

is describing. Bob: "I think he was in the Ephesians. I don't remember what it was about exactly, but I do know I felt so much

better when I left." At this point is was when memories of my high school pep rally started popping into my brain. The singers took the place of the cheerleaders, the trombones and tubas of the marching band replaced by guitars and keyboards, and the Pastor took coaches position in delivering an enthusiastic speech.

Sue spoke up, "That's exactly why I don't go the church anymore. My life was falling apart. My husband left me, my brother died, and mom was diagnosed with cancer all within a month, and all I got out of church was a bunch of singing and the preacher telling me God loves me. I can listen to music on the radio in my car; and if God loves me so much, why didn't he give that preacher something to say that could help me? Knowing God loves me is one thing, but when you love someone you should help them, and I did not get that at church. I did not want to walk out feeling good about things; I wanted my life to change.

All of this, my high school pep rallies, Bob, Sue; bring me to a question - what does God want people to get out of church? From the conversation above it appears Bob was satisfied with leaving feeling better than he walked in, while Sue was looking for something much substantial. People expect different things; but what does God expect? Ephesians 4:11-12 tells us God supplies Christian leaders, "For the perfecting of the saints, for the work of the ministry, for the edifying of the body of Christ."

Perfecting and edifying imply growth. If we apply the old saying "practice makes perfect" to that verse,

we could conclude that the church and especially its ministers, should help people practice Christianity.

Edify, means to build up,

which is entirely different from making one feel better. To edify, we must teach and train. Teaching is learning, and training is when you take what someone has learned and help them put it into practical use. For example, someone may be taught the fundamentals of carpentry, how to measure, how to saw a board, how to hammer a nail. Training is now taking what they have learned, the fundamental skills, and showing them how to use those skills to build a chair. A church should teach the fundamentals of the Christian life, then train people on how

to put it to practical use. There is more, much more, but I only have space to look at one. God does want to change lives. He tells Timothy he wants his minister to "strive not about words to no profit, but to the subverting of the hearers" (2 Timothy 2:14). Subverting is to overthrow. God wants to be the King of your life. God desires that you give up control of your life and give Him the reigns; as Romans 12: puts it, "a living sacrifice." Words that will overthrow the heart and cause real change in a person's life will almost always include some stomping of toes (2 Samuel 12:1-13).

COST-SHARE SIGN-UP

The Sheridan County Conservation District will be holding a cost share sign-up from June 4 - June 14, for the Water Resource and Non-Point Source Cost Share Programs funded by the Kansas State Water Plan. Some of the conservation practices funded through the programs include: livestock pipelines, wells and tanks, Solar Pumping Plant, terraces, and diversions. This application process is competitive and typically there has been more demand funding can cover. The Non-Point Source Pollution Control Program offers cost-share assistance for practices such as failed on-site waste septic systems, plugging abandoned wells, and livestock waste systems. Funding for this program comes from the Kansas Water Plan under the Non-Point Source Pollution Program.

The application process may include a field visit or inspection. Cost share cannot be issued for practices started or completed prior to having a signed contract. Check with the Sheridan Co. Conservation District office to see if there is cost share assistance available for your project and to fill out an application. Funds will be available July 10, 2018.

PASTOR'S WORDS

Love & Lust Pt 11

have been through 1Corinthians chapter 13 verses 4-7 and looking at Paul's detailed description of Agape, the selfless, godly kind of love. So far, we've learned that Agape is patient, kind, not envious, doesn't brag, is not proud or rude. It also does not seek its own benefit, is not easily angered, doesn't keep a record of wrongs and won't rejoice in evil but rejoice in the

Our final phrase is a collection of phrases used in a literary device of repetition. Paul says that love protects, trusts, hopes and perseveres all things. Let's look at each of these individually first.

The first word, "protects" has, as its root, the word for roof or covering. But the actual word means to hide. The idea here is that Agape covers over the sins of our past. It goes along with the phrase "keeps no record of wrongs". Some things do need to be brought to light (delight in the truth) but some things do not. Some things should just be forgiven and forgotten.

The second word, "trusts" is the word "Pisteuo" which is the word for "believe, faith or faithful". Now, Paul isn't saying we should believe everything, nor should we trust everything. Probably a better way to translate it to English would be "always believes" or "is always faithful". Love never stops believing in the object of

The third is "hope". In English, hope can mean wishful thinking. The Greek word is far more confident. It is very similar to "Pisteuo". However, while Pisteuo is more of a "leaning on" kind of trust, hope is the confident and expectant desire. Basically, Agape never gives up.

