Monday, September 25, 2017, Allison & Cole Nondorf opened their comfortably rustic but upscale wine and spirits store at 1040 3rd Street, Hoxie, just across the street from Dollar General. There is a drive-up window for fast service for those in a hurry and already know what they want. For those going inside, they're in for a pleasant surprise.

The new building's interior is decorated in a very chic

industrial décor, with an interesting variety of lighting fixtures made from everyday items, such as a fan, metal plumbing pipes, galvanized pail, and more; as well as a deep rust colored dyed concrete floor. The cashier station and the wine tasting stand, and the painted signs are made from old wood and corrugated metal roofing material, all of which were designed and built by Allison's father.

Allison's inventory is

extensive, but with plenty of room left specifically for particular item requests from customers. One cooler is designated for "Pick Your Six," which means the customer chooses six beers or wine cooler beverages for a six-pack, allowing the customer to sample different types to see which they prefer. This saves the customer the expense of buying a six-pack of one kind and finding out they don't really care for it.

There will be monthly

wine tastings, and other events during the month as well. These will also feature a food item, so the guest can experience what liquor tastes go best with what food flavors. There are also giveaways, such as a red Budweiser chaise lawn chair, extra tall coozies for tall bottle beers, and other promotional items as they arrive.

Allison is very knowledgeable in wines and spirits, and can answer any question a customer may

have. If she doesn't know the answer, she can find it. Her main focus is on the customer's 'wants,' and will cater especially to hunters and women. She will also promote local (locally and Kansas) brewed beers. A new vodka made from Milo is another locally relevant specialty item.

This is A&C Liquid Assets' Grand Opening week. The ribbon cutting Grand Opening event will be held Friday, October 6. The Come

& Go Wine Tasting will be that weekend also.

Be sure to stop in, take a look around, learn something new about the wines and beers you know, and sample a new one you've never tried before, and congratulate the Nondorf's on their new venture – an asset to the Hoxie community. Lumber has been hauled and carpenters are work on a neat residence for J. D. Rickman, one block south of the Arlington House.

Kent says he will not be undersold. He is selling lots of goods but the almost daily arrival of goods keep his store well supplied with fresh stock.

Stevens, the Buffalo Park robber that escaped from Hayes City jail a short time since, has been captured. He will probably serve the state about 20 years.

Terrill & Rooker are putting down a well for Mr. Rouse, six miles west of town. From there they go to Mr. Measel's claim, seven miles north. They are having all they can do and give perfect satisfaction in every instance.

The Ladies' Mite Society, of Grainfield, will give an oyster supper and serve other refreshments, on the evening of Oct 5th, at A. J. Ayres' new building. A cordial invitation is extended to people of Grinnell and vicinity.

The ladies of Grinnell and vicinity met Thursday last and organized a "Ladies' Aid Society." The Secretary failed to come forward with the promised minutes of the first meeting, and we are unable to give particulars. As we understand it, it is to be for the purpose of raising funds, in almost any way but begging, to help toward building a church in Grinnell. Nearly all the ladies are taking an active part, and from present appearances there is not a doubt but that it will be a grand success.

Rev. Aller preaches tomorrow evening at the Arlington Hotel. This being his first sermon for the month past it is expected that a crowd will be there to hear him. It would please us to see more of our country friends present. The evenings are pleasant and the sermons entertaining.

G. G. Lehmer, of Quinter, was up with "the boys" Tuesday. He is an aspirant for the honors of Superintendent of Public Instruction, and after a long chat with him we made up our minds that he was a fit man for the position. He has had eleven consecutive years experience in the school room.

Miss Lettie Palmer is clerking for John Woltzen at Seguin this week.

