TAXPAYERS' REPORT

I think it would be good to keep the citizens of Sheridan County informed about some of the work going on in Sheridan County. For the past couple of weeks, Leroy Spreser has been building a road at 100 North going 1 ½ miles east. This has been a nearly nonexistent road forever. However, five years ago, oil production was established 1 ½ miles east with NO good road to transport the oil out. During 2018 there were 56 days that it was impossible to get to the oil tanks to transport out the oil.

During this year, 2019, the roads were impassible for 30 additional days. This situation has been going on for the past five years with no attempt to build a road. This road is not only important to the area's farmers, but also the oil company that needs to transport the oil out to their markets on that road.

Sheridan County receives large tax revenues from this crude oil production, but only if the oil leaves Sheridan County. We are responsible to provide good roads for any and all business activity in this county and it's only in our best interest to make sure we are providing good service to all people and to all business activities within the county.

As you can see in the photos below, Leroy has created a beautiful road, and now our Road Department will haul sand and rip it into the top 8" to provide a solid top that can support all kinds of truck traffic.

There are many other examples of road improvements that are taking place. All of this improvement is the result of all of us working together for the benefit of Sheridan County and its residents.

In the coming weeks I will feature other areas of improvement to our Sheridan County roads. Throughout the history of mankind, all the good solutions to our problems have been solved by thinking outside the box. We are applying this kind of thinking to the improvement to our roads, and we are going to have good roads here in Sheridan County, and we will do produce these good roads by *working together!*

A student entrepreneurship competition featuring 56 high school and 10 collegiate teams from across Kansas has awarded entrepreneurial-minded students with \$77,000 in prize money.

The Kansas Entrepreneurship Challenge gave students experience in the process of making a

business proposal. The sixth annual event was organized by the Kansas State University Center for the Advancement of Entrepreneurship and was sponsored by the Kansas Masonic Foundation on behalf of all Kansas Masons, and supported by Network Kansas.

"I was blown away by the maturity and poise of all of the students, especially at the high school level, and was particularly impressed with the innovative ideas on display," said Rick Ryan, Executive Vice President of the Kansas Masonic Foundation. "We see this event as an opportunity for the Kansas Masons to extend our charitable mission to help young people build businesses that are going to help the state's economy and be beneficial to all Kansans."

The Kansas Entrepreneurship Challenge saw teams compete in two areas: an elevator pitch and a mock boardroom session. For the elevator pitch, competitors had two minutes to pitch their business to a panel of judges without the aid of any presentation materials. In the mock boardroom, judges reviewed each team's executive summary and had 15 minutes

Peoples State Bank has been sold to the Foote family of Kansas and Nebraska, which operates five feedlots feeding about 230,000 head in northwest Kansas and southwest Nebraska. The bank's president said it all began with a phone call from Scott Foote.

"We were not actively looking for a buyer for our bank," said Jon W. Pope, Chief Executive of Peoples State. "However, a good family friend, Scott Foote, called me one day about buying into our bank, and after further discussion, he decided that their family would like to own 100 percent of the bank."

He said they then agreed to sell.

"I felt like it was a very good option for our customers, employees and shareholders," Pope said. "I am approaching retirement age, and we were concerned about keeping the bank a community bank in the future."

He said it seems to him like all the small community banks are being consolidated into large regional banks that claim to be community banks but in reality, have little to do with the communities they serve.

"The Foote family is very active in supporting the communities that they are involved in," he

added, "and they wanted to make sure a true community bank continued to exist in their communities."

"It's a great plan for the bank," he said, "because the name will not change, nor will the culture."

"This assures that Peoples State Bank will remain Peoples State Bank," he said, "hopefully for generations."

Pope said he has agreed to stay on as president until he decides to retire.

"Our great customer service that we are known for will continue on," he said. "We are updating our computer software, with a company that is a leader in software development, which will provide new and innovative features as well as higher levels of security protection for our customers."

