Hoxie Lady Indians headed to WaKeeney last week for the Purple and Gold Tournament. This was the first year they have participated in this event. The tournament was played in an almost empty gym, as no spectators were allowed. Masks were required for everyone except for the players on the court.

Monday, December 7, the Lady Indians battled against the Ness City Eagles winning the contest Hoxie 38 - Ness City 23. Leading the Lady Indians in scoring was Paiton Rogers and Lauren Spillman with 9 points each, following was Baylee McKenna with 7, Hayley Jacobs with 6, Josey Kennedy with 4, and Morgan Keith with 3.

On Thursday, December 10, the Lady Indians headed back to WaKeeney to play against the Oakley Lady Plainsmen in a semi-final matchup. The Lady Indians once again came out on top with the score being Hoxie 41- Oakley 33. This put the #1 ranked Indians in the championship match. Leading the Indians in buckets was Baylee McKenna with 11 points, followed close by Hayley Jacobs with 10, Lauren Spillman and Kinley Rogers each had 6, Paiton Rogers with 5, Josey Kennedy with 2, and Morgan Keith with 1.

Saturday, December 12, the Lady Indians played for first place against the Trego Lady Eagles. The Lady Eagles proved to be too much for the Lady Indians, with the final score of Hoxie 31 -Trego 53. This put the Hoxie Lady Indians in second place for the Purple and Gold Tournament. Top scorer for Hoxie was Paiton Rogers with 13 buckets, followed by Lauren Spillman with 10, Baylee McKenna with 4, Hayley Jacobs with 2, and Josey Kennedy and Kinley Rogers with 1





guess who burst out laughing next? Well, that did it for Miss Karnes. At nearly 6-foot tall and sturdy, she asked the boy to stop reading. Looking straight at me, she

the boy sitting to my right

to read, he butchered every

other word. The boy to my

left started giggling. And

belted out, "Donny Follis." I froze. From her booming she said, "Do not ever, ever (greatly emphasizing "ever") make fun of someone who is trying his best to read." She paused and looked at me before asking, "Do you understand me?"

Sitting in my car outside the school last summer, Miss Karnes' voice came pounding back into my memory. A simple "yes" squeaked from my voice that December morning." Last summer while I looked at the school building, I thought of what I might have said. "Miss Karnes, I am sorry for giggling. I was not making fun of his reading. Two of us here on the back were ornery 9-year-olds. Please forgive me. It won't happen again."

I imagined me turning to the boy to my right and saying, "I'm so sorry I giggled. Will you please forgive me?"

But of course, what 9-yearold would think to say those words with a teacher breathing fire down his neck? In fact, the little red-headed Frostythe-Snowman named Donny Follis completely melted.

Fortunately, the class broke for lunch. As we cleared our trays and headed out for recess, Miss Karnes grabbed my arm. "Say there, Mr. Follis. I need a little help. What do you say that you and I go pick out a Christmas tree for the class during recess?"

I was bewildered and scared but compliant. The next thing I knew, Miss Karnes and I were standing outside Getz's IGA looking through the green pine trees standing against the outside wall of the store.

Karnes exceptionally soft spoken and gentle. But even my 9-year-old self-wondered if it wouldn't have been better if she had asked both the poor reader and me to go together with her. I picked out a tree. We loaded it in her car and were soon hauling up to the classroom.

Late that December, my dad got transferred to a new town and we moved in early January. I never saw Miss Karnes again. When I looked her up last summer, I discovered that she taught school for nearly 40 years, never married and was retired for many years before her death in 2003.

Was my giggling wrong? Of course. Was Miss Karnes' response too severe? It was. I said I was not the first to giggle. But memory is notoriously faulty. Maybe I did giggle first. As I returned from Kansas to my home in Illinois last summer, I started thinking about "total depravity, a phrase first used by Protestant reformation-era theologians in the 16th century. I kept pondering these words from the prophet Jeremiah: "The heart is deceitful beyond all things and beyond cure. Who can understand it?'

While I was raised out on the High Plains to believe that all people generally are good - you do right by people; they will do right by you - when I grew up, I came to believe, as total depravity teaches, and as David writes in Psalm 51, "I was born in sin and in sin did my mother give me birth."

