe, the tax credit program is being facilitated by Julie Britton of Atwood, KS, our grant writer for Sheridan County Health Complex. Julie has served as a grant writer for Sheridan County Health Complex for over five years and has brought over \$1.2 million dollars to the facility through grants and program revenue. She has been awarded the top grant writer for the tax credit program and has agreed to take on this task for SCHC. She has worked with several other healthcare facilities, both past and present, on advancements and renovations.

The Fact form on this page explains how any donation of or above \$250 will receive a refund of 70% to the donor from the Kansas Department of Commerce. This program is a great way to self-invest in your local hospital, as well as help pay your Kansas tax obligation. You may pledge for 2018 and 2019. The hospital room project is expected to be completed by


Our project is simple, yet impactful. Currently, four patient rooms have small shared toilet rooms that are difficult to access by persons using a walker. Five rooms have small toilet rooms but are not ADA compliant and have broken-down plumbing.

All nine patient rooms will be provided with a shower room. Currently, all patients must walk through a public hallway to access a single tub room. This breaches patient privacy and infringes on the dignity of our patients. The patient area will not be expanded but will be reconfigured to allow for these upgrades. The photos posted with this article show a 1952 room and a new, upgraded room.

The fact sheet that has been included on this page talks about $\,$ other upgrades that will be added to the patient rooms. The new head walls over the beds will provide suction and oxygen, as well as docks for technology and heart monitoring units. New industrial strength flooring and wall coverings will be installed and meet infection control regulations, as well as provide the durability needed for high traffic areas.

Sheridan County Health Complex provides jobs to 160 people with an annual payroll of over \$7 million dollars to include health insurance and retirement benefits. Our hospital is the largest industry in the county.



"Sheridan County Hospital has 9 existing patient rooms. Of these rooms, 4 share small toilet rooms. 5 have small individual toilet rooms with no shower and do not meet ADA. All of the patients are required to use a common tub room for showers and baths. To use this room, the patients are required to pass through a public hallway to get to the tub room. The upcoming renovation project would add a new shower/toilet room that meets ADA standards to 4 of the existing rooms. The 5 other patient rooms would receive new larger shower/toilet rooms replacing the previously mentioned small toilet rooms. This space would be carved out from existing storage space. The project would be completed in 2 phases to accommodate the in-patient patient's needs. All of the patient rooms would receive new finishes, electrical fixtures and medical gas headwalls.'

Kansas Treasurer Commends Passage of ABLE Act 2.0


The Kansas Legislature passed HB2067, which enhances the ABLE Savings Plan. The Achieving a Better Life Experience (ABLE) program is administered by Kansas Treasurer Jake LaTurner. HB2067 allows individuals contributing allows individuals contributing to an ABLE account to receive a Kansas tax deduction, and it created some safeguards against the Medicaid clawback.
ABLE accounts can be used for a variety of disability related expenses, such as: medical care, education, community-based supports, employment training, assistive training, housing and

assistive training, housing and transportation.

"I'm excited the Legislature passed HB2067, which enhances the ABLE program and increases opportunities for individuals living with a disability," said Kansas Treasurer LaTurner.

"These individuals should have the opportunity just like any the opportunity, just like any other Kansan, to save for their future. There's no limit to what these Kansans can do."

Accounts authorized by the Kansas Legislature in 2015 and were launched by the State Treasurer's Office in January of 2017. Prior to the creation of these accounts an individual with a disability was unable to have over \$2,000 in total assets without endangering their federal disability benefits. The fishing has been picking up all over the state.




Youth Livestock Series Carcass Workshop

U.S. Trade Delegation in Beijing

U.S. Treasury Secretary Steven Mnuchin, Commerce Secretary Wilbur Ross, National Economic Council Director Larry Kudlow, trade representative Robert Lighthizer and policy adviser Peter Navarro arrived in China this week to discuss trade. Discussions have ended with both sides exchanging lists of demands. During these discussions, China announced they would actively consider information provided by U.S. firms on Beijing's anti-dumping investigation on U.S. sorghum, sources at Reuters said.