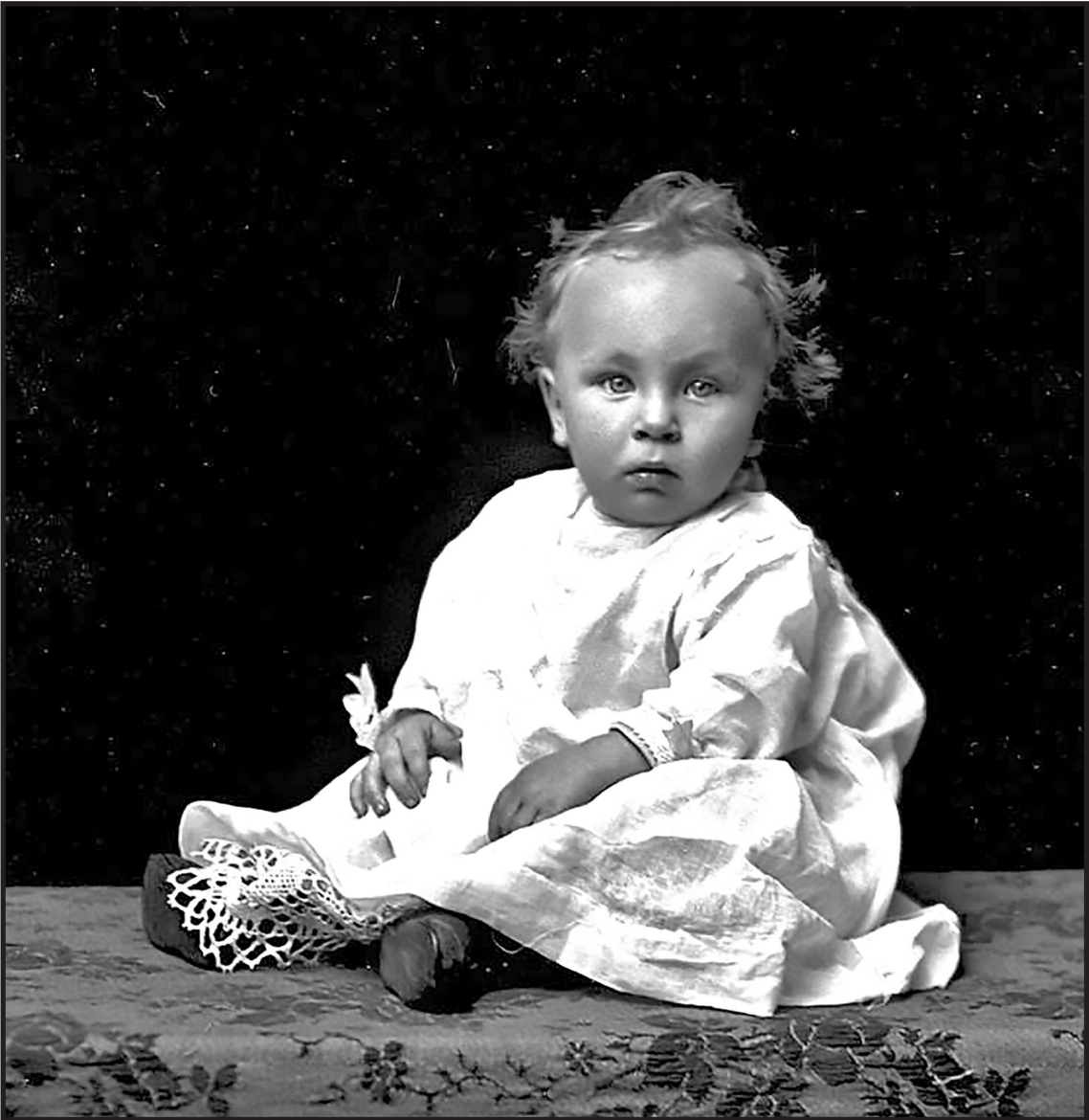
J. A. Woolums has sold his fine English Shire horse, Cloot, to I. B. Gray, of Skelton.

Colby Community College is teaming with Options Domestic Violence Services and Northwest Kansas Corrections Oct. 11 to host a free conference that addresses domestic violence issues. To commemorate 50 years since the escalation of U.S. involvement in the Vietnam War, KHC is launching this multidimensional, statewide oral history project in partnership with the Library of Congress. Through oral histories and written memoir, community organizations will collect the stories of Kansans as they share their experiences, both home and abroad. These stories will be archived at the Library of Congress in Washington, DC, as part of the national Veterans History Project.