"We are excited for all the great products and benefits that we are going to be able to offer to our customers going forward," he said.

Scott Foote lives in Hoxie with his family. His brother Brad lives in Imperial, NE, where the family has a feed lot. Their father, Bob Foote, operates out of Bucyrus, south of Kansas City.

The family has five feedlots on the High Plains, in Hoxie, Oakley, Dighton and Oberlin in Kansas, the Imperial lot, and a trucking subsidiary, PSI Transport LLC of Hoxie, plus other interests.

Decision Tool for New Dairy Margin Coverage Program

Agriculture Secretary Sonny Perdue announced the availability of a new web-based tool – developed in partnership with the University of Wisconsin – to help dairy producers evaluate various scenarios using different coverage levels through the new Dairy Margin Coverage (DMC) program.

The 2018 farm bill authorized DMC, a voluntary risk management program that offers financial protection to dairy producers when the difference between the all milk price and the average feed cost (the margin) falls below a certain dollar amount selected by the producer. It replaces the program previously known as the Margin Protection Program for Dairy. Sign up for this USDA Farm Service Agency (FSA) program opens on June 17.

A Legacy of Friends

It was just a pen, a simple ballpoint pen, but it brought me to my knees. We were working cattle, and someone asked me if I had a pen to write down the numbers and keep notes. I rummaged through my console and at the bottom I found a single, dusty, forgotten pen. The pen is nothing spectacular. It simply had the word “Glenn” on it with a phone number.

Earlier in the week I had gotten an e-mail that my friend Jill Casten had passed away from cancer. You don’t expect someone like Jill to be gone. Even though you know it is coming, it is still a shock. She was one of the brightest stars in the Kansas Farm Bureau sky. Things had been busy, and I guess the totality hadn’t hit me until I found the pen.

Jill gave me that pen. One day in the hallway she found me and presented me with it. She explained that when she stayed at a hotel with the name of a friend, she always kept something from it to give to that friend. I remember joking with her and asked how often that happened. I asked if she had many friends by the name of Hilton or Marriot.

I also remember coming away feeling like I mattered to Jill. For her to think of me meant the world. I am sure she was busy on that trip and had many more important things to be thinking of than me. That is how most of us would have thought, but not Jill. No, Jill was always thinking of others and cultivating relationships. She had this special talent, and everyone in her life felt like they mattered.

Even then, covered in the grime of working cattle, in the middle of my dusty truck, I smiled touched again by the simple effort she made to let me know I mattered. That was why she was so effective as a leader and as a trainer. She modeled all the traits of a great leader.

I am saddened that I will never again see my friend or learn what it is to be a leader and an advocate from her. For that, I owe her a great deal. However, I am uplifted at the thought of who Jill Casten was and what I learned from her. Jill taught me to value relationships, to live in the moment, savor friends and family and to make the world around me a more welcoming place.

All of us who knew Jill experienced a great loss, and it will take time to heal that wound. We must take solace in knowing that we can live by the example she gave us. The legacy of Jill Casten will live on through the vast network of friends she collected. Godspeed my friend, until we meet again.

Kansas Crop Progress and Condition

For the week ending May 5, 2019, there were 3.3 days suitable for fieldwork, according to the USDA’s National Agricultural Statistics Service. Topsoil moisture supplies rated 0 percent very short, 6 short, 74 adequate, and 20 surplus. Subsoil moisture supplies rated 0 percent very short, 5 short, 79 adequate, and 16 surplus.

Field Crops Report: Winter wheat condition rated 2 percent very poor, 8 poor, 32 fair, 47 good, and 11 excellent. Winter wheat jointed was 80 percent, ahead of 71 last year, but behind 87 for the five-year average. Headed was 14 percent, near 17 last year, and well behind 41 average.

Corn planted was 41 percent, near 44 last year, and behind 51 average. Emerged was 16 percent, equal to last year, and behind 23 average.