NSP Meeting with **Secretary Perdue**

National Sorghum Producers Chairman Don Bloss along with past chairman James Born and board member Kendall Hodgson met with Secretary Sonny Perdue Wednesday in Washington, D.C. During the meeting NSP and Perdue discussed the industry wide difficulties from the 178.6 percent preliminary duties from China that went into effect on

Secretary Perdue had a very open and meaningful exchange regarding industry concerns and expressed his team's goal to work with sorghum growers during this challenging time. After the meeting Secretary Perdue released the following statement on Twitter: "Chinese claim of 'dumping' of sorghum is not credible in the international grain market, which is about the freest market there is. U.S. producers are the most competitive in the world." NSP looks forward to working with Secretary Perdue to find longterm solutions during these ongoing trade disputes.

International Trade Continues for Sorghum

As trade with China remains closed, other countries continue to take sorghum shipments. Saudi Arabia, Morocco, Spain, Japan, Vietnam and the Philippines have all taken sorghum shipments. Columbia, South Africa and Taiwan have also committed to purchase.

RFS Meeting Set for Next Week

President Trump and Senators Chuck Grassley (R-IA), Joni Ernst (R-IA), Ted Cruz (R-TX) and Pat Toomey (R-PA) will meet next week to discuss the Renewable Fuel Standard. This will be the seventh, and potentially last, meeting on U.S. biofuel policy.

NAFTA Deal Coming Soon

NAFTA negotiations have significant progress. However, the three countries have vet to come to an agreement on some of the more controversial topics like auto rules of origin, U.S. dairy market access and the U.S. proposal to include a sunset clause. U.S. Trade Representative Robert Lighthizer said he wants to see a deal in the next couple weeks. Lighthizer will be meeting with his Mexican counterpart to continue negotiations.

Crop Update

By April 29, 26 percent of this year's sorghum crop was planted, one percentage point behind last year and even with the 5-year average. Planting was most active in Arkansas, where progress advanced 16 percentage points during the week to reach 25 percent. Texas reached 81 percent, Louisiana 45 percent and Oklahoma reached 13 percent.

Kansas Crop Progress and Condition

For the week ending May 6, 2018, there were 5.0 days suitable for fieldwork, according to the USDA's National Agricultural Statistics Service. Topsoil moisture supplies rated 24 percent very short, 29 short, 45 adequate, and 2 surplus. Subsoil moisture supplies rated 24 percent very short, 37 short, 39

adequate, and 0 surplus.

Field Crops Report: Winter wheat condition rated 16 percent very poor, 34 poor, 36 fair, 14 good, and 0 excellent. Winter wheat jointed was 74 percent, well behind 95 last year. Headed was 19 percent, well behind 57 last year and 41 for the five-year

Corn planted was 47 percent, near 44 last year and 48 average. Emerged was 18 percent, near 19 last year and 22 average.

Soybeans planted was 8 percent, near 4 last year and 5

Sorghum planted was 1 percent, equal to both last year nd average.

Cotton planted was 2 percent, near 1 last year and 3 average.
Pasture and Range Report:

Pasture and range conditions rated 9 percent very poor, 21 poor, 45 fair,

25 good, and 0 excellent. Data for this release were provided at the county level by USDA Farm Service Agency, KSU Extension Service, and other reporters across the State.

Farm Bureau Part cultural icon and part invasive nuisance, tumbleweeds have an intriguing and tangled history. You know, tumbleweeds -- those twisted balls of dead foliage rolling across the open range and roads.

If you're driving any distance this spring, you'll see them rolling across the highways. Traveling on Highway 24 last weekend I nailed a two-footer while bumping a few others out of my path.

Tumbleweeds first gained

notoriety when the Sons of the Pioneers romanticized in song back in the late '30s. I remember seeing my first ones in the early '50s. In the early spring, summer and fall when winds howled across roads in my native Sheridan County, tumbleweeds raced across the flatland. Incidentally, I recall singing along with the Pioneers and I still remember the song

This plant is as much a symbol of the old Wild West as Wyatt Earp, cattle rustlers, the coyote and the rattlesnake. The image of the lonely rider and the ghostly shape of the tumbleweed bounding in silence across the endless plains has inspired a certain misty-eyed nostalgia even in folks who have never

journeyed west of Kansas City except to travel through our state to ski in Colorado.

