When Fair Board President Rob Farber named the Benefit Walk Board as 2016 Grand Marshals of the big event, the members felt honored. "My thoughts were that it actually validated us as an organization, and made us realize that Sheridan County values us," commented Benefit Walk Board President Marty Cressler. Annette Follis, who serves as the Vice President, added that it was very special, especially since this happened so soon after they finished the Benefit Walk in June.

When asked what their biggest Sheridan County Fair memories were, Marty replied, "It's probably when the Carnies were replaced and it became a hometown operated and owned carnival. There is so much pride in our hometown carnival."

Annette went on to say, "I think it is an honor to work the carnival. Fair Week is a big deal. My grandkids are bringing chickens. It's fun to see another side of the kids. They are showing a whole different level at the fair." Marty said her kids were in 4-H, and she mentioned it is still cool to watch the livestock shows. Both ladies commented that the fair brings a lot of people into town. "Class reunions are done during fair time. People know when fair time is, and families plan for it," mentioned Annette.

It was also important for Marty and Annette to encourage people to get out and volunteer at the carnival and fair activities. "It's so important to have volunteers and have people get involved in their community. I hope to see more people step up," said Annette. Marty also added that without volunteers, the Benefit Walk wouldn't be as successful at it is. Both ladies also said that they would like people to find the time to get out and see all the exhibits. "I also hope a lot of people will go into the barns and check out all the animals," commented Annette. Marty mentioned there is a lot of pride in this town. It shows with the school activities and sports, the Benefit Walk, Rod Run, and of course the Sheridan County Fair. "The fair is a different outlet for the kids and people that participate in the fair. It's a different level of competition."

It's time to put your boots on and head out to the fair. Everybody has a special memory. Annette has one more very special one. "Our son Clayton did his Eagle Scout Project in 2002 at the fairgrounds. He built the ticket booth, and every time walk by there I feel a big sense of pride."

‘The Living Room’ Provides A Musical Atmosphere

Living rooms are a place for relaxing and visiting, but for one special “Living Room” on Main Street in Hoxie, it’s a place to acquire many music memories.

“The Living Room” is a music studio where I teach voice lessons and beginner piano lessons. This is a place where you can learn to be as comfortable with music as if you were in your own living room,” commented Bonnie Cameron, who oversees the activities in The Living Room

This summer, Bonnie is directing two plays. The first, ‘James and the Giant Peach’, was held at the Hoxie High School Auditorium. Coming up on July 23 will be ‘Annie’. Show time will be at 3 p.m. “We have 39 cast members in ‘James’ and 20 in ‘Annie’. We have been rehearsing five days a week since the last week in May! On average, there will be two to three separate rehearsals a day,” she said. In these plays you will witness some dancing, singing, acting, yelling, and laughing.

For five summers in a row, shows have been performed in Hoxie under Cameron’s leadership. Before returning to Hoxie, Bonnie was working professionally in opera in Europe for over 10 years. This year Bonnie has had Grahm Mahanna as an intern for the main Street Summer Theater Festival working on technique and building the puppets.

“It’s so exciting to see how the talent in each child grows from year to year. I am always amazed each year at their development and

how much more I can ask of them,” Bonnie stated.

For the summer shows, there are about 60 participants each year. Some of the play’s cast come from other surrounding communities, such as Colby, Oakley, Grainfield, Hill City and Selden. Bonnie has been in business since October 2012.

When asked where she got the idea to establish ‘The Living Room,’ Bonnie replied, “I had this idea when I was in Berlin about 10 years ago. I always longed for a place to create and experience music and theater without putting on any airs!” The age range for students getting involved with Cameron’s activities is from third to fifth grade.

The Living Room will also be a busy place on August 7 at 3 p.m., as Katherine Haffner is going to sing a recital. Bonnie was asked what new ideas she had for the future. “I would really like to create a festival, put on more shows and have more participants, plus seem more communities get involved in the arts.”

Bonnie would also like to thank all the volunteers and parents for their support with all the activities and productions. “For the shows this summer, we have had about eight volunteers, and army of parents, including our very first intern, Grahm Mahanna.”