Soybeans planted was 5 percent, near 7 last year and 6 average.

Sorghum planted was 1 percent, equal to both last year and average.

Cotton planted was 4 percent, near 2 last year and 3 average.

Pasture and Range Report: Pasture and range conditions rated 1 percent very poor, 3 poor, 31 fair, 52 good, and 13 excellent.

Commission Minutes 4/24/2019

Now on this 24th day of April 2019 the Board of Commissioners, Sheridan County, Kansas met in regular session with Chairman Joe Bainter presiding. Others present were Wes Bainter, Troy Dewey and County Clerk Heather Bracht. Guests were Rachel Farber and Viktorija Briggs.

Joe Bainter called the meeting to order.

Shannon Kaiser from the Hoxie Area Chamber of Commerce entered the meeting. Kaiser asked for permission to use the Courthouse lawn to show outdoor movies. By consensus, the Board approved. Kaiser exited the meeting.

Bracht stated that John Geisinger from Selden Lumber had come and taken measurements for replacement windows at the Courthouse. He asked if the Board wanted the cladding replaced on the outside of the windows, stating this is expensive and very time consuming. The Board advised no to replacing the cladding. Geisinger will get a price for the windows and once a contractor is awarded the job, he will work with them as far as exact measurements, etc. Bracht stated that Jodi Moellering had been Register of Deeds for six months and asked about a wage increase. Dewey made a motion, seconded by Joe Bainter, to approve a \$1,390 annual salary increase. Carried 3-0. The Board had received a request from Developmental Services of Northwest Kansas, Inc. (DSNWK) to approve Pat Wessel's appointment as the Sheridan County Representative to the DSNWK Board. Dewey made a motion to approve the appointment, seconded by Wes Bainter. Motion carried 3-0. Resolution No. 19-18, appointing Wessel to the DSNWK board was approved and signed. Dewey made a motion to approve the

Memorandum of Agreement between Sheridan County Communications/Sheridan County Sheriff's Office and Graham, Norton and Hodgeman Counties. Joe Bainter seconded the motion. Carried 3-0. This agreement allows these other counties to accept normal 911 calls when Sheridan County's system is down and to accept overflow 911 calls when all other lines are busy. Sheridan County would also be the point of contact for Norton County if they should need assistance.

Sheridan County Attorney Joe Pratt entered the meeting. Pratt and Noxious Weed Supervisor Barry Quanz inspected the area West of Hoxie for the prairie dogs, musk thistle and fencing. Stevenson has been retained to spray 400 acres of ground that has a musk thistle problem. Correspondence has also been sent to the landowner. Pratt stated the Gourley Excavating Agreement has not yet been signed but should be signed tomorrow. This is for the work being done at Ed Goetz's property. Pratt has been trying to reach Donald Jensen with Cosgrove, Webb & Oman Lawyers, the attorney the County has used before for general obligation bonds to discuss the possibility of bonds for a county road. Pratt stated he spoke with Jim McCormick, McCormick Excavating, about using the asphalt that will be taken off the airport runway when it is worked. The asphalt would make great millings that will not be re-used on the runway and would become city/county property.

Ross Carder, Road & Bridge Supervisor, David Bingham, Landfill Operator and Nicholas Roudybush, Mechanic, entered the meeting. Bingham advised he was ready for the Selden clean-up time. Bingham gave a brief history of recycling, how it came about and what is happening now. Bingham exited the meeting. Roudybush had a price for the impregnated piece for the Mack truck he was told to check on. It is about \$900 more expensive than the piece he ordered. Roudybush stated that the Deere grader is down and needs a circle drive gear box. Parts for the repair will be about \$6,400. Permission was given to repair. The Board advised Carder that for parts, he does not have to get prior permission before ordering but he does need to advise the Board when he meets with them next. The Board approved spending \$4,400 to overhaul the cylinders on the trailer. Roudybush stated once this is done, there is still the overall condition of the trailer and asked about instead purchasing a gently used one. The Board said just keep repairing. Carder advised the Board he had contacted Berry Tractor on multiple occasions about setting up a time they would be able to come and inspect the BoMag at the landfill. He finally spoke with someone on Monday afternoon. It will be a while before someone is able to come out. Roudybush reminded the Board that the parts are hard to find and sometimes you can get a good used one for less than rebuilding what we have. The Board still wants to fix it. When the Berry Tractor employee comes out, they will make sure that everything that needs fixed or repaired is listed.