In truth, this weed is a blasted nuisance. Even its Latin name (Salsola pestifer) identifies it as a menace.

The tumbleweed is also known as the Russian thistle. This plant was brought to the continent in the 1870s as a contaminant in shipments of flax seed imported to western Canada. By the turn of the century, the weed had a foothold from coast to coast.

The tumbleweed can survive and grow almost anywhere. It remains one of the hardiest plants in the United States. Unfortunately, no one has found a good use for this thorny weed.

The tumbleweed can cause problems for farmers and ranchers. This nuisance weed clogs irrigation ditches, catches

and accumulates litter, disrupts traffic, causes fires, poses a health threat to some livestock and even breaks down fences on windy days. In Kansas and other western

states, thousands of man hours are spent each year clearing tumbleweeds from irrigation ditches and railroad tracks. In the spring the weeds are fought with herbicides and in the fall the dried plants are sometimes

Fighting tumbleweeds is a constant battle. Nearly every

breezy day they bound across the prairie and every spring they sprout by the millions.

Although tumbleweeds have been in this country for nearly 150 years, no one has found a reason to cultivate this plant. One thing is certain; this nuisance weed is here to stay unless our plant scientists can find a use or method to eradicate tumbling, tumbling tumbleweed.



Commission Minutes 4/30/2018

Now on this 30th day of April 2018, the Board of Commissioners, Sheridan County, Kansas met in regular session with Chairman Vic Bielser presiding. Others present were Joe Bainter, Troy Dewey and County Clerk Heather Bracht.

The meeting was called to

order by Bielser.

Brian Baalman entered ne meeting. Baalman talked about economics and spending of tax dollars, specifically how it pertains to county roads. He discussed the neighboring counties' roads and some roads outside of Kansas. Baalman stated that roads around his home are in trouble and need some work. Baalman talked about some road work that has occurred in the Selden area and how nice it looks, could some of this work be done on the more high-traffic areas. Road 40S heading to Grinnell is a good candidate for millings. The board advised Baalman they will talk with Paulette Feldt to try and come up with a plan.

County Attorney Joe Pratt entered the meeting as well as Barry Quanz, Noxious Weed Supervisor. Quanz asked Pratt if he could send out a collection letter to someone who has not paid for a chemical they obtained from the weed department. The board asked Quanz to get bids for prices for doors at the noxious weed shop. Quanz exited the meeting. Pratt advised he had been in contact with an AT & T representative about the phone lines that are not buried in areas where the road & bridge department are working. Pratt stated that someone should have been in contact with Feldt. Pratt is working on the resolution pertaining to banning ag plastics from the landfill and wanted to clarify why. The board stated that the ag plastic does not break down.

Bainter advised the board that NWLEPG was having a meeting tonight specific to some issues they are having. Bracht presented the Loss Prevention Visit report from KWORCC, which needed to be reviewed and signed off by the board. There were two deficiencies discovered at the road and bridge shop that have already been taken care of so the board and Feldt both signed the documents, which will be submitted back to KWORCC for their records. The Twin Creek agent reports were passed around for review.

Bainter made a motion to approve the April 23, 2018 minutes as presented. Bielser seconded the motion. Carried

The warrants approved on a motion by Dewey and second from Bainter. Carried 3-0.

Bracht discussed with the board some changes to the handbook, specifically about FMLA wording and adding information as it pertains to new employees' orientation period". Dewey made a motion to approve the changes, effective April 30, 2018. Bielser seconded the motion. Carried 3-0.

Paulette Feldt, Road & Bridge Supervisor entered the meeting. Prior week's work maps were distributed. Feldt advised the new forklift has been delivered but came with used propane tanks. She has a call in about this but has not heard a response. Feldt will contact KWORCC about forklift training. The floor at the recycling center has been completed.
