

### Red Cross: Emergency Need for Donors

Shortage continues this summer due to increased demand for blood. Give Aug 1-15 for chance to win a trip for 2 to sold-out Bonnaroo and more

The American Red Cross has an emergency need for lifesaving blood amid the ongoing severe blood shortage. Blood donations continue to be critical to meet hospital demand and the public is urged to make an appointment to give now.

The Red Cross has been distributing about 12% more blood products to hospitals across the U.S. compared to this time last year. The Red Cross needs to collect more than 1,000 additional blood donations each day to meet the current hospital demand and end the severe blood shortage. Donors of all blood types are needed, especially type O, which stands at just a one-day supply

#### Sen. Marshall Statement on CDC Mask Guidance

U.S. Senator Roger Marshall, M.D. issued the following statement after the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) reversed course and is now recommending vaccinated Americans wear masks.

"This is a time to believe in science, not anxiety or panic. Today's inconsistent CDC guidance will only lead to more vaccine hesitancy. The science does not support a new mask mandate if you've been vaccinated or if you've had the virus," said Senator Marshall. "With news of the Delta variant, now is the time to talk to your doctor about getting vaccinated if you haven't yet. Science shows us there is no reason to panic as vaccinations and/ or natural immunity provide exceptional defense against the Delta variant and all variants, and wearing a mask, as Dr. Fauci once said, 'May make people feel better... but it's not providing the perfect protection that people think that it is."





Willis Ellsworth, sheriff of Graham county, took in the races last Saturday.

E. C. Prather, of Grinnell, was on the streets last Tuesday taking in the sights.

Giles Humes reports a fine rain in his part of

the county last Saturday evening.
J. E. R. Ewing is attending the Institute and will

teach this winter in the east part of the county.

Mrs. George Tatum is on a short visit to her sister, Mrs. Thomas Armstrongs near Grinnell.

George looks lonesome and sad.
I. C. Bowen returned from Phillips county last
Sunday and reports roads good and crops all

along the line as fair, a little above the average.

Two gentlemen from Council Bluffs were in town the first of the week and made some large investments and contracts on condition of the

railroad being built.

A child was born last Wednesday evening to Mr. and Mrs. Jurgen Harm. Its sex we have not learned, but it is standard weight, and all parties

are doing well.

E. L. Chaplin, who is building the fine residence south-west of town, started for Ames, Kansas, last Tuesday, where he has some business transactions to attend to.

W. A. Johnson, of Adel township, made proof on his claim last Tuesday. He says that crops look well, and lots of people are coming in and buying land.

Henry Rosenkrans, a brother of Charlie's, from Minneapolis, Kansas, is making a short visit at his brothers. He says that crops here look better than they do farther east.

R.L. Crist brought in a sample of Black Russian oats which has only been planted seventy-five days and will make fifty bushels to the acre. They are as fine as we ever saw grow from the ground.

A new store has been started at Elliot P. O. nine miles north-east of Hoxie, near J. C. Yates. One Mr. Pease has put up a frame building 18x35 and will carry a full line of general merchandise.

George Shaw said, "Sam, I must go home and take care of my big crop, and when you get reliable news of the railroad building send me word and I will be in here with both feet and be ready to go to work."

Mr. T. C. Edington arrived in the city last Wednesday evening accompanied by his family. He immediately rented the Ford building, and at this writing, is placing a stock of boots, shoes, clothing, millinery and gent's furnishing goods in said building where he intends to always be found with a full and select line of the above goods which will be sold at reasonable prices.

#### Notice of Appeal Filed in Kansas **Emergency Management Act** Case

Kansas Attorney General Derek Schmidt today filed a notice of appeal in a Johnson County District Court case that recently held unenforceable 2021 Senate Bill 40, a newly enacted law that reforms Kansas Emergency Management Act.

Schmidt today notified the Johnson County court that he is appealing the decision to the Kansas Supreme Court. In addition, he filed a motion asking the lower court to stay its decision in the case, pending the appeal.

In the filings, Schmidt noted that the court's ruling was causing "unnecessary and disruptive confusion," in part because many provisions of Senate Bill 40 were not at issue in the case, but it nevertheless appears the court ruling may have invalidated them. Schmidt warned that failure to stay the ruling could result in "legal anarchy," and "potentially hamper the State's ability to respond to a future disaster emergency."

