TAXPAYERS' REPORT

At the Commissioner's Meeting this past Monday, January 14, I was sworn in as your new Sheridan County Commissioner. I am now representing the citizens of Sheridan County and am privileged to do so. Our next meeting will be January 28, in the Commissioner's Meeting Room at the Courthouse. This week, the Commissioners talked about several items, which you can read, in detail, in the Commissioner's Minutes (in an upcoming issue of *The Sheridan Sentinel*). I will touch on some of the items that we discussed.

One subject was the question of making all the Commissioner elections "AT LARGE" positions so that all voters in Sheridan County could vote on all candidates in every election. I was asked by many voters why I wasn't on their ballot and explained that the way it is now, I was a candidate for District 1, which means that only voters in District 1 could vote in this last election. I was also asked if I was going to represent all voters in Sheridan County, to which I answered that I absolutely will represent all Sheridan County citizens. So, the rational is that, if Commissioners are all going to represent all the people of Sheridan County, then all voters should be able to vote for all Commissioner candidates in every election. I fully support this change.

We also discussed the county health insurance policy. The policy, as it is now, is a full-family policy, which means that the County employee can receive coverage for the spouse and all dependent children at no additional cost. This is a very generous policy. Most insurance policies in most companies pay the employee medical insurance and the employee can buy coverage for other family members. I am a very good example of this policy. I can receive full medical insurance coverage at NO cost to me and include my wife and all my dependent children at NO additional cost to me as your County Commissioner. I have volunteered to be your County Commissioner, and I am doing so because I want to serve the people of Sheridan County. I am not expecting Sheridan County to spend large sums of money on benefits for me or my family. I stated at my first Commissioner Meeting that I WILL NOT be receiving any health insurance coverage and I therefore, will not cost Sheridan County any money at all. In my articles you have read that I believe we are being over taxed. There are two ways to restore Sheridan County to financial health. One is to lower taxes. The other is to control spending. I am going to do my part in controlling spending. During my 4-year term, I will be saving the taxpayers of Sheridan County about \$100,000 in medical insurance costs.

Another item we discussed was the meeting time for our Commissioner's Meetings. It was decided to move the meetings to Wednesday at 2:00pm. The first meeting will be about the middle of the month, and the second will be the last Wednesday of the month, which will be our business meeting. This will make two meetings per month, approximately every other week. This will allow time to publish the Agenda in *The Sheridan Sentinel* and keep the public informed about what is going to be discussed at the next Commissioner's Meeting. If you want to come and discuss a subject with the Commissioners, call the Clerk's Office (785-675-3291) to be placed on the Agenda. We hope this new schedule will show the residents of Sheridan County that the Commissioners want to be fully transparent and want the public to know that your opinions are solicited.

The last item we discussed was the roads & bridges, and setting a community meeting with all persons interested in getting involved in working together, especially those living and working in the rural areas who depend on the county roads for their livelihood. This meeting will be held at the Bowen Scout House in Hoxie on Wednesday, February 6, at 6:00pm. Please RSVP to Bainter Construction office at 785-675-3297 to let us know if you will be attending.

After almost three weeks, Congress remains at a stalemate over funding for border security. House and Senate leadership have met twice this week with President Trump regarding the partial shutdown. Because of the partial shutdown and absence of appropriations, only essential USDA programs remain operating. USDA Agencies have developed procedures and contingency plans for use in the event of the lapse in funding.

Give & Grow Sheridan County Match Day & Match Month Results

The Sheridan County Community Foundation (SCCF) recently announced the results of the 2018 Give & Grow Sheridan County Match Day and Dane G. Hansen Foundation Match Month Challenge during a check presentation ceremony held during halftime of the Hoxie High School boys' basketball game, Friday, January 11.

More than 80 individuals/businesses donated a combined total of \$22,685.00 on match day benefitting 18 local non-profit organizations. SCCF, which originally pledged to match up to \$10,000.00 will provide full matching funds for a grand total of \$45,370.00. Fifty-percent of the match goes to the organization upon project initiation and the remaining half is placed in an endowed field-of-interest fund for future use.

