## Golden Plains Student of the Month



## Group Looks for Ways to Help State's Home-Owned Carnivals

Around 20 supporters of home-owned carnivals from Oberlin, Oakley, Hoxie, Minneapolis, Goodland and St. Francis were represented in the third of a series of meetings at the Colonial Steak House in Oakley.

Ellen Pratt of Hoxie, who has helped organize and lead the meetings, told the group at the meeting Nov. 15 that State Sen. Rick Billinger had called her and asked that the group gather ideas for changes needed for a new law passed last year on inspection and insurance for amusement rides to help the local carnivals. He said he would work with the state Department of Labor to come up with a bill for the "home-owned" carnivals that would amend the law.

Rep. Adam Smith, who was not present, is working with Sen. Billinger on this. Rep. Smith said he doesn't think the House leadership opposes helping the carnivals, but it doesn't want them to be excluded from the law.

Topics the group would like to see addressed, Mrs. Pratt said, include:

- Annual Fees and Registration - supporters felt it unnecessary to register and pay fees for rides every year. They suggested the carnivals should register and pay ride fees, and then if a group sells a ride or buys a new one, it would notify the Department of Labor.
- Insurance - All the carnivals carry insurance, each with a

different policy and company. Supporters said they felt that a \$1 million policy should be adequate for small, home-owned carnivals, though the new law requires \$2 million.

- Classifying Rides - The group felt their rides should be classified by height rather than age. Several have kiddie rides that are strictly for smaller children. The group suggested two classifications, 42 inches and under and 42 inches and over.

None of the groups has a "thriller" ride as you see in big amusement parks, and representatives said volunteers are careful to make sure that adults ride with children if needed.

- Inspections - The group agreed all rides should be inspected. They said all could perform and document daily inspections of their rides. They felt that having an inspection as required by the law is a good thing but could be done every other year. A required nondestructive evaluation could be done as prescribed in operator's manuals, every 100 running hours or every four years.

The group agreed on a definition for a "home-owned carnival" at the last meeting, she said, as one owned, managed and operated by a community-based volunteer organization, in operation fewer than 20 days each year, with a fixed location and serving a population not to exceed 10,000.

Mrs. Pratt said the supporters would like to know by March

what the revised law will say, if possible.

"We need time to get everything done in time to operate for our fairs," she said. "Otherwise, we need to be given more time to do everything that is required."

Harlan House of Goodland told the group that Sen. Randall Hardy of Salina had visited the Sherman County Fair last fall and saw what a "home-owned" carnival is all about. He told workers he would like to help with the cause.

Mrs. Pratt said she will contact Sen. Billinger and Rep. Smith with this information and hope for the best.

Fair dates for 2018: Oberlin, Aug. 7 to 11; Oakley, July 17 to 21; Hoxie, July 19 to 21; Minneapolis, July 17 to 20; St. Francis, Aug. 1 to 4; Sharon Springs, July 26 to 28; and Goodland, July 28 to Aug. 4.

## ROTARY NEWS

The month of November at Rotary was busy with many guests and interesting presentations.

The first week's special guest was Lily Schamberger, who was the Rotary Student of the Month for November. She was awarded \$25 in Chamber Scrip.

Gerry Heim brought Steve Heim and his son, Chris, spoke about their race cars. Chris and his brother Colin, (who was not in attendance) have been racing for 12-13 years, having started out in go-kart racing. The race season is from mid-March through the beginning of October.

Chris also spoke of the cost of racing, and his experience with trying out for a NASCAR team.

The 14<sup>th</sup> brought in Linda Frazey with her very interesting and detailed presentation on the school playground upgrade that she and her team are working on. She explained how "dismal and

dangerous" the playground is, and showed a display of what the projected new playground will look like. The slipper slide, which was 'condemned' years ago, the swing sets, and the merry-go-round will all be removed. The tire swing and preschoolers' slide will be re-positioned.

The architect designed in 'popular' items, handicap accessibility, and sturdy, but not excessively expensive equipment. The plan includes coated fencing, picnic tables, and new ground cover (several different options are being considered for this.)

Being new to grant writing, there is a team of people working on all aspects of this large project.

At the November 21 meeting there were eight Rotary members in attendance, and the presenter for this week was Mike O'Dell, Hoxie Rotary President.

Mike spoke about the new things happening at the hospital. The patient call-system apparently was 'fried' in a power surge, so a new one was needed immediately. It would take a month for the full installation of the new system.

There is also a security camera upgrade that brings in a new updated system, which increases the number of

cameras from 16 to 30. A new blood analyzer, with far better accuracy - which means fewer tests needed - produces results in one day rather than 3-7 days.

A UPS electrical backup system for the CT Unit is in place as well. During power outages, this will prevent a loss of in-process tests.

The hospital also purchased a new vacuum.

Much of the funding for all of this has been subsidized by grants.