I no longer see people as humans who are good but occasionally mess up. Rather, I view people as broken but with God's help are still able to do good deeds. But even our actions never are entirely good. Therefore, it should come as no surprise to any of us to feel that so many of our endeavors are tinged with impure motives. Not only is it hard to love everyone we meet, it is impossible to untangle our individual lives from systems of injustice that surround us.

So, if Miss Karnes comes at you in the days before Christmas, don't be surprised. And if you start giggling at someone's misfortune, well, you might remember that every human heart is deceitful. And now you know why this is one of my Christmas prayers this year: "Create in me a pure heart, O God, and renew a steadfast spirit within me.'

Sheridan County to Receive Grant

Tuesday, December 15, Governor Laura Kelly announced Sheridan County has been selected to receive funding as part of the Kansas Local Bridge Improvement Program (KLBIP).

Governor Laura Kelly and Kansas Department of Transportation Secretary Julie Lorenz announced the selection as part of the state-local partnership program that is part of the IKE transportation program. This year's selections include 27 counties and

three cities who will receive a combined total of \$5.1 million. "Congratulations to Sheridan County for submitting a successful application and securing local matching funds for a bridge project that is critical to the community's success," Governor Laura Kelly said. "Improving the overall transportation system across our state is integral to our economic recovery, and an important step forward as we work to invest in and rebuild our state's

The funds will be used for the replacement of the bridge located approximately 13.5 miles south and 5 miles east of Hoxie on 140 S Road. The county also received funding to permanently close and remove an additional bridge located on S Road 40 E located southeast of Hoxie.

Sheridan County Commissioner Wes Bainter said the award is a "big deal" for the county. "We appreciate we can work with the state and the state can work with us," Bainter said. "It would have been difficult to complete these projects with the help of

KDOT reinstated this bridge program in 2019 to assist cities and counties by providing up to \$150,000 toward the replacement or rehabilitation of a bridge on the local roadway system. For this recent round of KLBIP selections, a total of 68 applications from 61 local public agencies were received with requests for \$11.4 million in funds. The total value of the individual bridge replacement costs ranged from \$150,000 to \$2.4 million.

"We welcome opportunities to partner with Kansas cities and counties to replace or rehabilitate deteriorating bridges," said Secretary Julie Lorenz, Kansas Department of Transportation. "This program allows KDOT to help communities move forward with projects that keep critical local roadways open and viable."

The KLBIP targets bridges 20-50 feet in length and with a daily vehicle count of less than 100. Of the nearly 25,000 total bridges on the roadway system - approximately 19,000 of them owned by local entities - over 5,700 have ratings or characteristics that make them eligible for replacement under this program.

Gift of Tradition

By Greg Doering, Kansas Farm Bureau As Christmas draws closer, I can't help but think of the many holiday traditions my family has generally followed over the years. Some are strange, some are widely shared, but they're all unique markers of how we spend our time together marking the birth of Christ.

Perhaps the most fleeting tradition was when my brother and I were younger, and our parents would affix bells to our bedroom doors on Christmas Eve. It was an early-warning system for Santa to scramble back up the chimney, or at least alert my parents that someone was trying to sneak a peek into their stockings or get a glimpse of any new presents under the tree.

Another staple of Christmas was always finding the right red cedar in some forgotten corner of a pasture, where it had escaped fire just long enough to be cut down, hauled home and adorned with ornaments. In addition to adding a festive fragrance, it was always the center of attention on Christmas morning with a bounty of gifts beneath its branches.

Of course, the tree hunt itself was a tradition prone to the occasional hiccup, like the time we got stuck before finding the perfect tree. I was young enough I don't remember all the particulars of exactly how we got stuck, I just know the winch on my father's Toyota FJ40 wasn't enough to break us free.

We sat there for what seem like hours as he walked to my grandparents' house to fetch my grandfather and a tractor. He might have been gone all of 30 minutes before returning with his head a little lower. My grandfather, however, was grinning ear to ear knowing the story would become fodder around the dinner table for years

Stories weren't the only traditions around the table either. Every Christmas Eve featured shrimp cocktail for dinner, a legacy from my mother's family. The next night, prime rib was the ritual delicacy.

I know most of these customs are shared widely, with the exception of the shrimp cocktail, and I recognize how fortunate I am to have a family with the time and resources to devote to such endeavors. As a kid, I equated Christmas with gift-giving because that's what kids do.