The participating organizations and their respective funds raised included: Sheridan County Area Agency on Aging (\$75.00); Sheridan County Wellness Center (\$112.50); Hoxie FFA Alumni (\$150.00); Sheridan County EMS (\$375.00); Sheridan County Hospital Auxiliary (\$900.00); Sheridan County Public Library (\$1,050.00); Sheridan County Historical Society & Mickey Museum (\$1,095.00); Developmental Services of Northwest Kansas (\$1,695.00); HAMA Food Pantry (\$1,800.00); Sheridan County Amusement Company (\$1,800.00); Christ

Community Church Youth Group (\$1,867.50); All Stars for Jesus (\$2,017.50); Sheridan County Hospital (\$2,062.50); Sheridan County Benefit Walk (\$2,475.00); Hoxie Golf Club (\$2,625.00); Main Street Arts Council (\$3,030.00); City of Selden (\$3,360.00); and Hoxie Recreation (\$7,537.50).

Representatives from these organizations attended the ceremony and were presented with their first checks. They will be eligible to apply for their 50% matching funds upon submission of the matching funds request form available from the SCCF.

The 2018 Match Day event marks the fourth annual campaign of this kind, with more than \$238,000.00 raised to date.

In addition to the Match Day campaign, SCCF also participated in its third annual "Match Month" challenge sponsored by the Dane G. Hansen Foundation in which all funds up to \$50,000.00 raised locally are matched dollar-for-dollar by the Hansen Foundation. Thanks to the generosity of area community members, SCCF has met the challenge, this year raising \$57,816.11. With the matching funds from the Hansen Foundation plus an incentive bonus of \$25,000.00, the Match Month total comes to \$132,816.11.

This year's figure brings total Match Month funds raised to more than \$400,000.00 to date. These monies are placed in an

### Economical Meat Dishes

Never wash a piece of meat in water. Wipe it off with a damp cloth carefully and it is ready for cooking. For a beef stew, buy a five-pound cut from the neck. After cleansing it with a damp cloth, cut it up in two-inch cubes, season with salt and pepper and dredge with flour. Try out some of the fat in a hot frying pan and brown a third of the meat until the entire surface is seared. Put into a kettle with the rest of the meat and rinse the frying pan with boiling water, which is added to the stew. Add the bone, well broken, and cover with boiling water. Set on the back part of the range and simmer for three hours. The last hour, add a half cupful each of carrots and turnips, cut in small pieces; one-half onion, and salt and pepper to season. Cook (four cupfuls of potatoes, cut in pieces) in boiling water for five minutes; drain and add

to the stew. Remove bone and large pieces of fat and skin. Add a thickening of a half cupful of flour mixed smooth with the broth. Steam the dumplings, if dropped with a teaspoon into the kettle, for ten minutes; if larger, cook fifteen minutes.

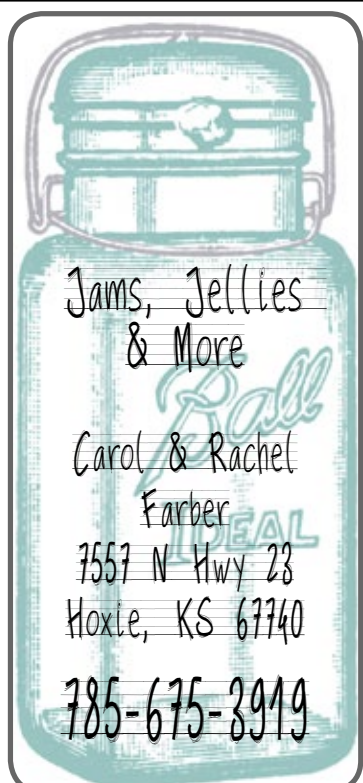
**Canadian Meat Pie** - Take one and a half pounds of round steak, wipe with a damp cloth and cut in half-inch cubes. Soak and trim three lambs' kidneys and cut in fourth-inch pieces. Try out the fat from the steak or cook a piece of suet; add one and a half peeled onions, sliced, and stir until the onions are brown. Add a tablespoonful of butter, the beef and kidneys, and brown in the frying pan. Add one and a half cupfuls of boiling water and a half teaspoonful of salt, a few dashes of pepper and one and a fourth tablespoonfuls of Worcestershire sauce; cover tightly and let cook until the meat is tender. Strain