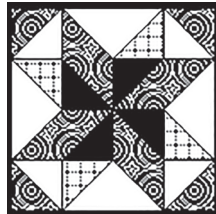

## 9/11 Traveling Tour Hosted by Fick Fossil & History Museum

Sixteen years ago, 9/11 changed the world as we know it forever...

Stephen Siller, a New York Firefighter, was there on 9/11. This exhibit was created by Stephen's family after the tragedy on September 11, 2001. Stephen was just finishing his shift when he got word that the Twin Towers had been hit. He called his wife and told her he was returning to squad to suit up. Being unable to drive up to the site, he strapped on 60 lbs. of gear and walked to the site. He gave up his own life trying to save others. In return, his family established the Stephen Siller Tunnel to Towers Foundation in his honor and his memory.

In September 2013, the Foundation dedicated the 9/11 Never Forget Mobile Exhibit. Welcomed around the country, the mobile exhibit-a high-tech, 53-foot tractor-trailer, which unfolds into a 1,100-square foot exhibit-serves as a poignant reminder of that infamous day.

The exhibit is intended to serve as an education tool. Through the presentation of artifacts, including actual steel beams from the towers, documentary video, recordings of first-responder radio transmissions, as well as guided tours by FDNY firefighters, people will learn what took place and the ultimate sacrifice so many made that day. The high school sophomores will be learning about 9/11 as a history lesson. What a great experience this will be for everyone in western Kansas to have the opportunity to visit such an educational exhibit. This also would be an informative and humbling experience for our local fire departments, regional fire departments, law enforcement, EMS and other first respondent agencies.

## Grab and Go Box

September is National Preparedness Month. It is also our annual Prepare Kansas online challenge. Prepare Kansas 2017 will provide tips on getting financially prepared ahead of disasters and emergencies. This year's program will be conducted through the K-State Research and Extension Facebook page. No registration is required, so Kansans and anyone interested in planning ahead for emergencies can follow on Facebook and this blog at any time during September, pick up handy information and interact with K-State extension specialists and agents.

The Twin Creeks District hasn't had a lot of the usual tornado threats this spring and summer but we did have the crazy late spring blizzard that was disastrous to many of us. Many in the district had power outages for days, loss of livestock and destruction of property and natural resources.

In March, our neighboring counties had the devastating wildfires that again resulted in 80-90% loss of livestock and property for many Kansans. More than 400,000 acres burned in Clark County alone.

Our friends to the south have had it rough in the last month. In less than 30 days, they have seen Harvey, Irma, Jose and now

Maria. The National Hurricane Center says, "Of the 13 named storms so far in 2017, seven have been hurricanes, a number matched or exceeded at this point in the season only four times since 1995. Four of the seven — Harvey, Irma, Jose and Maria — have reached Category 3 or higher, the threshold for a major hurricane on the Saffir-Simpson scale. Only five other seasons since 1995 have had that many by Sept. 18."

Now that I have depressed you, we know that disasters are usually a surprise, but you can reach a level of preparedness should you experience one. Kansas State Research and Extension, Family Resource Management Program Focus Team has the following advice to prepare financially for a disaster:

Consider keeping the following items in a secure place in your home, in a waterproof, fireproof container that can be taken with you at a moment's notice:

- Identification and other key documents that may be needed to restore your financial records, including copies of your driver's license, passports, Social Security cards
- Insurance cards, policies, or other proof of insurance coverage
- Household inventory
- Immunization records
- Bank account numbers, cash

- Copies (front and back) of ATM, debit, and credit cards
- Phone numbers and account information for all financial service and insurance providers
- Important telephone numbers (family members, doctors, veterinarians)

- Names and prescription numbers for medications
- Safe deposit box key
- Pocket notebook and pen or pencil

If the following items are not kept in a safe deposit box, these should also be kept in your grab-and-go box. It is a good idea to make copies of safe deposit box contents in case the originals are damaged by water.