Now that I'm older and have a family of my own, I've come to treasure not the gifts themselves, rather the time together they represent. I've forgotten most of the toys, clothes and other tokens I've received over the years, save for a smattering of sentimental gifts. While gift giving is still a central tradition, I'm more interested in seeing the

Safety Considerations for Gifts of Home-Canned Foods

Home-canned foods are thoughtful gifts during the holidays or anytime. But how do you know if the food product you received as a gift is safe to eat? Use these tips based on National Center for Home Food Preservation guidelines to evaluate the safety of home-canned gifts.

• Fruit jams and jellies and whole fruits like peaches and pears are low risk because their natural acidity and high sugar content provide an extra measure of safety.

• Low-acid meats, vegetables and mixtures pose a higher risk, because, if improperly processed, they can support the growth of the botulism bacteria. These products must be prepared following tested recipes in a pressure canner.

• Mixtures of acidic and low-acid foods — such as salsas and some pickled products — are also a potential risk for botulism if they are not properly processed. Jar size is important to home-canned food safety, as well. For example, while you can safely can salsa in pint jars, you won't find any tested recipes for safely canning salsa in quart jars. • Not everything that is made commercially can be safely canned at home. For example, there are no tested procedures for home canning the following

Pumpkin butter or other vegetable-based butters

· Cream soups

· Hot fudge sauce

· Canned breads and cakes · Herbs or vegetables in oil

· Gifts canned in decorative untested jars

A sealed lid doesn't mean a product is safe. It is best when the gift giver uses recommended recipes, procedures and equipment. Ask a few kind questions, if necessary. Be gracious and thankful for the gift, but if there is any doubt about a product's safety - throw it out.

Wheat Scoop: Not Quite the Kitchen Sink

Kansas Yield-Enhancing Strategies Project Identifies Best Management Practices to Close the Bushel Gap and Maintain

The gap between published potential yields and how many bushels go in the hopper is a function of environment and management. Kansas wheat farmers cannot control the weather, but K-State researchers are tackling what strategies farmers can realistically use to both maximize yield and make

"There is a huge investment in wheat breeding and genetics in Kansas, and the yield potential of those varieties is much higher than what the majority of growers are producing," said Romulo Lollato, a wheat production specialist with K-State Research and Extension. "So how do we fill that gap? That's agronomy."

Now in its sixth year, the Yield-Enhancing Kansas Strategies project – funded with support from the Kansas Wheat Commission – aims to identify which combination management practices makes the most agronomic and economic sense to improve yields and quality.

The project started in 2015 with a "kitchen sink" approach. Lollato and his team went into the literature and identified 14 different management practices – from seeding rate to fungicide treatments to nitrogen application and many more – and put them to work in the field. In three locations and over two years, researchers tested out each practice on its own and combined together in one massive management

"On one end, we had very low input," Lollato said. "On the other end, we had an extreme high input, where we essentially put everything down that could make the crop yield more. And then we had a lot of treatments in between where we tested each of those practices individually."

One result for this phase of the project was the importance of fungicide application in wet years. In the two harvests during this phase, fungicide application had a very large impact — 15 to 20 bushels per acre in yield gain — due to an increase in stripe rust in years with ample moisture and high yield potential, such as 2016 and

Researchers then took that data and expanded the project in 2017 to include four varieties. The project also shifted to layering practices up one-by-one from a low input management system all the way back up to the kitchen sink, testing out which combination of practices had the best results. One interesting finding from this phase was to see some varieties were actually well suited to low-management systems, while others were racehorses that were very responsive to more resources.

Both of these phases of the project were replicated trials, meaning they could provide clear cause-and-effect answers for the results. The next phase, however, involved learning directly from farmers how they are managing their wheat fields. A survey of 20-30 questions management distributed to farmers for them to provide input on a single field and how it was managed. The end result was a database of 700 commercial fields with complete information from planting date to final yields. This data allowed researchers to characterize how the average Kansas wheat grower is managing his or her wheat fields and identify management practices associated with higher yields in commercial fields. For instance, researchers identified the optimal sowing date for each growing region in the state and the associated yield penalty per day due to delays in sowing date.