The final word is "persevere". This is a great compound word that literally means "to remain under". The image this word conjures is one of a heavy load that the person simply keeps holding up. Agape doesn't quit when things get heavy. When people let you down, Agape

says, "he's not heavy, he's my

As you can see, Agape-love is very self-sacrificing. It's no wonder the KJV writers translated it into "charity", instead of love. When we live a life that is about other people, we are actually set free from the tyranny of self. We train our minds and bodies to wait, to serve others and to obey our will. That means you will have greater control over your impulses, drives and temptations. Anyone who has struggled with these can attest

how powerful they are. I probably should mention that this list is not exhaustive. Paul is writing to a church in history with some very specific problems. The total context of these few verses was about how the church at Corinth was behaving selfishly even in their church services and the use of the gifts of the Spirit. It makes sense, then, that Paul's descriptors were all selfless attributes.

And, I should remind everyone that "love" is a messy word. We are not just talking about romantic relationships. The attributes of Agape are for everyone. I am commanded to Agape-love my enemies, not just my wife. True, I need to have these attributes when dealing with my wife and family, but also with my church members, my coworkers, my civic officials, my neighbors and those who live afar off.

Finally, I want to explain why. Why is it so important that we take on these qualities as followers of Jesus? The best answer is: because God is like this. As God's adopted children, I'm instructed to "behave in a manner worthy" of that title. But that's not all the story.

God wants me to be loving because it's good for me and it's good for others. Agapelove directs the flow of my life toward blessings, true joy, pure and fulfilling relationships, freedom from bondage to sin, temptation and offense and a character of true peace.

Being a person of Agapelove is difficult. It will take a lot of work and it will cost you a great deal. Just remember that it is worth it.




two cupfuls of honey and a pint of thin cream frozen, is one worth trying. A little of the finely grated rind may be added, if liked, to vary the

Protect Yourself from the Sun

The next time you take a few minutes out of the sun, dust off one of those old family albums. You know the ones that date back to the '30s, '40s and even the late '50s.

If your family farmed, you'll see photos of your relatives attired in wide-brimmed hats. Look at their shirts. They wore loose-fitting, long-sleeved, lightcolored garments.

Now fast-forward to the photographs of the mid - '60s. Clothing styles changed. You don't see too many longsleeved shirts any longer. Broad-brimmed hats have been replaced with baseball caps proclaiming seed, feed, tractors, and organizations - just about any company logo under the

Today's farmer no longer the clothing yesteryear - clothing that afforded protection from the harmful ultra-violet rays. Instead he or she wears a smaller, softer, snug-fitting cap that will not blow off and bump into machinery. Farmers prefer their hats to be inexpensive or free, and they like them colorful.

While the ball cap is comfortable and affordable, it does not protect the temples, the tender, delicate ear tips and the back of the neck. The baseball cap doesn't extend far enough to offer protection needed to guard against the sun.

Health specialists in the agricultural field have been tracking skin cancer and the sun's harmful impact on farmers and other segments of society since 1983. While reports of deaths from skin cancer remains small, the number of tumors has increased significantly according to family physicians that treat farmers in

rural communities. Ultra-violet rays are one of the leading causes of cancer on farms today, researchers say. But with early diagnosis, treatment is possible. Farmers and ranchers should insist on inspection for skin cancer as part of their regular check-up.

Without protective measures, sun will eventually result in skin cancer. Dermatologists recommend that anyone working or playing in the sunshine protect their skin completely by wearing clothing and a wide-brimmed hat.

The American Cancer Society will tell you there is a skin cancer epidemic. The number of cases is rising faster than any other tumor being studied today.

One reason skin cancer may be on the rise is due to more leisure time and more exposure to the sun. If anyone wanted evidence of this, they need only look at the thousands who attend the "Country Stampede" in Manhattan in late June. Ball caps, shirtless guys and gals wearing two-piece bathing suits parade everywhere.

How can we stem the tide? Youngsters and young adults must be aware of possible skin cancer. If they learn about the sun's dangerous rays at an early age and practice prevention, skin cancer can be avoided in later years.

Farmers, ranchers - just about anyone who works or plays in the sun should avoid direct exposure during the midday sun. This period is roughly from 10 a.m. until about 4 p.m. in the Midwest.

If you can't wear a widebrimmed hat and protective clothing, apply at least a Number 30 sun protective lotion. Today's farmers and ranchers would be well-advised to take a page out of their family albums - to return to those days of floppy, wide-brimmed straw hats and long-sleeved, baggie cotton shirts.