- Family records (birth, marriage, death certificates)
- Will, contracts, deeds, stocks, and bonds
- Titles to vehicles

## Register Now for Kansas Rural Center's 2017 Farm & Food Conference

## A Corn Crop for the Ages

One hundred forty-bushel dryland corn in Norton County? Impossible. Won't ever happen. Can't be done.

Any Kansas grain farmer will never say for sure what a crop will make until it's been harvested, stored away and the figures finished. Still, on Sept. 15, three generations of the Van Patten family believe they have an opportunity to cut some 140-bushel-per-acre corn.

David Van Patten has farmed since the 1950s. He says in his 80-plus years in Norton County, he's never seen such an ideal summer to grow corn, or any other crop in northwestern Kansas. Twelve inches of rain during July and August helped produce this abundant crop. Temperatures in the 80s during this period cemented the deal.

You know, it's one of those so-called weather phenomena, the elder Van Patten says. "It may take another 85 or 100 years to grow such a crop. No one knows for sure but one thing's for certain, we'll enjoy this harvest."

Tony Van Patten, David's son, says this year's corn crop was planted in milo stubble. This may have also benefited the growth of this fall's crop.

With this year's rainfall coming like it did, the corn crop never stressed," Tony says. "It's still green throughout the field and it's the middle of September. No rolled up leaves anywhere." A beautiful sight indeed - across thousands of acres in northwestern Kansas during the fall of 2017, the corn looks exceptional. Ears range from good-sized to big, farmers say. Most of the corn stalks sport double ears as well.

The Van Pattens figure they'll start corn harvest in mid-October - weather willing. Soybean harvest has already started.

As for his family's soybean crop, it looks good as well.

"I hope we'll average 40-bushels-per-acre," Tony says. "Some fields may make 50-bushel. Others may be closer to 30-bushel."

Looking out across his fields of corn and beans, Tony waxes poetically.

"You take what's given you in this country," he says. "Some years what you receive is better than others." Like their neighbors and friends across Kansas, these farmers take risks that test their mettle. They face each harvest with the hope of a bountiful crop. They make their peace with the Almighty and keep that same peace with their fellow man.

## Kansas Cattle on Feed Up 2%

Kansas feedlots, with capacities of 1,000 or more head, contained 2.22 million cattle on feed on September 1, according to the USDA's National Agricultural Statistics Service. This inventory was up 2 percent from last year. Placements during August totaled 495,000 head, up 2 percent from 2016.

Fed cattle marketings for the month of August totaled 445,000 head, up 7 percent from last year. Other disappearance during August totaled 10,000 head, unchanged from last year.

## Export Report

Export commitments were strong this week as China committed to purchase two million bushels. This brings total commitments to 45 million bushels, 21 percent of the USDA target just two weeks into the marketing year. In response, basis differences between corn and sorghum have narrowed considerably, with sorghum now even with corn in terminal markets in central Kansas and central South Dakota. Gulf basis is also strong with sorghum prices at 117 percent of corn.

Shall Sheridan County, Kansas be authorized to issue general obligation hospital bonds in an amount not to exceed \$7,000,000 in order to pay a portion of the estimated \$7,661,737 costs to make improvements to the Sheridan County Health Complex, Hoxie, Kansas (the "Hospital"), consisting of: (i) construction, acquiring and equipping of an emergency room entrance, an addition to the clinic, additional parking and exterior elevation improvements; (ii) remodel, acquire and equip the elder care and emergency service areas; (iii) update original service lines, mechanical and electrical systems; and (iv) all other necessary improvements appurtenant thereto (collectively, the "Project"); and (v) pay costs of issuance and interest on said general obligation hospital bonds of the County during construction of the Project; all pursuant to the authority of K.S.A. 19-4601 et seq? The balance of the costs of the Project shall be paid from Hospital Funds."