off the liquor in the pan and thicken with one and a half tablespoonfuls of butter, mixed with two of flour. When the meat is cold place in a dish, in the center of which is an inverted cup adding half the sauce, the remainder to be served with the pie. Cover with a rich baking powder crust put on in strips.

### Savory Soups

**Veal and Sago Soup** - Take two and a half pounds of finely chopped veal, cover with three quarts of water, bring slowly to the boiling point and simmer two hours. Soak a half cupful of sago in cold water to cover for a half hour, then add to the hot stock and cook thirty minutes; add two cupfuls of rich milk and pour the soup over the well beaten yolks of three eggs. Season to taste.

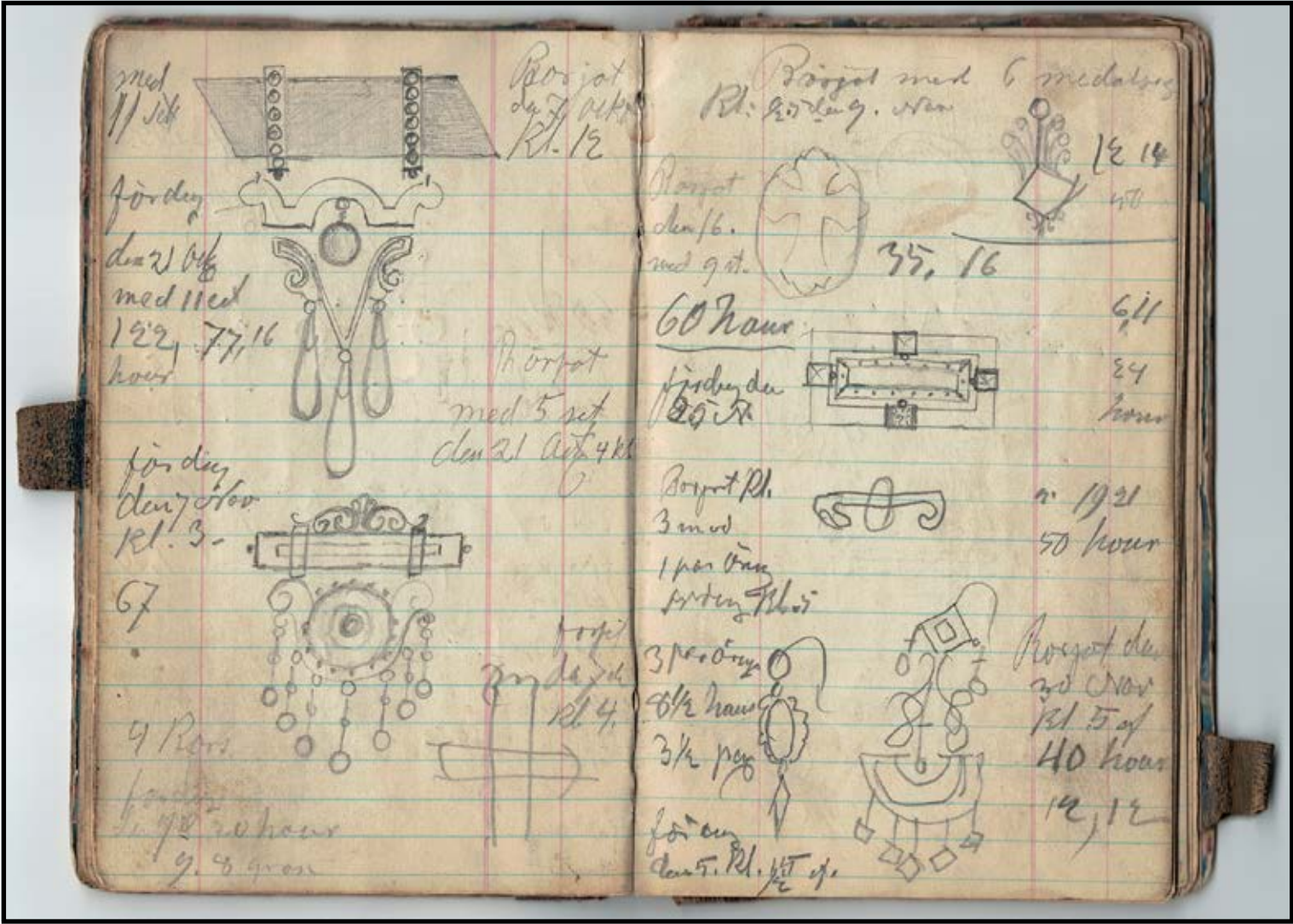
Last Saturday night a mob of about twenty determined men entered the jail at Russel, took out J. G. Burton, William Gay and his son John Gay, and hung the trio to a small railroad bridge a short distance east of the depot in that city, between the hours of 1 and 2 o'clock. The crime for which they were lynched was the killing of Fred Dinniny in July last on the Burton place, about twenty miles northeast of Russell. Inquiry regarding a draft payable to Dinniny and his mysterious disappearance led to an investigation and the arrest of Burton. When closely questioned as to the whereabouts of Dinniny, Burton said he had gone to Oklahoma with a young man named Gay. A few weeks ago Gay returned and was at once arrested. Then followed a number of confessions from all three which differed materially as to details and the location of the body, but showed conclusively that each had participated in the crime, although Burton denied all knowledge that Dinniny had been killed by the Gays. The motive for the killing of Dinniny appears to have been to obtain his property valued at \$300 or \$400. It is thought that Burton was the leader of a gang of thieves who have been stealing cattle, horses and many other things in Russell and Rooks counties for the past several years.