If you are interested in the arts, would like volunteer, get information to see a play, or enroll your youngster to learn more about music, then a visit to The Living Room on Main Street would be worth your time.

All month we will be looking at the advice given in Sharron Daugherty's book "Avoiding Deception".

Last week we found that the Bible is our first defense against deception. It's the inspired word of God and therefore has a great deal of power over the enemies attempt at deceiving us. However, the Bible alone is not enough. I've known many people who know the Bible well but are horribly deceived. The devil, himself, knew God's Word enough to tempt Jesus with it.

No, we need more legs under this chair if we are going to rest ourselves on it.

The second weapon against deception that Sharron discusses is prayer, or more specifically, a "Prayer Relationship".

In Mt 26:41, Jesus told His disciples to "watch and pray that you don't fall into temptation," or we could say "be deceived". Peter 4:7 tells us to "Watch and pray." Jesus taught His disciples how to "Pray and not give up" (Lk 18:1). 1Thes 5:17 tells us to

"pray without ceasing." Jesus spent entire nights praying alone. Prayer is important.

Most people's idea of prayer is a listing of needs and wants to God. Audible, silent, in a church, at home, in a closet, all they are doing is telling God stuff He already knows. Don't misunderstand. God commands us to bring our petitions to Him. But what if He wanted to say something to you?

Prayer is a conversation with a God who is very patient, loving and kind. He's not rude because He is love, so He won't interrupt your monologue, but that doesn't mean He doesn't want to speak. And if you compare your level of intelligence with His, shouldn't you spend more time listening than speaking?

This scares people because they are afraid they will mishear, which is a good probability. But just because I spent the first few years of my marriage misunderstanding my wife when she spoke to me doesn't mean I gave up trying! I was dedicated to the relationship and wanted to know what she thought and felt. So I had to learn how to hear her correctly.

It's no different with God. Well, it's a little different because He's not bodily in the room and doesn't speak audibly, but you get the image. We need to learn how to listen to God. Anyone

who is dedicated to his/her relationship with their Father try to develop good "spiritual ears."

Here the Bible comes in very handy, or very necessary. When listening to God in prayer, it'll be a lot harder to misunderstand Him if you know what He's already said in His Bible. If you know the Bible, the devil can't try to deceive you in prayer time. In fact, the vast majority of the time, when God speaks to me, it is THROUGH His Bible. This isn't about just following any voice that pops into your head while praying. That is a form of deception that any former "New Ager" can tell you about.

At any rate, the more time we spend in contact with God, the greater our ability to fight off deception. Not only can God reveal the truths we need to fight the deception, but just exposure keeps our minds focused on Him and not ourselves, which is the most common deception.

When we leave off prayer, we are forced to "lean on our own understanding." When we neglect the discipline of daily prayer time, we open ourselves up to arrogance and the horrible fall that always follows it. We must stop letting our busy schedule and our distracted heart keep us from the throne of God or we, too, will fall into the traps of deception without even knowing it.



County Treasurer Shirley Niermeier entered the meeting and distributed her 2nd quarter treasurer's report. Dewey made a motion to approve and sign the Security Agreement with First State Bank. Bielser seconded the motion. Carried 3-0. The board discussed with Niermeier the micro loan program. There are reports required in June and December to be completed and sent to the state. The board asked if her office would be able to take care of these. Niermeier did not want to add this responsibility to her office services. Bracht stated the Clerk's office would handle it. The board agreed that temporarily, the Clerk's office will take care of this job. Bracht will contact Debbie Beck with the Kansas Department of Commerce to verify what reports are needed.

Emergency Manager Don Koerperich entered the meeting. He discussed with the board an additional grant option for the generator for the EMS building through NexTech. NexTech will not make a decision before December. Dewey made a motion, seconded by Bielser, to move forward with the generator project and whatever is not covered by grants will be covered by the county out of the general repairs/maintenance fund. Carried 3-0. Koerperich will get either two additional bids or rejections for the generator.