The Hospital Auxiliary purchased two beauty shop carts.

The final meeting of the month, on November 28, the main topic of conversation was all about the Hoxie Football Team and their historic State win.

Mike told the group that the Rotary International website had been updated with Oscar's new members added, and the removal of those who are no longer members.

Harry Joe Pratt spoke about Match Day and the Strategic Doing projects.

**Value of Skim Milk**  
Many people have an idea that skim milk is not of any value as a food, which proves that we do not study food values enough. Skim milk has all the valuable properties of milk minus the cream, which are many. The casein is left, which is the protein food of milk, and is most valuable as a builder of tissue.

If you can spare it from the pigs, let the little people have it to drink instead of water. If it must be bought, you can buy two or three quarts of the skim milk for the price of one quart of whole milk, and many most desirable dishes may be made with it which can not be told from that made of whole milk.

For example, the much-liked Indian pudding, which is made of corn meal, two quarts of milk, a cup of suet, sugar and a few raisins and an egg or two. The skim milk may be used exactly as well, as the fat is all

supplied by the suet. Mothers of large families would do well to study the value of skim milk and buy much of it, instead of so much of the whole milk.

**Codfish Chowder** - Take a half pound of codfish, a quarter of a pound of salt pork, a half-dozen potatoes, three onions all sliced, two quarts of skim milk, salt and pepper. Cut the pork into dice and put into a large kettle; try out until brown, add the onions and stir until yellow, add the potatoes sliced and sufficient water to cover. Have the codfish soaked and shredded; add when the potatoes are nearly done, the add the scalding milk, seasonings, a half-dozen crackers. Serve hot.

**Collection of Don'ts**  
Don't lay a greasy spoon or fork on the stove or table; it makes a mark and a small tray or plate will hold a number of things and save the table or stove.

Don't pour boiling water over china or glass; it may not crack at the time, but it will drop off when least expected.

Don't pour boiling water on grease spots. Moisten the spots well first with cold water and a bit of soda. Dish towels which are greasy should be treated in this way to keep them sweet.

Don't put linen soiled with fruit stains into hot soap suds. It fixes the stain. Put all stains in cold water first. If obstinate, use a little oxalic acid and see that they are well rinsed afterwards.

Don't use steel knives or forks on fish, as the steel gives an unpleasant flavor to fish.

# In Other News

## KLA MEMBERS APPROVE RESOLUTIONS ADDRESSING BUSINESS ISSUES

Members of the Kansas Livestock Association (KLA) took policy positions on issues affecting their common business interests during the group's annual business meeting December 1 in Wichita. The process of gathering member input on these issues began in November at regional roundtable meetings across the state, continued during committee and council meetings and concluded with final consideration and approval from the general membership at the KLA Convention.

"Many KLA members were involved in forming policy for the year ahead," said KLA President Lee Reeve, a cattle feeder and farmer from Garden City. "While the entire membership may not unanimously agree on every resolution, we understand working together gives us a more powerful voice and is in the best interests of our businesses and our industry."

Among the new resolutions is one supporting modernization of the North American Free Trade Agreement in a way that protects current provisions favorable to beef and other U.S. ag product exports. Canada and Mexico are two of the largest international customers for U.S. beef.

Members voted to support an exemption from Electronic

Logging Device requirements for livestock haulers while modifications to the hours of service (HOS) rules are being sought. Producers and animal care specialists believe the current HOS standard is not practical and will compromise animal welfare.

New KLA policy supports federal legislation to improve livestock disaster programs, including an increase in payment limitations for the Livestock Indemnity Program and Emergency Conservation Program. This legislation addresses shortcomings identified in the wake of wildfires, blizzards and other natural disasters in Kansas the past several years.

The membership approved an amendment to existing policy supporting a mandatory national individual animal identification system for disease traceability. Language in the resolution suggests the system should minimize costs to producers, optimize the role of the private sector in administering the program and protect the confidentiality of individual animal owner records.

Another amended resolution opposes legislation that would increase the current amount of acres that can be enrolled in the Conservation Reserve Program.

KLA members approved new policy supporting federal legislation to create a Dealer Statutory Trust. This trust would give unpaid cash sellers first priority to livestock and the proceeds or accounts receivable when there is a livestock dealer default.

A new resolution opposes allowing food products not derived from livestock or dairy production to use nomenclature typically associated with meat and milk. Members support legislative, regulatory or judicial action to protect livestock and dairy nomenclature from piracy.

The new resolution addressing state water plan funding is based on the fact that ranchers and farmers pay a disproportionately larger amount of fees in relation to agriculture's benefit from the plan. Therefore, members oppose any attempt to increase fees paid by irrigators and other agricultural water users in order to fund the plan.