Shirley Niermeier, Sheridan County Treasurer, entered the meeting. Niermeier gave her 1st quarter report for 2019. A Peak Deposit Agreement with First State Bank was presented for approval. Dewey moved the agreement be approved and signed, seconded by Joe Bainter. Carried 3-0. There were no further questions or comments.

Ross Carder came back to the table. Carder and Wes Bainter have had discussion about the 6/10ths of a mile road east of Selden with people in the Selden community. The Board discussed vacating it or pulling up the asphalt and working it back in to the road then covering it with gravel. Carder will check about the expense of renting a machine to grind up the asphalt. Carder presented bids for file cabinets. Bracht will check with Quill and if they can't come any cheaper, will order from Amazon as they were

low bid. Carder has created work orders for the employees to complete when they have to go out on a job. This way, there is a record of when the job was requested to be done and when it was completed. All work orders will be returned to Carder. Carder brought up for discussion utilities in the county right-of-way. Carder feels the Board needs to make it a policy that there has to be an easement, things cannot be in county right-of-way. Carder had reviewed the City of Hoxie's easement agreement for the new sewer project and stated he will be watching it. Wes Bainter made a motion to move the noxious weed department under the road & bridge department. Dewey seconded the motion. Carried 3-0. At 3:23, Dewey made a motion to enter in to executive session for a period of 5 minutes for the discussion of non-elected personnel. Joe Bainter seconded. Carried 3-0. Present were the Board, Pratt, Carder and Bracht. The door opened at 3:28 with no decision being made.

Niceta Farber, Mike O'Dell and Kevin Johnson, Clinic Director, entered the meeting. Farber presented the Contract for Sale of Real Property between Christ Community Church and Sheridan County. The cost for this land is \$50,000 which the hospital will pay. The hospital will use this land for future growth and parking. Dewey made a motion to approve the acquisition of land, seconded by Wes Bainter. Carried 3-0. The Board signed the Contract of Sale of Real Property. Farber gave a quick report on things happening in the health complex. Johnson stated the clinic is starting a renovation project which will be paid for through a grant and will run through probably October. They are continuing to recruit for a physician. They are meeting with the Selden City Council in May in hopes that they will approve opening up the clinic two days a week instead of one. The clinic really wants to be available in Selden. O'Dell gave a financial report for the first quarter. The health complex received a perfect audit with no deficiencies, everything in order. The Sheridan County Hospital revenue bond documents were presented. Dewey made the motion to approve Resolution No. 19-71 authorizing and directing the issuance, sale and delivery of \$68,000 hospital revenue bonds. Wes Bainter seconded the motion. Carried 3-0. The appropriate forms were signed by the Board. This is for the purchase of telemetry equipment. The hospital board exited the meeting.

Bracht stated she had received bids from Election Services and Adkins Election Services for two tabulating machines, as well as 3 Pollbooks and the ADA touchscreen. Dewey made a motion to approve the low bid from Election Source for the equipment. Joe Bainter seconded the motion. Carried 3-0. Bracht stated this will eliminate having to find so many workers for the day of the election, but especially for finding counting board workers in the evening.

Dewey made a motion to approve the April 17, 2019 minutes as amended, seconded by Joe Bainter. Carried 3-0.

The payroll and warrants were approved on a motion by Dewey and second by Joe Bainter. Carried 3-0.