Tiffany from Options, Domestic and Sexual Violence Services met with board and presented information on the services provided in Kansas and Sheridan County. The board budgets \$500.00 for Options and they are asking for this amount or more if available.

Paulette Feldt, Road Supervisor and Roger Jensen with Northwest Kansas Regional Recycling Organization in Colby met with the board to discuss the recycling program. He stressed their appreciation to the county for stepping up with additional dollars when another county backed out of the program. 

Meyer Electric Serving Sheridan County Over Four Decades

When September comes around, it will mark 43 years Meyer Electric has been in Hoxie. It all started with one unexpected event that resulted in a life career path change.

After graduating from the electrical program offered at the Northwest Kansas Technical College in Goodland, and working in Garden City, Tony Meyer moved to Hoxie to work as an electrician for A&M Electric. During that time, the owner of A & M called Tony and said that he had moved out of the area and did not plan to return and the business was going to be closed effective immediately. Tony was unsure of his next move, but the people of Hoxie encouraged him to consider starting his own business, so he did. Tony continued to work in this community as the sole proprietor of his new business, re-named 'Meyer Electric' in September of 1973. The business was located in the house he was renting. His next move was going to The State Bank of Hoxie to apply for a vehicle loan to purchase a work van.

During those startup years, the rate charged for a service call was \$6.50/hour. Tony stayed busy during that first year. He soon asked his brother-in-law, Jim Wright, who had been working at Sears in Wichita, to be the first and only full-time employee. One year, Jim painted a double-sided sign to mount on the top of the van for a parade. One side read, "Let us Fix Your Shorts" and the opposite side proclaimed, "We will Electrify Anything Even Your Mother-In-Law's Chair." Later, Jim went on to work full time for the USD 412 Maintenance Department.

The next big step for Meyer Electric was to build a steel shop, which was placed in Jim's backyard on Pine Street, next to Hoxie Steel, owned by Bones Pieschl. In 1984, Meyer Electric was again relocated to its present location on 808 Oak Avenue in a building purchased from Ray Sloan.

Meyer Electric is described as a family venture. Tony's wife Carolyn, who taught Home Economics at Oakley High School for two years, transitioned into the business as the bookkeeper in August of 1976. The following year, part of the office space became a daycare for their growing family, sons Jade and Zach and daughter Toni Lynn.

The oldest son, Jade began working full time for the family business in 1998 after graduating from North Central Kansas Tech in Beloit. Jade earned his Master Electrician

License that same year, being one of the youngest Kansans at that time to ever do so. "As parents, we were thrilled when Jade and his wife, Kelly (Campbell) married and chose to live in Hoxie," commented Carolyn. Jade and Kelly are busy raising their three sons, Harrison, Chase and Porter. Kelly also owns an interior design business, KM Designs. The youngest Meyer son, Zach, joined the family business on a full time basis after graduating from Fort Hays State University with a bachelor's degree in Business Administration and from NCK Tech as a Journeyman Electrician. Zach says the best part of his job is the people he gets to work with. The Meyer's daughter Toni, who helped out with the family business in many ways when growing up, did what her mother started out doing and that was to become a teacher. Toni is married to Seth Buttner, and lives in Texas with their two children, Tabytha and Clayton.

During their years in business, Meyer Electric had several employees work for them from the late 1980's and the first part of the 1990's. "All of our employees were very special to us. They were Paul Breeden, Randy Cousins, Steve Schaffer, Larry Schieferecke, Oscar Borger and Bill Sanders," commented Tony and Carolyn.

The Meyer Electric staff mentioned that being diverse is important to matching the needs of this community and surrounding areas. "We do residential, commercial, agricultural, including feedyard and grain handling, industrial, septic tank systems, oilfield and just

about anything in between." Other services of Meyer Electric include trenching, backhoe and bucket.