"We work with inventors at all stages of the process, and we can help them with understanding patents, timelines, and market research," he said. "Barry did a great job developing his product, he just needed to be able to have everything in hand when he approached manufacturers."

The Technology Development Institute has rural and innovation funds from the Department of Commerce that they were able to match with the support Reinert had from NWKEICI to take the design, put it into a virtual model, and build a second and final prototype.

#### Biden's "Human Infrastructure" Package Plan Short 50 Votes

Administration says infrastructure" "human package would cost taxpayers \$3.4 trillion, the Committee for a Responsible Federal Budget in an independent analysis estimates the true cost to be closer to \$5 trillion. Assuming the major provisions will be made permanent and continue through the 10-year budget window, the group says, the "policies under consideration could cost between \$5 trillion and \$5.5 trillion over a decade." The budget-resolution fact sheet Democrats circulated last week, a Wall Street Journal commentary notes, "includes only a bare-bones description of the bill's major programs for tax credits, new entitlements, healthcare, climate, and housing. Some categories in the proposal include this caveat: 'The duration of each program's enactment will be determined based on scoring and Committee input.' The plan "is to include every program but start small and pretend they're temporary. This will let them skirt the budget-reconciliation rule that spending can't add to the deficit outside a 10year budget window without triggering a 60-vote threshold to pass," the WSJ adds. If the bipartisan infrastructure deal falls apart, the components of that legislation would be added in, bringing the price tag up to about \$6.7 trillion.

To get the ball rolling on the "human infrastructure" package, Congress first needs to pass a budget resolution with reconciliation instructions. Once that occurs, committees will have to act to pass their portions based on instructions from the Budget Committee. The Budget Committee would then tie all of the bills together into a single package and move through the House and Senate on a partisan, majority basis — if Democrats can hold all of their members together. House Budget Committee Chairman Sanders (I-VT) indicates the plan currently does not have 50 votes to pass in the Senate, prompting House Speaker Nancy Pelosi (D-CA) to reconsider her decision to wait for the Senate to pass a budget before the House acts upon one. This is the legislation where tax increases are being proposed to offset new program costs that include universal pre-K, free community college, expanded Medicare, new regulations on utilities, pathway to citizenship for undocumented workers, expanded labor union rights, and a carbon tax on imports, among other things.

#### Researchers Discover Undocumented **Crayfish Species** in Kansas

Widespread sampling for invasive crayfish had never occurred in Kansas lakes - that is, until the Kansas Department of Wildlife and Parks (KDWP) recently funded a university project focused on the freshwater crustacean. KDWP's Aquatic Nuisance Species Program and Ecological Services section funded the project with the overarching goal establishing sampling protocols that could then used for long-term monitoring of both native and invasive crayfish in Kansas. To the surprise of staff and researchers, the need for such protocols would be validated almost as quickly as the research project began.

During capturing efforts at McPherson State Fishing Lake - one of several small waterbodies slated to be inspected in the state university researchers multiple Rusty collected Crayfish Crayfish. Rusty have not previously been documented in the wild in Kansas, making this official "discovery" the first of its kind. Rusty Crayfish captured at McPherson consisted of both males and females of varying ages, indicating a reproducing population is established in the lake. Unfortunately, this isn't the type of species staff and researchers would hope to find, as the Rusty Crayfish is an invasive species known for the considerable ecological damage it can cause in

waterbodies. This large, aggressive crayfish is not only known to attack the feet of unsuspecting humans and animals standing in freshwater, it outcompetes both native fish and crayfish species for forage - forage that also acts as important cover for select prey species.

"The most likely cause of the Rusty Crayfish making its way into Kansas is through its use as fishing bait," said KDWP Aquatic Nuisance Species coordinator, Chris "This species is a prime example of the importance of always draining water from your boat, livewell, and bilge before leaving a waterbody, and of never moving bait from one waterbody to another. You iust never know what could be hitchhiking a ride."

Staff and researchers working on the crayfish project will continue to experiment with multiple capture methods and techniques on a small number of waterbodies around the state. Once an effective and efficient sampling protocol has been identified, staff will continue the sampling efforts across a large number of lakes across the state.