## Legislation to Enhance Border Security, Codify DACA Protections Introduced

*Bill Would Create \$25 Billion Border Security Trust Fund and Protect Current DACA Recipients*

WASHINGTON - U.S. Senators Jerry Moran (R-Kan.) and Rob Portman (R-Ohio) today introduced legislation that would establish a \$25 billion trust fund to enhance U.S. border security. The legislation would also codify protections for those individuals who, through no fault of their own, entered the United States illegally as children and are currently covered by the Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals (DACA) program.

"This bill returns to the basics of what a majority of my colleagues and the president support - providing the necessary resources to strengthen and modernize border security in addition to long-term certainty to DACA recipients," said Sen. Moran. "I urge my colleagues on both sides of the aisle to support this

sensible solution that provides us a realistic path forward to resolve this partial government shutdown."

"A fair and reasonable solution will put in place stronger border security measures consistent with the president's request while also codifying the protections for the DACA population," said Sen. Portman. "Those in the DACA program are here through no fault of their own, and for many, this is the only country they know. This measure represents a permanent legislative solution that will allow those in the DACA program to stay here and continue to contribute to our society while strengthening our border security to protect all Americans. I believe we have a responsibility to resolve this issue, and this legislation is a fair and responsible solution that could get the necessary votes to become law."

Items to Note:

- The trust fund that would be established by the Portman-Moran legislation would include payment for no fewer than 700 miles of reinforced fencing (excluding vehicle barriers), additional physical barriers, access and patrol roads, lighting, an interlocking surveillance camera system, remote sensors, and the purchase of surplus Department of Defense aircraft and unmanned systems.

- The legislation would codify DACA protections for only the existing population of people who are currently covered by the program, and it would preserve the current renewal process at two-year intervals.