The business does work in several other counties, such as Decatur, Gove, Logan and Thomas but they have also have had electrical projects in Rooks and Rawlins Counties. "We have worked with many excellent local general contractors including Campbell Contracting, Bainter Construction and Elite Steel Construction. It's been enjoyable working very fine area contractors in related fields. We are indebted to them, and to Ralph John Keller, an architect from Hill City, who mentored and encouraged us, even though he is now deceased, we think of his influence often. There have been a lot of dedicated people, who made our jobs easier, such as the late Polly Stallings through the ASCS service, and the long-time head of school maintenance, Phil Farber. Our customers are our lifeblood, and many, whether living or deceased, hold a special place in our memories and are just too numerous to name," commented the Meyer family.

The Meyer's have seen a lot of projects. They have been a part of many new constructions. "Ones that come immediately to our minds and in no particular order are: The St. Frances Catholic Church, Hoxie Christian Church, Lutheran Church, Sheridan County Library, Sheridan County EMS Building, Oakley EMS Building, Sheridan County ASCS Service Building, Sheridan County Fire Department, Hoxie Swimming Pool, Hoxie Veterinary Service, Neuenschwander Medical Clinic, Stockton and Plainville Libraries, CPS building, Good Samaritan Home and Midwest Energy Building in Rawlins County."

The Meyer Electric crew also remembers projects that involved the Foote Family Feedyards in Hoxie and Oberlin, Hi-Plains Co-op, Taylor Implement, Hoxie Implement and the earliest phase of BTI. There are also memories of jobs with unique aspects, such as "re-purposing" (existing buildings into new uses) such as converting the Hoxie Bowling Alley to the new Gambino's Pizza Restaurant,

also the Cooper Dry Goods Store into Nex-Tech and the City Office, and Trish's and Oscar's.

Another great memory from the earlier days of the business, was finding bulbs and tubes that were needed for a Ferris wheel, and maintaining lighting at the rodeo arena for the new "home-grown fair".

Meyer Electric has also provided the electrical construction for many homes, the best part of which was being a part of something essential to a family's well-being and enjoyment of the home. There were also some jobs having a special Northwest Kansas touch, such as the six-mile trenching job, which averaged one rattlesnake encounter per mile!

Hoxie is a great place to run a business. Jade summed it up the best, "Everybody looks out for each other. Farmers and business people are willing to try new things or adapt to new technology/methods."

"Growing up in any way of life gives one a good idea if that is a good fit for them," summed up Carolyn. "For Jade and Zach making the commitment seemed like a natural choice, but not a forgone conclusion. This job can be physically demanding, but the Lord has blessed us with good health. Safety is essential land we strive to keep our record accident and injury-free. Looking ahead, new developments in technology and the ever progressing area of energy savings keeps us on our toes. Day to day challenges of running a small business cost-efficiently requires close attention," said Carolyn.

The Meyer brothers like to attend training meetings and certification seminars, whether it be on electrical codes, software, or new technology. "The most important part of our business is customer service. It is our bottom line," added Carolyn. "Feedback is really important because our business depends on repeat, satisfied customers."

Meyer Electric hopes the future will bring more families into Hoxie, as they feel this is a great town to raise children, run a business, and build friendships. Many would agree with the good people of the Meyer family.

CHARTER ORDINANCE NO. 33

A CHARTER ORDINANCE EXEMPTING THE CITY OF HOXIE, KANSAS, FROM K.S.A. 8-15,108 AND PROVIDING SUBSTITUTE AND ADDITIONAL PROVISIONS ON THE SAME SUBJECT RELATING TO THE OPERATION OF GOLF CARTS ON CITY STREETS

BeItOrdnained By the Governing Body of the City of Hoxie, Kansas

Section 1. Definition - As used in this ordinance, the following words and phrases shall have the meaning respectively ascribed to them in this section except when the context requires otherwise.

a. A Golf Cart means a motor vehicle that has not less than three wheels in contact with the ground, an unladen weight of not more than 1,800 lbs and is designed to be operated at not more than 25 miles per hour and is designated to carry not more than four persons, including the driver.