Members approved policy on conservation easement funding. Support was expressed for state legislation to create a Kansas conservation easement funding source, preferably through the Kansas Department of Agriculture Division of Conservation. Members oppose state legislation that would prohibit Kansas landowners from voluntarily agreeing to a perpetual conservation easement agreement.

Policy retained by KLA members supports current state laws prohibiting local units of government from enacting any regulations that apply to agricultural land use or the construction and maintenance of buildings used for agricultural purposes outside of city limits. Any attempt to weaken agriculture's exemption from local zoning authority is opposed by KLA.

In all, KLA members approved 61 resolutions for 2018. Other issues addressed in KLA policy range from animal care to limited transferable deer hunting permits for landowners.

KLA is a 5,400-member trade organization representing the state's livestock business on legislative, regulatory and industry issues at both the state and federal levels. The association's work is funded through voluntary dues dollars paid by its members.

## RMA Announces Crop Insurance Changes

The Risk Management Agency has announced a number of important and positive changes. In order to improve flexibility, RMA has removed the June 1 certification deadline for conservation compliance and will instead refer to the premium billing date as the deadline. RMA will also allow policyholders to select an enterprise unit for either irrigated or non-irrigated practices. Finally, it has been announced that RMA will allow the use of yield cups when Yield Exclusion, Trend Adjusted Yield or Yield Adjustment are selected. National Sorghum Producers appreciates the work done by RMA to make these positive changes and also recognizes House Agriculture Committee Chairman Mike Conaway (R-TX) who worked very hard to ensure that these concerns were recognized and addressed.

## Sorghum Exports Hit New Marketing Year High

Sorghum sales reached a new marketing year high at 12.9 million bushels. This is up 2 percent from the week before and 26 percent higher than the four-week average. China bought 262,000 metric tons, bring its total commitments to 774 million bushels, and unknown destinations picked up 66,000 metric tons. This brings total sales to 112.6 million bushels, compared to 104.9 million a year ago. Exports of 217,100 metric tons or 8.5 million bushels, a marketing-year high, were up noticeably from the previous week and from the prior four-week average.

As a part of an ongoing initiative to promote literacy in Northwest Kansas, the Dane G. Hansen Foundation trustees are pleased to announce a new grant opportunity to promote effective summer reading programs.

When developing the reading initiative, NW Kansas READS, the Hansen Foundation has emphasized the importance of reading to young children. The foundation partnered with existing programs with proven track records to promote literacy, including Turn a Page Touch a Mind through the Kansas Chapter of the American Academy of Pediatrics, and the Dolly Parton Imagination Library.

These partnerships represent a concerted effort to get books in the hands of young children and their families. The Hansen Foundation recognizes that these programs have the potential to shape the lives of our youngest citizens in a positive way and target children age 0-5, in an effort to get children to kindergarten ready to learn at a higher level.

The summer reading grant is designed to help children

already in school keep pace with their peers. Research shows that once children enter school, they tend to learn at a fairly similar rate. Teachers do a good job of working with students to help them be successful in the classroom.

However, research also documents that children with fewer books in the home, and from lower socio-economic homes, lose precious ground between school years. This "summer slide" is largely responsible for the gap in reading and math scores that evolves in the elementary years and remains throughout a student's educational career.

The new summer reading grant is designed to specifically address summer slide. The application addresses elements that research shows must be present for a summer reading program to successfully move the learning needle.

Successful grant applications will address three important elements:

**Access** - How will the children get to the books, or how will the books get to the children. Offering a program and hoping children will come is not enough to reach the children who need it most.

**Choice** - We know that allowing children to self-select from a choice of age-appropriate titles is a critical element in getting them to read.

**Discussion** - The opportunity to talk about the text with peers and/or adults reinforces the text and takes the learning to a higher level.

## Counselor Corner

All juniors have had a presentation (with flyers) on the ACT test and junior days at area schools. Juniors need to get one testing in, and there are ACT tests offered in February, April, June, and July. Register at ACT.org, but pay special attention to things like proms, summer camps, etc. when registering.

Also, be aware that many students have trouble getting their thinking caps on to take a test during the summer, but other kids report a better experience because they feel less stress. Think it over.

Juniors also should make a visit or two this spring to schools he/she is interested in. A Junior Day is best when at student is unsure of a major, but wants to see everything a school has to offer. Juniors can also make a specific visit on the day of his/her choice if they have a good idea what they would like to study. Junior days also give you a feel for whether you want to send your ACT scores to that school. There is no extra charge for sending your ACT scores to up to 4 schools. Final choices on what school to apply to can be refined in the senior year.

The University of Missouri-Kansas City (UMKC) offers a six-year program that allows students to complete their

undergraduate and doctorate degrees in medicine (BA/MD program).

The process for admitting students is holistic, with equal weight given to both cognitive characteristics (ACT, GPA) and non-cognitive ones (essay, school activities, health experiences). Students need to take challenging courses in high school and be involved in leadership roles, with a commitment to health care.