Based on this snapshot, the researchers are now taking the most common practices back into field trials, divided

into the bottom 20 percent, average, top 20 percent and top five percent. Now the team is investigating how these different management systems will perform, as well as if they will break even or generate a

These trials are already yielding results. Stand counts show a visible difference between the management systems tested, and researchers will continue to evaluate the trials in the ground as the crop

matures next spring.

The combination of these years of work will be even better recommendations for growers to follow to capitalize on the yield potential of the excellent wheat varieties available to Kansas farmers.

"By the Kansas Wheat Commission funding agronomic research, it is getting farmer dollars invested back into the farm," Lollato said. "The type of information we are developing is really applied and gives value back to the growers by helping them better manage their crops."

2020 Farm Profitability:

Most agricultural economists and policy wonks saw this coming. USDA's September 2020 farm income projections suggested net farm income (a broad measure of farm profitability across the entire farm sector) would reach \$103 billion this year, up 23 percent from the prior year and the highest level since 2013's record high.

That was before the second \$14 billion Coronavirus Food Assistance Program and before new crop inventories began to shrink as the outlook for U.S. agricultural exports improved, i.e., China and Phase 1. Assuming those export sales are realized, USDA's December 2020 Farm Income Forecast confirmed what many expected - nominal net farm income in 2020 will reach nearly \$120 billion, up 43 percent from 2019 and the secondhighest of all time. Yet, farm cash receipts from crop and livestock sales are down \$3 billion and the lowest since 2016. A recent Market Intel update reviews USDA's most recent farm



Acreage harvest, at 195,000 acres, is up 44,000 acres from 2019 and record high if realized. Yield is forecast at 788 pounds per acre, down 102 pounds per acre from a year ago.





A memorial service will be held at a later date. Fond memories and expressions of sympathy may be shared at skradskifh@msn.com and further updates to his services will be posted.









Harm Briery

November 17, 1924 ~ December 5, 2020



Harm Lipton Briery, 96, Of Hoxie, KS died Saturday December 5, 2020 at the Sheridan County Health Complex Long Term Care Unit, Hoxie, Kansas. Harm was born on November 17, 1924 to Lester W. and Hazel C. (Crum) Briery. Harm attended Hoxie Grade School and Sheridan Community High School graduating with the class of 1942. He attended college for one year, and in the fall of 1943 Harm enlisted in the US Army. By 1944, he was on a Troop

Ship to New Guinea where he was permanently assigned to the 6th Infantry Division as a Machine Gunner. The 6th Infantry division was sent to Manila. While Harm was on a perimeter outpost in the foothills, he was wounded by the Japanese. After his recovery, he was reclassified as non-combative. He returned to the United States Christmas Eve 1945 and discharged January 1946. On October 13, 1946, in Kanarado, KS Harm married Cleo Hatten. They lived most of their lives in Hoxie where they raised a family of four children.

Harm and his father, Les, built and ran the Play, described as a good clean place where people could come in and relax and enjoy an evening of fun. The north side of the Play was a barber shop and shower room, and the south side housed a lunch counter and recreation parlor. Les and Harm were both barbers and worked out of the shop. This building, which is now the Bottle Kap Studios, is owned by Harm's great-nephew, Karl Pratt. Besides eventually owning the Play, Harm was a barber and rural mail carrier. He was one of the individuals who brought cable TV to Hoxie in the '80s, founding the cable

Harm would do most anything, but his main hobby was fishing. He was a member of American Legion, Grinnell VFW, and Hoxie Elks. Harm was a member of the Honor Flight that visited Washington, D.C. October 7-9, 2009. On Saturday, October 16, 2019 Harm was honored with a Quilt of Valor to honor his service to the United States. Above all, he loved his family very much. Harm lived a long and storied life.

Harm is survived by his children, Ronald Briery (Georgia) of Norton, Pamela Bryant (Fred) of Bellevue, WA, Debra Briery of Kerrville, TX, and Rick Briery (Diane) of Corvallis, MT; six grandchildren, and seven great-grandchildren; nieces and nephews; and friends.

He was preceded in death by his wife, Cleo; parents, Lester and Hazel Briery; brothers, Howard "Bud" Briery and Lester Dean Briery; and sisters, Helen Pratt, and Harriet Neal.