Anglers, boaters, watersport enthusiasts are encouraged to keep their eyes open for this invasive species, which can be identified by its trademark large, black-tipped claws and rust-colored spots on its upper shell. If one is discovered, freeze it in a sealed plastic bag, note the date and location of capture, and contact KDWP's Emporia Research and Survey Office at (620) 342-0658.

#### Kansas Crop Progress and Condition

For the week ending July 25, 2021, there were 6.3 days suitable for fieldwork, according to the USDA's National Agricultural Statistics Service. Topsoil moisture supplies rated 6% very short, 28% short, 63% adequate, and 3% surplus. Subsoil moisture supplies rated 4% very short, 26% short, 67% adequate, and 3% surplus.

Field Crops Report: Corn condition rated 1% very poor, 6% poor, 24% fair, 58% good, and 11% excellent. Corn silking was 76%, near 77% last year and 78% for the five-year average.

Dough was 24%, behind 34% last year, and near 25% average. Soybean condition rated 3% very poor, 5% poor, 30% fair, 57% good, and 5% excellent.

Soybeans blooming was 60%, behind 66% last year, and equal to average. Setting pods was 24%, behind 36% last year, and equal to average.

Sorghum condition rated 1% very poor, 5% poor, 27% fair, 61% good, and 6% excellent.

Sorghum headed was 23%, near 25% last year and 22% average. Coloring was 1%, equal to both last year and average.

Cotton condition rated 0% very poor, 5% poor, 34% fair, 55% good, and 6% excellent. Cotton squaring was 81%, near 80% last year, and ahead of 67% average. Setting bolls was 11%, behind 21% last year, and near 14% average.

Pasture and Range Report: Pasture and range conditions rated 2% very poor, 11% poor, 31% fair, 51% good, and 5% excellent.

# U.S. July 1 Cattle Inventory Down 1% From 2020

All cattle and calves in the United States as of July 1, 2021 totaled 101 million head according to the USDA's National Agricultural Statistics Service.

All cows and heifers that had calved totaled 40.9 million head.

Beef cows totaled 31.4 million head.

Milk cows totaled 9.50 million head.

All heifers 500 pounds and over totaled 16.0 million head.
Steers weighing 500 pounds and over totaled 14.5 million head.

Bulls weighing 500 pounds and over totaled 2.10 million head.

Calves under 500 pounds totaled 27.4 million head.

All cattle on feed fed for the slaughter market in the United States for all feedlots totaled 13.4 million head.

The 2021 calf crop is expected to be 35.1 million head. Calves born during the first half of the year are estimated at 25.8 million.

# Kansas Cattle on Feed Up 3%

Kansas feedlots, with capacities of 1,000 or more head, contained 2.45 million cattle on feed on July 1, according to the USDA's National Agricultural Statistics Service. This inventory was up 3% from last year.

Placements during June totaled 430,000 head, up 1% from 2020.

Fed cattle marketings for the month of June totaled 490,000 head, up 8% from last year.

Other disappearance during June totaled 10,000 head, unchanged from last year.

### Kansas Milk Production

Milk production in Kansas during June 2021 totaled 344 million pounds, up 7% from June 2020, according to the USDA's National Agricultural Statistics Service. The average number of milk cows was 175,000 head, 7,000 head more than June 2020. Milk production per cow averaged 1,965 pounds.

## Wheat Scoop: Mark Your Calendar for Farmer U

Ready for the return of in-person agricultural events? Mark your calendar for August 18 and 19 for a new event organized by the High Plains Journal — Farmer U. The event will take place in Mulvane, Kansas, at the Kansas Star Event Center and will include speakers, educational breakout sessions, panel discussions and a trade show.

"We are looking forward to gathering together again to learn from agricultural experts and fellow farmers who are at the top of their fields," said Justin Gilpin, CEO of Kansas Wheat. "We hope you will join us in Mulvane as we work together to continue the innovations of Kansas agriculture."

Michelle Miller — also known as the Farm Babe on social media — will open the event by discussing how farmers and ranchers can counter the misinformation spread about agriculture and work to educate consumers.

Rob Sharkey — also known as the Shark Farmer — will close the event. Sharkey is a fifth-generation farmer from Illinois who hosts a podcast titled "SharkFarmer Podcast," a radio show on Sirius XM and a television show on RFDTV called "SharkFarmer TV." He will focus on his unconventional journey to becoming a disrupter in the agriculture industry and how his media ventures center around providing a platform for stories about people in agriculture.