## 116th Congress Sworn into Office

On January 3, the 116th Congress was sworn into office and began work in our nation's capitol. While there are still many familiar faces, there are quite a few new members and record-breaking numbers of women and minorities. There are 10 newly elected Senators and 101 newly elected Representatives. While the Senate maintained a Republican majority, this past election shifted power in the House to the Democratic party. The new Democratic majority has chosen Nancy Pelosi D-CA to be the Speaker of the House and committee assignments for the new members are expected soon.

RESOLUTION NO. 18-114

A RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING THE CONSTRUCTING, FURNISHING, EQUIPPING, AND REMODELING OF CERTAIN HOSPITAL FACILITIES AND RELATED APPURTENANCES; AND PROVIDING FOR THE PAYMENT OF THE COSTS THEREOF.

WHEREAS, K.S.A. 19-4616 *et seq.*, as amended (the "Act") authorizes the Board of County Commissioners (the "Board") of Sheridan County, Kansas (the "County"), to issue and sell revenue bonds for the purpose of purchasing, leasing or otherwise acquiring an existing hospital building or buildings and improving, remodeling or repairing and equipping the same, or for the purpose of constructing, equipping and furnishing an addition to an existing county hospital; and

WHEREAS, Sheridan County Hospital, a county hospital duly organized by Sheridan County, Kansas under the laws of the State of Kansas (the "Hospital"), desires to finance a portion of the costs of constructing, furnishing, equipping, and remodeling of acute care facilities and all related appurtenances in the estimated amount of \$2,500,000 (the "Project"), and to pay related expenses incurred in connection with the issuance of the revenue bonds in one or more series proposed to be issued by the County in the amount of \$2,250,000 (the "Bonds") to provide funds for the foregoing purposes with the remainder of the costs of the Project to be paid from available funds of the Hospital, all as provided by the Act; and

WHEREAS, it is hereby found and determined that it is necessary and advisable and will promote the general health and welfare of the County and its inhabitants to proceed with the Project and the offering, issuance and delivery of revenue bonds of the Hospital in an approximate amount of \$2,250,000,

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF COUNTY COMMISSIONERS OF SHERIDAN COUNTY, KANSAS:

SECTION 1. **Declaration of Necessity.** The Board hereby declares its intent to acquire, construct, furnish and equip the Project at an estimated cost of \$2,500,000.

SECTION 2. **Financing Authority.** The County intends to issue the Bonds in an approximate amount of \$2,250,000 to pay a portion of the costs of the Project and financing costs related thereto, with the balance of the Project costs to be paid from other available funds of the Hospital. The Bonds shall be limited obligations of the County payable solely from the sources and in the manner as provided in the Bond Resolution to be adopted by the County to authorize the issuance of the Bonds and prescribe the terms and conditions thereof.

SECTION 3. **Reimbursement Authority.** Bonds authorized pursuant to this Resolution may be used to reimburse project expenditures made on or after the date which is 60 days before the date of this Resolution, pursuant to Treasury Regulation 1.150-2.

SECTION 4. **Publication of Resolution of Intent.** This resolution shall be published once each week for three consecutive weeks in the official county newspaper. No Bonds will be issued until all publications have been made, as provided by the Act.

SECTION 5. **Effective Date.** This Resolution shall take effect and be in force from and after its adoption.

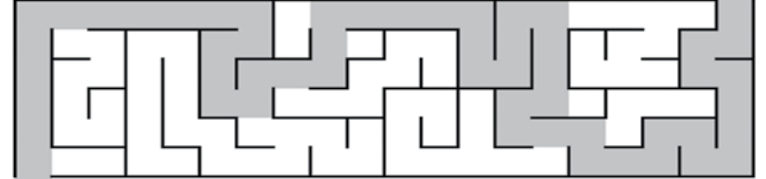

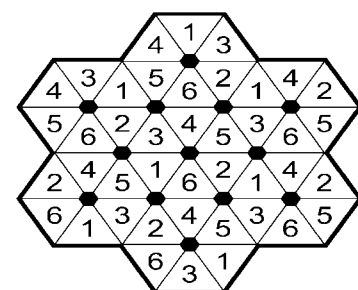