The following additional information is provided by the County with respect to compliance with the provisions of K.S.A. 10-120a and K.S.A. 12-6122. No assurances can be given that these projections will be accurate as of the date of issuance of the bonds due to changing market conditions and other matters unknown or unavailable at this time. ## Commission Minutes 9/11/2017

Now on this 18<sup>th</sup> day of September 2017, the Board of Commissioners, Sheridan County, Kansas met in regular session with Chairman Troy Dewey presiding. Others present were Joe Bainter, Vic Bielser and County Clerk Heather Bracht. Guest was Doren Follis.

Dewey made a motion to approve the September 11, 2017 minutes as amended. Bainter seconded the motion. Carried 3-0.

Road & Bridge had a safety inspection in August and there were several minor issues that needed to be corrected. Paulette Feldt, Road & Bridge Supervisor made the corrections and the board reviewed and signed off on them. The safety inspection will be forwarded to KCAMP.

Joe Pratt, County Attorney entered the meeting. Documents pertaining to the hospital bond issue were distributed. Resolution No. 17-93 authorizing certain improvements to the County-owned hospital, authorizing the cost estimates of the improvements and providing for the calling of a bond election in the county for the purpose of submitting to the qualified electors of the county the question of issuing general obligation bonds of the county and giving notice of the bond election was approved and signed after a motion by Bielser and second by Dewey. Carried 2-1. Bainter voted against. The Notice of Bond Election will be placed in The Sheridan Sentinel for the next two weeks.

The board discussed random drug testing for all employees, not just road & bridge. The county would incorporate drug testing as part of employment and random drug testing after that. Dewey made a motion to make random drug testing part of the work regulations, seconded by Bielser. This would be effective December 1, 2017. Carried 3-0.

Paulette Feldt, Road & Bridge Supervisor, entered the meeting. Work maps were distributed for the prior week. The bridge in the far SW corner of the county has pilings that have broken off underneath. Penco is checking with Fred Dinkel about coming in and putting in new pilings. The board agreed that if the price is right, it would okay to use Fred Dinkel. Langer Industries out of Colby would like to bring out a roll-off for the scrap iron. It would be just thrown on and when it is full, they would come weigh, pay and haul off. Dewey made a motion to approve doing this. Bainter seconded the motion. Carried 3-0.

Dewey made a motion to amend the Agenda to include Register of Deeds Mary Weimer. Bielser seconded the motion. Carried 3-0. The board was advised that Weimer's deputy gave her two-week notice. Weimer will advertise for part-time help, less than 30 hours and see if she gets any applicants. If not, she will go with regular part-time help, which is 4 days a week.

Twin Creeks Extension entered to the meeting to give their quarterly reports. Present were Stacey Brown, District Director; Alyssa Rippe, Livestock and Horticulture; Patsy Maddy, 4-H Youth Development and Keith VanSkei, Ag & Natural Resources.

Jan Moore, Director for the Sheridan County Historical

Society entered the meeting. Moore stated there is a Kansas Museum Association workshop meeting in Manhattan in the fall. This is a three-day workshop and she feels it would be beneficial to attend. She feels it would be under \$800 and asks if the county would be willing to sponsor her and Karen Lewis going. Bielser made a motion to approve paying the expenses for the workshop, not to exceed \$800.00. Dewey seconded the motion. Carried 3-0. An issue has come up with the filing and/or paying of payroll taxes for the Historical Society. After paying the taxes owed, with penalties still owing, it has put a strain on their budget. Moore asked about increasing the budget for 2018. Bracht will check with David Leopold to see if money can be used from the Economic Development fund if the need arises in 2018. Moore states that the Centennial Celebration went well with lots of positive feedback.

Dewey made a motion to amend the agenda to include Keith Stubbs. Bainter seconded the motion. Carried 3-0. Stubbs has talked with the road & bridge supervisor about a culvert that needs replaced, but nothing has been done. He wanted the commissioners to be aware of the problem. States the culvert is washed out and exposed, and during a rain, water washes to the road. The area is 150S/10E. The board will talk with the road & bridge supervisor at the next