The event will also include two panel discussions - a farmer panel and a women's panel. The farmer panel will include Ki Gamble, Travis Schnaithman, Jimmy Frederick and Jeremy Brown.

Gamble is a fourth-generation farmer from Greensburg, Kansas, who farms irrigated and dryland alfalfa, corn, sunflowers, soybeans, sorghum and wheat and has won the National Sorghum Producer's Grain Sorghum Yield Contest 10 times. Schnaithman, a past National FFA Star Farmer of America, is a fifth-generation farmer from Garber, Oklahoma, who raises wheat, soybeans, sorghum and corn with his father and brother. Frederick of Rulo, Nebraska, farms 3,000 acres of mostly non-irrigated ground alongside his father. Frederick is the world record holder for dryland soybeans at 148.8 bushels per acre. Jeremy Brown operates a 4,000-acre farming operation called Broadview Agriculture near Lubbock, Texas, using regenerative farming practices to raise cotton.

The Farmer U women's panel will kick off day two with the Farm Babe serving as moderator for a line-up that will include Blayne Arthur, Oklahoma's first female Secretary of Agriculture; Whitney Larson, a city girl turned Kansas farm wife, agricultural blogger and podcaster; fifth-generation Nebraska farmer Sarah Greer; and Colorado Farmer Bureau state officer and agriculturist Roxi McCormick.

Educational breakout sessions will cover soil health, irrigation, soybeans, corn, wheat, sorghum, alfalfa and corn. Brent Bean, director of agronomy for the United Sorghum Checkoff Program will present on new herbicide technologies for sorghum. Schnaithman will discuss how to market wheat to extract additional value, including the use of on-farm storage. Bruce Anderson, Extension forage specialist emeritus at the University of Nebraska, will detail the benefits of alfalfa in crop rotations. Frederick will give a presentation on decreasing soybean plant populations while also improving plant health increasing yield. Seth Byrd, Oklahoma State University Extension cotton specialist, will present on cotton stand establishment and seed quality in the Great Plains.

Trisha Jackson, director of regenerative agriculture at PrairieFood, will provide a soil health breakdown about how taking care of the soil takes care of crops. Sarah Lancaster, Kansas State University assistant professor of agronomy and Extension specialist, will share the secrets of managing weeds — specifically pigweed — in corn. Scott Staggenborg, sorghum product marketing director at S&W Seed, will provide an analysis of new technologies on the rise in sorghum and how sorghum can become a more important crop rotation. Kurt Grimm, owner of NutraDrip Irrigation Systems, will explain how producers can get the most from their irrigation water.

The Farmer U & Trade Show event will also include the Farmer U Awards, including the 2021 Woman of the Year Award and 2021 Farmer of the Year Awards, given in the categories of alfalfa, corn, cotton, soil health, sorghum, soybeans and wheat.

### **USDA** to Survey County Small Grains Acreage

The U.S. Department of Agriculture's National Agricultural Statistics Service (NASS) will survey producers in 32 states, including Kansas, for its 2021 small grains County Agricultural Production

The survey will collect information on total acres planted and harvested, and yield and production of small grains crops down to the county level. CAPS will provide the data needed to estimate acreage and production of selected crops such as barley, oats, and wheat in the United States.


"The data provided will help federal and state programs support the farmer," said Doug Bounds, Kansas State Statistician. "I hope every producer understands the importance of these data and will take the time to respond if they receive this survey. Producers can lose out when there are no data to determine accurate rates for loans, disaster payments, crop insurance price elections and more. When enough producers do not respond to surveys, NASS is not able to publish data. Without data, agencies such as USDA's Risk Management Agency or Farm Service Agency do not have information on which to base the programs that serve

those same producers."

Farmers are encouraged to respond online at agcounts.usda.gov or by mail. Alternatively, within the next few weeks, NASS representatives will contact selected Kansas growers to arrange telephone interviews to complete the survey.

NASS safeguards the privacy of all respondents and publishes only aggregate data, ensuring that no individual operation or producer can be identified, as required by federal law.

Survey results will be published in the NASS Quick Stats database (quickstats. nass.usda.gov) at 3 p.m. ET on Thursday, Dec. 9, 2021. For more information on NASS surveys and reports, call the NASS Kansas Field Office at (800) 582-6443.