Section 2. The City of Hoxie, Kansas, a third class city, by the power vested in it by Article 12, Section 5, of the Constitution of the State of Kansas hereby elects to exempt itself from and making applicable to it the provisions of K.S.A. 8-15,108 insofar as the same relates to the lawfulness of the operation of Golf Carts on the streets of cities of the third class. The following substitute and additional provisions as hereinafter set forth in this Ordinance shall be applicable to the City of Hoxie, Kansas. This Charter Ordinance is pursuant to the home rule power of the City of Hoxie, Kansas, in the above statute is part of a uniform enactment nor applicable uniformly to all cities in the State of Kansas.

Section 3. OPERATION OF GOLF CARTS ON CITY STREETS; SPECIAL CONDITIONS AND RESTRICTIONS ON OPERATION.

a. Golf Carts may be operated upon the public highways, streets, road and alleys within the corporate limits of the city.

i. No golf cart may be operated upon any public highway, street, road and alley with a posted speed limit in excess of 30 miles per hour.

ii. No golf cart shall be operated on any federal or state highway; provided, however, that the provisions of this subsection shall not prohibit a golf cart from crossing a federal or state highway with a posted speed limit greater than 30 miles per hour.

iii. No golf cart shall be operated on any public highway, street, road or ally between sunset and sunrise.

iv. No golf cart may be operated unless the driver adheres to all traffic and parking laws applicable to other motor vehicles driven upon city streets;

Section 4. SAME: VALID DRIVERS LICENSE REQUIRED; PENALTY; DUTIES AND RESPONSIBILITIES. (a) No person

shall operate a golf cart on any public highway, street, road or alley within the corporate limits of the city unless such person has a valid drivers license. Violation of this section is punishable by a fine of not more than \$1,000 or by imprisonment for not more than six months or by both such fine and imprisonment. (b) Every person operating a golf cart on the public highways, streets, roads and alleys of the city shall be subject to all of the duties applicable to a driver of a vehicle imposed by law.

Section 5. SAME: INSURANCE REQUIRED; PENALTY. (a) Every owner of a golf cart shall provide liability coverage in accordance with the Kansas Automobile Injury Reparations Act, K.S.A. 40-3101, et seq. and amendments thereto.

Section 6. PENALTY. Unless specifically provided for herein, a violation of this section shall be deemed an ordinance traffic infraction. Upon an entry of a plea of guilty or no contest or upon being convicted of such violation, the penalty imposed shall be in accordance with Section 201, of the Standard Traffic Ordinance, and amendments thereto, or such other similar provision as the city may then have in effect.

Section 7. This Ordinance shall be published once each week for two consecutive weeks in the Hoxie Sentinel, the official City newspaper.

Section 8. This is a charter ordinance and shall take effect sixty-one (61) days after its final publication unless a sufficient petition for a referendum is filed as provided in Article 12, Section 5, Subdivision (c)(3) of the Constitution of the State of Kansas, in which case the ordinance shall become effective upon approval by a majority of electors voting at an election held on the ordinance.

Passed by the governing body of the City of Hoxie, Kansas, and approved by the Mayor on the 11th day of July, 2016.

Fatal Crash On Hwy 23

A Clayton, Kansas woman, Rochelle Mather, 59, was killed and two others injured, in an accident that occurred around 1p.m. on Saturday, July 16, while traveling north on State Highway 23.

The Kansas Highway Patrol reports that a 2006 Chevy Silverado, driven by Braden Keith Bainter, 21, Hoxie, was traveling east on Sheridan County Road 60 N, six miles north of Hoxie. Bainter failed to stop at the stop sign, striking Mather's 2000 Ford Windstar. Rochelle Mather was pronounced dead at the scene and was transported directly to Mickey-Leopold Funeral Home. Richard A. Mather, 71, Clayton, was a passenger in the Windstar and was transported to Sheridan County Hospital, and later flown to Swedish Medical Center in Denver. Bainter was transported to Sheridan County Hospital. There were two teenagers in the Silverado who were uninjured.

According to the Kansas Highway Patrol, none of those involved in the accident were wearing seat belts.

EMT Class Informational Meeting