Who knows, maybe they could start a new fashion craze as well as protect their skin from

Kansas Crop Progress and Condition

For the week ending June 3, 2018, there were 4.5 days suitable for fieldwork, according to the USDA's Agricultural National Statistics Service. Topsoil moisture supplies rated 13 percent very short, 25 short, 59 adequate, and 3 surplus. Subsoil moisture supplies rated 15 percent very short, 33 short, 51 adequate, and 1 surplus.

Field Crops Report: Winter wheat condition rated 16 percent very poor, 33 poor, 35 fair, 15 good, and 1 excellent. Winter wheat headed was 96 percent, near 99 last year and 97 for the five-year average. Coloring was 48 percent, behind 59 last year, but ahead of 43 average. Mature was 3 percent.

Corn condition rated 1 percent very poor, 5 poor, 36 fair, 48 good, and 10 excellent. Corn planted was 97 percent, ahead of 89 last year, and near 94 average. Emerged was 90 percent, ahead of 4 last year and 80 average.

Soybean condition rated 1 percent very poor, 5 poor, 37 fair, 52 good, and 5 excellent. Soybeans

planted was 79 percent, well ahead of 56 last year and 50 average. Emerged was 61 percent, well ahead of 37 last year and 31 average.
Sorghum planted was 36

percent, ahead of 23 last year and 28 average.

Cotton condition rated 0 percent very poor, 0 poor, 34 fair, 64 good, and 2 excellent. Cotton planted was 77 percent, ahead of 59 last year, and well ahead of 48 average.

Sunflowers planted was 36 percent, ahead of 17 last year and 18 average.

Pasture and Range Report: Pasture and range conditions rated 6 percent very poor, 18 poor, 44 fair, 30 good, and 2 excellent.

Reminder: Human Trafficking Awareness Training Requirement for CDL Holders Starts July 1

In less than one month, people who apply for a new or renewed commercial driver's license (CDL) in Kansas must have completed training in human trafficking awareness before receiving their license, Attorney General Derek Schmidt reminded drivers today.

The new legal requirement was enacted by the Legislature last year and becomes effective July 1. The approved online training, which takes about 30 minutes, may be completed in advance rather than waiting to take it at the driver's license office. It consists of watching a short video and answering a series of questions.

"The purpose of this online training is to help save lives of people, particularly children, trafficked and exploited along along our streets and highways," Schmidt said. To complete the training

before going to the driver's license office: TRAINED

ONLINE: Complete the online training from any device connected to the Internet and capable of printing a certificate

of completion. The approved curriculum can be accessed on the Truckers Against Trafficking website at http://education. truckersagainsttrafficking.org.
• PRINT THE PROOF:

Print a hard copy of the certificate of completion.

TAKE WITH YOU: Take the printed certificate with you to the driver's license office when going to obtain your CDL.

For those who do not choose to complete the training in advance, the Kansas Department of Revenue will make it available online at all 39 driver's license offices across the state beginning

July 1.
Starting July 1, all new CDL applicants will be required to complete the training before receiving their license. Current CDL holders must complete the training before the next regular renewal of their licenses. The training must be completed only once, not each time a license is renewed, so it would be advisable to keep proof of completion in a driver's permanent files.

Tariffs Announced for Canada, Mexico and European Unioñ

On Thursday, President Trump announced a 25 percent tariff on steel and 10 percent tax on aluminum from Canada, Mexico and the European Union. Today Mexico has announced retaliatory measures heavily marked with agriculture products, including pork legs and shoulders, sausages and food preparations, apples, grapes, blueberries and various cheeses. Canada is also preparing a list for tariffs that will likely include multiple food and agriculture products. These actions related to trade raise multiple concerns for producers across the United States. Government officials at the United State Department of Agriculture and U.S. Commerce Secretary Wilbur Ross have echoed the Trump Administration's support in helping farmers affected by the countermeasures.




Dates Tentatively Set for Senate Farm Bill

Senate Ag Committee Chairman Pat Roberts (R-KS) announced several projected dates for the Senate farm bill during a visit to his home state this week. Chairman Roberts said the farm bill could be introduced on June 6 and be on the Senate floor as early as June 12. Moving forward, the projected dates for the farm bill are tentative, but there should be progress made this month.

Chairman Roberts also noted that the Senate version will not contain any major changes to the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program. He stands firmly with his decision to be inclusive to all commodities. He will not allow any bias proposals, including S. 2749 (115) which was introduced by Senators John Thune (R-SD) and Sherrod Brown (D-OH). The Thune-Brown bill proposed regulations that would highly favor Midwest growers in the Agriculture Coverage program. Coupled with the dismissal of the Thune-Brown bill, Chairman Roberts stated, "there isn't any commodity here that is going to be hurt by the Senate bill.
