

Governor Laura Kelly and Transportation Secretary Julie Lorenz announced Thursday, July 9, the recipients across the state of the Kansas Department of Transportation's Cost Share Program. These 24 projects total more than \$20 million in transportation investments statewide. The Cost Share Program provides funding to local entities for transportation projects that improve safety, support job retention and growth, improve access or mobility, relieve congestion and help areas across the state improve the transportation system.

There were 136 projects totaling \$228 million in requested funds for the Spring 2020 round. These numbers highlight the pent-up demand for transportation projects across the state. Projects were awarded in every region of the state with some beginning construction as soon

as this fall. There was added emphasis on selecting projects that would create a steady influx of construction jobs over the next year.

Sheridan County is one of these awardees for the necessary improvement to Feedyard Road.

#### **KU Announces Spring 2020 Honor Roll**

than undergraduate students at the University of Kansas earned honor roll distinction for the spring 2020 semester.

The students, from KU's Lawrence and Edwards campuses and the schools of Health Professions and Nursing in Kansas City, Kansas, represent 85 of 105 Kansas counties; 47 other states, territories, and Washington, D.C.; and 55 other countries.

The honor roll undergraduates who meet requirements in the College of Liberal Arts & Sciences and in the schools of Business, Engineering, Education, Health Professions,

Journalism, Music, Nursing, Pharmacy and Social Welfare. The School of Architecture & Design did not post a dean's list this term. Honor roll criteria vary among the university's academic units. Some schools honor the top 10% of students enrolled, some establish a minimum grade-point average, and others raise the minimum GPA for each year students are in school. Students must complete a minimum number of credit hours to be considered for the honor roll.

#### **Chasing Clovers:** NO FAIR??? - NOT FAIR!!!

For many communities in our western Kansas area, home owned carnivals have made the decision to not set up taking into consideration the health and safety of their communities, expenses related to insurance and inspections and the lack of volunteers available to assist with operations.

For many, there have been comments related to the 'fair' being cancelled and the disappointment in families and youth not getting to socialize during the highlight event of the year for their communities

I would like to take this opportunity to introduce you to the other half of the 'fair' - the 4-H/FFA showcase for a year of project learning! Have you ever wondered where the animals come from at the fair, or all of the other creative exhibits seen in exhibit buildings? It's called the Kansas 4-H program the largest national youth organization found every county in the state of Kansas. These youth 4-H programs function under the umbrella of K-State Research and Extension which brings education from the University to the people in our communities.

4-H members enroll in this program in October and choose project areas related their interests. Many project areas rely on selfstudy and some have adult project leaders who conduct learning experiences, and this past year members have seen #TCDProjectChallenges sent out to them in several project areas to expand and 'challenge' them to sometimes step out of their comfort zone to learn. After discovering new educational information about their projects, youth choose something they can physically exhibit to showcase their learning at the local county fair.





The boys came in last Friday night and gave bonds to keep the peace.

The rock is on the ground with which to build the new hotel of Mr. O. F. Ellithorpe.

Mr. E. T. Crum lost a valuable horse last Tuesday.

We hear the animal died of colic. D. M. Scott and E. Brimmer, who have been

breaking 160 acres near Grainfield, returned last Tuesday evening. If the Hoxie club wants to win the money put

up on the game with the Buffalo Blues more practicing must be done. Mrs. R. E. Troutman and her son, Albert of

Grinnell, visited Mrs. Gus Johnson last Sunday. They also came to look at Hoxie. Mr. W. Yates brought in a bunch of wheat, and B. F. Miller a sample of oats, both of which makes

the farmer glad. E. P. Jay, who has been absent the last three weeks on a pleasure trip east, returned last Saturday happy and smiling, of course he had a

good time. Chick Cowser left for Lincoln, Neb., last Sunday to wait on his sick brother, Frank, Perhaps Frank will return with Chick and remain here this

Yesterday morning, while picketing out a cow, George, the 12 year old son of Mr. Wash Ballard, accidently let an ax, which he was carrying, drop on his right foot, cutting off the second toe. Dr. Freeman dressed the foot and the little fellow

They're Ramping Up the Fear Again ~

Don't Fall For It!

By Viktorija Briggs Just as things were beginning to seem to be getting back to some semblance of normal, Governor Kelly and many others around the country, extended the 'state of emergency' and executive orders with mandates for mask wearing. This is a personal choice not a governmental one.

As of 10am Monday, July 13, 2020, the US population was 329,945,850. The number of COVID-19 cases was 3,442,036. That is 1.0432123938% of the population or 1,043 people per 100,000 (per capita). Barely over ONE PERCENT of the population.

Ok, now let's look at the percentage of deaths: 137,761 have died from CV-19 (and this is a dubious number because they're attributing anyone who dies and has the CV-19 antibodies in their system as a CV-19 death). This number is 0.0417526088% of the population or 41.75 deaths per 100,000.

Let's look at the Kansas numbers, which are:


Kansas population: 2,913,314 Kansas Coronavirus Deaths: 304

Kansas Coronavirus Cases: 19,731

The graphic below was taken from Facebook, and its informational sources are listed on the bottom right corner (CDC, WHO, The Lancet - correct as of March 9, 2020). It is an 'old' meme, but with further research, the current average number of COVID deaths per day worldwide is around 300 +/- a few hundred to thousands on any given day. (per WHO)



Brian Zikmund-Fisher, a risk communication expert at the University of Michigan School of Public Health, told AFP by email on March 13, 2020 (four days after the meme's release) that this one "is problematic because the rest of the bars represent persistent rates of disease that are not changing much over time, whereas COVID-19 infections are exploding exponentially at the moment." (https://bit.ly/32clBx0)

Yes, that means those numbers have increased, and yes, it is comparing a newly formed disease, which has a rapidly growing mortality rate, with other longstanding diseases. Understandable. Of course they are. BUT herd immunity is nature's vaccine. More people are being exposed to it, and the testing is proving this by showing the virus and its antibodies in those tested, both alive and dead, since they test everyone now (refer to paragraph three above).

But in just this past week there has been a huge uptick of headlines, social media posts and responses, memes, etc. that are growing in pushing the fear mongering that if you don't wear a mask you will die or kill someone. This just is

So, this all begs the question, "WHY would this push be happening *– now*?"

Why, when the economy was rebounding exponentially record numbers re-employed after the lock downs lifted?

Why, when testing was doing its job and showing that so many more have been exposed, have the antibodies, and didn't even know it?

Why, when the hospitalization and death rates are barely creditable per capita?

What would be the purpose of pushing so hard for something so far from lethal on the grand scale? The fluis far more dangerous, and tuberculosis kills over a million people every year - has for






Along with the addition of commodities, USDA expanded the program for some already eligible commodities and updated the payment rates for others.

#### 1.2 Million Acres Accepted in **Conservation Reserve Program Grasslands**

United Department of Agriculture's (USDA) Farm Service Agency (FSA) today announced the acceptance of more than 1.2 million acres in the Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) Grasslands during the recent signup period that began March 16 and ended May 15. The number of acres offered during this signup period was 1.9 million acres, over 3 times the number offered during the last signup period

in 2016. Through CRP Grasslands, farmers and ranchers can protect grasslands, rangelands and pastures while retaining the right to conduct common grazing practices, such as haying, mowing or harvesting seed from the enrolled land. Timing of some activities may be restricted by the primary nesting season of birds.

"This large unprecedented enrollment is a reflection of the popularity and importance of CRP Grasslands," said State Executive Director David "The program Schemm. emphasizes support for grazing operations and plant and animal biodiversity while protecting land under the

greatest threat of conversion or development.'

Participants will receive an annual rental payment and may receive up to 50 percent cost-share for establishing approved conservation practices. The duration of the CRP contract is 10 or 15 years. FSA ranked offers using a number of factors, including existence of expiring CRP land, threat of conversion or development, existing grassland and predominance of native species cover and

The 2018 Farm Bill set aside not fewer than 2 million acres for CRP Grassland enrollment. On Oct. 1, 2020, grassland enrollment is expected to be 2.1 million acres. CRP is one of the largest conservation programs at USDA. CRP marks its 35-year anniversary in 2020 with 21.9 million acres currently enrolled.

For more information on CRP Grasslands, contact your local FSA county office or visit fsa.usda.gov/crp. To locate your local FSA office, visit farmers.gov/service-locator.

USDA Service Centers are open for business by phone appointment only, and field work will continue with appropriate social distancing. 
### 2020 ~ A Year to Remember!

On December 31, 2019, reports came out of China about a highly contagious respiratory virus. Over the next few weeks, warnings came from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention about traveling to and from China. The first confirmed case from a traveler returning to Washington State from China came on January 21, 2020. By the end of January, travel from China was completely banned. Over the next several weeks, the spread of the virus continued, and many state governors began closing what they considered to be non-essential businesses.

The middle of March, Kansas Governor Laura Kelly declared a local disaster emergency. Along with this was a mandate to temporarily close schools for the rest of the year. State basketball was cancelled after the first round of games. Track season was cancelled, as well as many other school activities. Most rural schools attempted to still have prom and graduation. Wheatland held prom on June 27. Hoxie held prom on July 11.

Graduations were also much later than usual with Wheatland holding graduation on June 29. Hoxie and Golden Plains held their graduations on July 18. Several students going to military service had to miss graduation due to leaving for boot camp.

While memorable, the 2020 school year was not what most seniors were hoping for as their final year of high school. Regardless, everyone sends congratulations and the best of wishes for their future!

Joseph plans to attend Garden City Community College following graduation to complete his general education requirements.






